Ruling Made by Chairman Burrows of the Investigating Committee Is Hailed as a Material Advantage by the Friends of the Illinois Statesman,

What Is Termed as Hearsay Evidence Is Barred from the Hearing-Legislator White's Examination Is Finished, and Today Beckemeyer Will Be a Witness.

Chicago, Sept. 27.-The direct and cross-examination of State Representative Charles A. White, the principal witness in support of the charges that the election of Senator Wm. Lorimer was procured by corrupt methods, were completed today before the senatorial investigating committee.

Senator Burrows, chairman of the committee, gave a ruling barring what was termed as hearsay evidence. ruling was hailed as a material advautage by the friends of Lorimer and marked the completion of exhaustive arguments.

The ruling was made specifically upon the right of White to relate conversations which he declared he had had with Representative Joseph S. Clark, of Vandalia, in which White said that Clark had admitted that he was bribed to vote for Lorimer. Later the ruling was inroked to bar a manuscript story of White's alleged experiences in the last ssembly and which story detailed his assertions of bribery. Both sides asked leave to recall White later. This was
