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



Chicago, Aug. 30 .- Fred C. Barbott, yard inspector of the Ostermann Manufacturing company, one of the concerns harged with grafting in the Illinois Central car repair contracts, today in the municipal court described in detail the methods which he said were used to defraud the railroad.

Barbott said that Illinois Central cars-in "strings" of from ten to fourteen"-were switched into the yards of the Ostermann plant at the close of a working day. At night, he said, Henry pany, frequently directed the dismant-ing of the cars. Water was applied to various parts where the equipment had been removed so that rust would form been removed so that rust would form and make the rolling stock appear old.
