Oyster Bay, N. Y., July 7.-Albert J. Beveridge, United States senator from Indiana and one of the most prominen and consistent "progressive" Republicans, came down from Sagamore Hill this afternoon with the promise from Theodore Roosevelt to deliver a campaign speech in his fight for re-election to the senate. Mr. Beveridge departed content and smiling, but left it for the colonel to make the announcement, Mr. Roosevelt said:







Sawmills Suspend Operations and the Entire Population of the Village Joins in Fighting Forest Fires That Threaten the Destruction of the Town.



Houghton, Mich., July 7 .-- Five miles of continuous forest fire are raging west of Ontonagon. All three of the Outonagon mills have suspended operations and the crews are fighting fire, as is the entire population of the village, which is threatened.
