GYMNASIUM WORK STARTS SEPT. 19

Y. M. C. A. to Have Basketball, Baseball and Football Teams This Season.

The gymnasium classes of the Young Men's Christian association will open a week from Monday, two weeks earlier than was expected. The evenings are now so cool that many of the members expressed a desire to have the gymnasium opened for the fall and winter months—at an early date as possible. Many of both the senior and junior members are preparing to take work in the gymnasium classes and it is now quite certain that the enrollment will be considerably larger than last year.

The new schedule of classes is being prepared and will be out in the hands of the members some time during the coming week. All members will be urged to take a thorough physical examination, which will be given by the physical director, before entering the classes, as this examination gives the members and the director an intelligent idea of the exercises needed for each individual, and, besides, makes the work in the gymnasium perfectly safe.

The gymnasium, which the members have been privileged to use all summer, though no classes have been conducted, will be closed for a few days next week for repairs. The apparatus will be put in first-class condition and some improvements will be made.

Basketball, indoor baseball and football teams will be organized within the next week or two. Some of the more prominent athletes of the association have already held conferences relative to the organization of teams and practice work will be started within a few days. The seniors expect to have stronger baseball and basketball teams than they had last year, and it is also thought that the football eleven will show greater strength. The football team played but two games last season, both of them with the Guild Hall eleven of Marquette, each team winning a game. The basketball team played some eight or ten games, while the baseball team also had several contests. All of the members will be given an opportunity to try for the teams and several practice meetings will be held before the regular line-ups will be decided upon. As Gwin will have both basketball and baseball teams the coming season, it is expected that several games will be arranged between the boys on the Swanzye range and the local players. The Gwin teams will have the advantage over the Ishpeming organization in that they have a larger gymnasium in which to practice and play their games. The gymnasium in the new Gwin clubhouse is considerably longer than the one here.

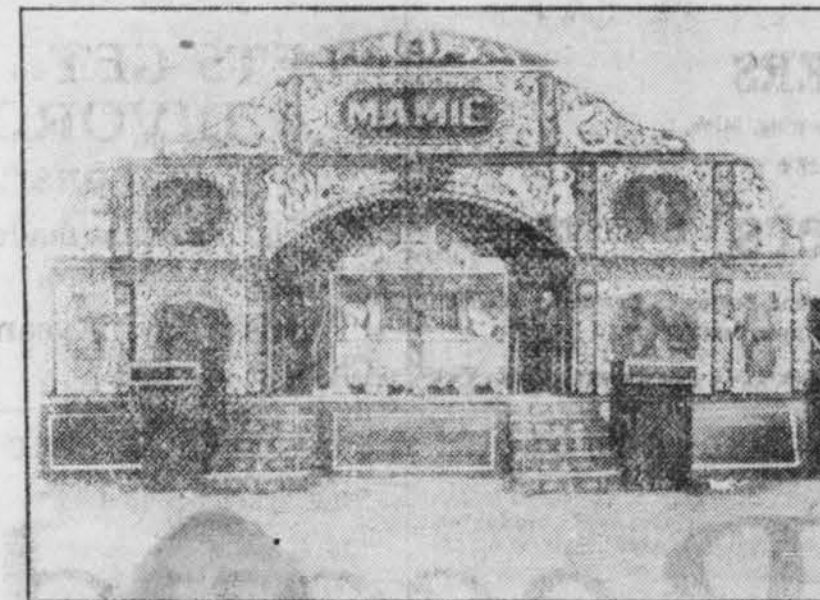

NEGAUNEE WINS CHAMPIONSHIP

Clinched Hold on First Place in Marquette-Iron County League Yesterday by Defeating Marquette 2 to 1, in a Brilliantly Played Pitcher's Battle.

Rosevear Twirled in a Masterly Fashion and Divette, for Marquette, Was a Puzzle, Except in Eighth and Ninth Innings, When Negaunee Got to Him.

Rosevear out-pitched Divette and Negaunee won the baseball game yesterday afternoon that clinches the championship of the Marquette-Iron county league. The score was 2 to 1, and the game was one of the most brilliantly played that has been seen on the local grounds this season. The game was fairly called a pitcher's battle, Divette, for Marquette, being invincible up to the eighth inning, while Rosevear was a mystery to all the opposing batsmen except Cy Young, who poked a double and a triple, scoring Marquette's only run.

The game was witnessed by a large crowd for a week day and anyone who was there got his money's worth, even though Marquette lost. Nearly all of the batted balls went to the infield, and the defensive work of both teams was excellent. Cullis let Riopelle's hot grounder go through him in the fourth after the ball and then letting it go by throwing Young a little off his stride, but the fumble did not prove costly. In the ninth, Richardson did not let Elmore's hit cleanly, allowing Loell to score the winning run, when he could have been held at third.

In spite of the intense rivalry between the two teams, the game was free from wounding and umpire Harris gave excellent satisfaction, both in the judgment of balls and strikes and his decisions on the bases. He deserves more than ordinary credit for getting away with the game alone, and not making one really bad decision. The only trouble of the game occurred at the close of the first half of the eighth inning, when Cullis and Day bumped into each other at the plate, and were mixing things up pretty lively when separated by the police.

WON A SWEEPING VICTORY AT POLLS

Osborn Carried Dick Fletcher's Home County and Kelley's Native District.

The latest election returns, with only thirty-five scattering precincts missing, show that Chase S. Osborn for governor and Chas. E. Townsend for senator have won an even more sweeping victory than the early returns indicated. One of the features of the election was the defeat of Dick Fletcher for the control of Bay county. Osborn carried the county, although it had been Fletcher's boast that he carried it in his pocket for delivery to Kelley.

Mr. Osborn's run was a surprise to even his most enthusiastic supporters. He got the city vote, which had been conceded to him in large measure, outside of Grand Rapids, Musseleman's home city, but he also swept the country districts and got an even break there, even carrying the Fourth congressional district, in which Mr. Kelley was born and raised. He also carried Isabella county, where Mr. Kelley made his home for years.

The plurality of Osborn for governor is approximately 34,000 over Kelley and Musseleman, while Townsend has won out over Senator Burrows by about 40,000. With thirty-five precincts missing, the vote on governor stands: Osborn, 81,000; Kelley, 47,823; Musseleman, 45,480. Osborn's plurality, 33,180. Townsend received 37,355 votes to Burrows, 59,416, a majority of 37,939. Outside of Kent county, Musseleman's best run was in the Eleventh district, which he carried by a big plurality. This was one of the strongest Warren districts in the primary two years ago.

With the vote practically complete, it is seen that the vote in the state is far below what had been anticipated. In the primary two years ago, an even 200,000 votes were polled on governor with a very light vote in the upper peninsula and in Wayne county. Because of Mr. Osborn's candidacy a heavy vote was expected in the Twelfth district this fall, and the combination of a local and state primary was expected to bring out the vote in Detroit.

While the upper peninsula did fairly well, the size of the vote in Wayne county was a disappointment and in many other parts of the state the vote was lighter than had been anticipated. It is doubtful now if the total vote will come up to the 200,000 mark, set at the primaries two years ago.
