Evidence Closed in Beddow Case and It Is Expected That Jury Retire to Deliberate Verdict This Evening.

Defendant on the Stand All of the Forencon and Baffles Efforts to Get Him "Tangled Up" -Rebuttal Testimony Contradicts Some of His Statements.

The evidence was closed in the Beddow case at 3:10 yesterday afternoon and the arguments to the jury will begin this morning at 9 o'clock. Each side has agreed to limit its argument to two and one-half hours, which means that the court will be able to give his charge to the jury late in the afternoon and that the case will go to the jury tonight. Mr. O'Neill will make the opening argument, and will be followed by Mr. Riley, while the closing argument for the government will be made by Mr. Clute. Mr. Clute may be expected to speak twice as long as either of the attorneys for the de

The cross-examination and redirect examination of Beddow was completed at poon yesterday. Mr. Clute, in his crossexamination of the witness, brought in more new items, one of the most sig nificant of which was a deal in which i appeared that Beddow had purchased stock, when his bank account was already overdrawn and that the price of same had been credited to E. G. Brady, the broker, by debiting the amount to Reddow's account, notwithstanding that the account was overdrawn before the charge was made. Beddow stated that this was his own deal and that Larson had authorized the further charge to Beddow's account. Beddow showed that as the result of the series of transac tions of which this was a part, the over draft against his account was reduced several hundred dollars. He said that Larson was in the habit of giving him slips stating amounts of items to be carried in the cash account which Beddow supposed represented pa per that Larson held. He declared that ie had no possible way of knowing that \$11,000 of this amount had been deposit ed to the credit of the Harqua Hala Mining company and \$9,000 to Larson' personal account, as Mr. Dietrich kept the individual accounts. He further denied knowledge that Larson's accou was usually heavily overdrawn,

Ledger Footing Explained.

Concerning the footing on the ledge which had been shown to be \$8,500 larg er than the sum of the items on the page be stated that it was not an unusua thing for Larson to give him items to be added in the ledger balance for the day and not to turn over the paper from which he could make an cutry for some time later. In this instance, he said the paper had never been turned over but that he found evidences of an erasure, which might have been where he made a pencil notation of the \$8,500 item. He said that the column had been footed with an adding machine and that items could be inserted in the column on the machine from slips or memoranda, just as well as from those items actually on the book.

No matter what ques tion might be put to him, he was ready with an answer and replied without stammering, hesitation or apparent con Furthermore, it cannot be said that Mr. Clute succeeded in getting him "tangled up" or to contradict himself and in every instance he stuck to hi first story.

Receiver Tillinghast was called to the stand by the defense and asked about the separate items that made up the alleged shortage of Beddow, which he had reviously testified amounted to about \$20,000. He could not remember any specific items that went to make up this amount, and Attorney O'Neill was then put on the stand and read the items from a memoranda that he had taken down one time when Mr. Tillinghast went over this matter with him. was evidently the contention of the de fense that Beddow had never embezzled any of these items, most of which have come up in the trial of this case,

> Formal notice has been received from he commissioner of internal revenue at new revenue act affecting tobacco, snuffs, to every manufacturer and many deal-

ernal revenue taxes on manufactured bacco and snuff are increased from ix to eight cents per pound; on eigars veighing not more than three pounds per thousand, from fifty-four cents to eventy-five cents per thousand; on cig arettes weighing not more than three ounds per thousand, from fifty-four ents to \$1.08 per thousand, according o the wholesale price, to one rate of \$1.25 per thousand and on cigarette reighing more than three pounds per housand, from \$3 to \$3.60 per thouand, to take effect July 1, 1910. The ax rate on cigars weighing more than hree pounds per thousand remains unhanged at \$3 per thousand.

Under the provisions of the act the igher rates apply to all manufactured obacco, snuff, cigarettes, etc., removed rom factory or customs house on and after July 1. Tax-paid goods in the ands of jobbers, dealers and others of ven outside their bonded factory prem ses before that date, are not subject o pay the additional amount. The re noval from factories after July 1 at the

old rate, however, is not permissible, In observing the new law it will l necessary for manufacturers of tobacc in its various forms to take an in ventory July 1 before the commencemen of business that day to show the actua stock of tobacco materials, stamped and instamped products, attached and unat ached revenue stamps on hand. Thos who produce large cigars and nothing else will not be required to take in ventory as the rate of taxation is un changed. New stamp books must be secured for use after July 1.

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
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
