Milwaukee, June 8,-Denunciation of the insurgents and commendation of the Republican national administration none has been restored. were the trend of a number of speeches at the first session of the Republican state convention here this afternoon Every mention of the president's name was followed by a warm demonstration Vice President James S. Sherman, who came here for the purpose of addressing the convention, was given an exceeding ly warm welcome.

The real work of the convention-the formulating of the platform-will not be reached until tomorrow. The nam ing of the candidates on the state ticke probably will be left for the primar election in September. It was the opin ion tonight that the platform will en dorse the president and criticise the Re publican office holders not in sympahy with his policies.

Stalwartism the Keynote.

Executive Chairman Emanuel L. Philipp, in introducing Temporary Chairman Michael E. Dillon of Ashland, extelled the national administration and criti cised the insurgents, and every speaker who followed spoke along the same line and pleaded for harmony in the party.

Judge Levi H. Bancroft of Richland Center, formerly of the La Follette faction, who was chosen as permanent chairman, bitterly arraigned the insurgent movement in congress and with meant the disruption of party organiza tion and the substitution therefor of one-man despotism,

Gathered in the convention were number of former adherents of United States Senator R. M. La Follette, not ably among whom were former Governo Wm. D. Hoard and Wm. D. Conner, Mr. Hoard made a few remarks in which ! pleaded with the delegates to "have faith in the great Republican party and i the honesty, ability and statesmanshi of our leader, President Taft," Any no who believes for a moment that M: Taft is a tool of the so-called veste interests, he said, finds the answer i the late injunction against the railroad which is evidence that the president i for a square deal.

Mr. Conner said there would always be progress if the Republican party rules "Every great achievement, every great improvement which has brought results has been an accomplishment of the Re publican party," he said.

Sherman the Principal Speaker.

The leading address of the convention was that by Vice President Sherman a a mass meeting at the Auditorium to night, when he urged party regularity upon his hearers and rehearsed the his tory of the party. The convention too a recess from business until 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

"What is a Republican"? was the first subject that Vice President Sherma dealt with after he had paid a glowing tribute to President Taft, as the leade of his party. Rebukes the Progressive Wing.

> Carl J. Hoster Predicts a Speedy Return to the "Wet" Column of the States Now "Dry" in Whole or in Part.

Formerly Adverse to the Liquor Interests, the Pendulum Is Now Swinging the Other Way, He Declares to the U. S. Brewers' Association, of Which He Is the President-License System Spells Regulation, He Says, and It Is Gaining Advocates Rapidly

Washington, June 8 .- Predicting the ime when the brewer will be found vorking with the real and practical reormers in the interest of true temperonce, President Carl J. Hoster opened he fiftieth convention of the United States Brewers' association here today. President Hoster declared that far from apologizing for being a brewer, he ecognized in every one a logical promoer of true temperance. He predicted speedy return to license of those states which had adopted prohibition

"The pendulum is slowly but surely swinging the other way," declared President Hoster, "and it is becoming more clearly and generally recognized that the license system, which simply, spells regulation, can be made to bring about better results than anything else that has been tried. The police power dent paternalism. The brewing industry is simply one of the many concerns which has been investigated by the jury of public opinion. On the whole the trend is a wholesome one. In these ninety nillion gallons of beer were nearly 4,-000,000 gallons of pure alcohol. Such was the report of the board of trustees to the association. The volume ousiness of the year just ended, trustees believe, will exceed 1908, which was the banner year for the brewing industry in this country.





Goldwin Smith was born in 1823 in England, He was educated at Eton and Oxford and was admitted to the bar but never practiced. He was the tutor of King Edward when the latter was Prince of Wales. In 1858 he was appointed professor of modern bistory Oxford, retaining the chair until 1866. He first visited America during the Civil war. He was an enthusiastic ampion of the cause of the North. In 1866 he again came over and became professor of English and constitutional history at Cornell, In 1871 he re-






