Mining News

CALUMET & HECLA.

Probably the best explanation of the decline in the price of Calumet & Hecla shares is the poor condition of the copper metal market, for the company's dividend record of the past two years warrants a higher price for a first-class investment copper stock.

The changes in the production of the smaller companies do not mean a great deal for them as they are developing. It is well understood, however, that the Illinois mine has been sufficiently developed to increase the output at any time to much larger figures, so even if this mine's copper output were held in check it would be equivalent to curtailment.

UTAH CONSOLIDATED.

Some trouble has been experienced in operating the new aerial tramway at the Utah Consolidated property. This line is four miles in length, running from 155 miles in Bingham over the mountains to the International smelting plant in Tooele valley.

NOTES OF COPPER NEWS.

The Boston & Corbin has drifted on the fifth level for 2,000 feet, and the drift is still in good ore.

NEW SMELTER PROJECT.

Between 1,400 and 1,450 tons of ore are being treated daily at the Ohio company's concentrator, resulting in an average of approximately forty-five tons of concentrates.
