Death of an Old Citizen—At 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon, at his home, 218 Fisher street, Cornelius C. Harrington passed away at the advanced age of ninety years. His death followed an illness of only a few hours. Mr. Harrington was born in Ayres, Cork county, Ireland, and came to Lake Superior in 1861. He spent thirty-five years in the copper country and the last fourteen years in Marquette. He leaves a wife and a family of seven children—J. S. Harrington of Hurley, Wis., and Michael E. Con C. Jerry and David, Mrs. M. Shea and Miss Ann of Marquette. The funeral will take place at 9 o'clock Monday morning.

Three Dry Days—Marquette saloon keepers, together with all other law-abiding Michigan dispensers of liquid joy, will be hard hit the first week of September, and the drinking man who has not the retaining qualities of a camel will be obliged to lay in a supply in advance. Sept. 4 is Sunday; Sept. 5 is Labor Day, a legal holiday, and Sept. 6 is primary election day, and all election days are now dry days in Michigan. This is the combination that confronts the liquor dealers and their patrons, so

they may all figure on a vacation at that time. It is understood that a number of protests have been made by dealers in some parts of the state, but the law is plain on the subject, and Attorney General Kuhn has reiterated for the benefit of inquirers that the statute must be enforced.

ISHPEMING WILL BE WELL REPRESENTED

Thirty or More Members of Fire Department Will Attend Tournament at the Soo.

About thirty members of the Ishpeming fire department plan to attend the upper peninsula firemen's tournament at Sault Ste. Marie next week. Other Ishpeming people also plan to make the trip, and Ishpeming will be well represented.

The members of the department will likely go down on a special train that is scheduled to leave Houghton 9 o'clock Tuesday evening, passing through here about 2 o'clock Wednesday morning. John Rivers, who is in the South Shore general passenger agent's office at Duluth, was in the city Thursday, on business pertaining to the tournament. He said that there will be a large attendance from the copper country and it is expected that most of the excursionists from that region will travel on the special train leaving Tuesday night. The Duluth, South Shore & Atlantic Railway company is offering two rates. The first excursion tickets will be sold on the 7th, 8th, 9th, 10th and 11th, and will be good for return up to the 15th. The fare will be \$6.00 for the round trip. Those leaving on the 10th can secure round trip tickets for \$5.50, good for return only until the 13th.

The firemen's program will last four days. The parade will take place Wednesday afternoon. Firemen's races are scheduled for Thursday and Friday and there will be various entertainments on Saturday.

The delegates from the Ishpeming department to the annual convention are Chief John Lacey and First Assistant Chief William Trembath. The alternates are W. H. Quayle and Arthur V. Sundberg.

It is expected that there will be a lively contest for the next meeting, as both Bessemer and Hancock are making a strong bid for it. It is said that Bessemer department has a number of votes pledged.

SECURES GOOD POSITION.

Former Ishpeming Man Now Assistant Manager of Big Book Concern.

Otto Leonardson, a former well known resident, who has been conducting a job printing and publishing business at Marinette, Wis., for the past few years, has accepted the position of assistant manager of the Minneapolis branch of the Augustana book concern, which has its headquarters at Rock Island, Ill. It is the largest Swedish book publishing house in America, and has a number of branches, most of them located in the larger cities. Mr. Leonardson has disposed of his interests at Marinette, and is preparing to move his family to Minneapolis.
