There has been a large advance sale of tickets, and the program published yesterday, together with the well known accomplishments of Misses Tucker and Ford, assure an evening of rare enjoyment and edification to lovers of music.

Fight Pictures Friday—The Bijou theatre is the first local play house to show authentic pictures of the Jeffries-Johnson fight. Manager Dorsey has secured the rights to the films and they will be shown Friday afternoon and evening. A continuous performance will be given from 1 o'clock in the afternoon until 11 at night. The films show clearly every move of the big fight, in addition to training camp scenes, views about the arena at Reno, etc. A lecturer explains the pictures as they are shown and carries the auditor along as though he were at the ringside itself.

Porcupine on Ohio Street—As Chas Young was going to work yesterday morning at 5 o'clock, he saw a porcupine on East Ohio street, near the corner of Front street. The animal was poking along at its customary gait and apparently was just as much at home as in the midst of a forest. Where the beast came from or went to is not known. A porcupine in the heart of the residence district of a city of 12,000 is an unusual sight—nearly on a par with some of those many bear stories that come out of Duluth.

Mack Goes to Detroit—"Bert" Mack, one of the mainstays of the Marquette baseball team the past two seasons, left this morning for his home at Detroit. He will spend the winter there. Mr. Mack said last night that he intends to return here next spring, to resume his place on the team. This will be good news to the fans, for the player is not only popular both on and off the diamond, but he is one of the very best third basemen ever to wear a Marquette uniform. He is an excellent fielder and a heady and reliable batter. More than one game has been won for Marquette by Mack's timely clouting.

Automobiles Going Badly—Owners of automobiles in Marquette are making general complaint that their machines are not working properly and the garages have been unusually busy the past few days. Poor quality of gasoline is commonly believed to be the reason for the trouble. All have the same complaint that the engines do not work properly and do not generate the usual amount of power, making it necessary to go up the hills on the low gear. Gasoline testing 72 is the standard for automobiles, and it is generally believed that the article being sold here at present is considerably below that standard. S. A. Williams has ordered several barrels of a new motor fuel, called Energene, which will be experimented with by local automobilists.

JEWISH NEW YEAR. Oct. 3 Will Be Observed by Hebrews in All Parts of the World.

Rosh Hashanah, or the Jewish New Year's day, will be observed next week by orthodox Hebrews in all parts of the world. The day falls on Monday, Oct. 3, and marks the beginning of the 5671st year of the Jewish calendar. The Jewish festival of Yom Kippur, or day of atonement, which is the holiest day in the Jewish year, will be Oct. 13. The Feast of Tabernacles, another great Jewish festival, will be observed Oct. 18. It originally lasted for eight days.

The Jewish New Year is a solemn, but not a mournful, occasion, and on that day, in obedience to the scriptural precept, the shofar or ram's horn is sounded in the synagogues to indicate to the Israelite that a new period of time is beginning. Yom Kippur, or the day of atonement is intended to complete and crown the work of the penitential season, and is spent in prayer and meditation in an effort to commune with God and attain a reformed life. The Feast of the Tabernacles is, in some respects analogous to the Thanksgiving season. It is a time for thanking God for the bounties of the season, which have just been gathered.

FOOTBALL SEASON OPENS SATURDAY

Marquette and Negaunee High School Elevens to Meet at the Fair Grounds.

The new football rules will be given their first demonstration in Marquette this week Saturday, when a game between teams representing the Marquette and Negaunee High schools will be played at the fair grounds. As last year, an athletic arrangement has been entered into between the Marquette, Ishpeming and Negaunee High schools, whereby each team will play two games with every other, one at home and one away from home. The same general arrangement will be carried out in basketball and baseball. The football schedule will be as follows: Oct. 1—Negaunee at Marquette. Oct. 8—Marquette at Ishpeming. Oct. 15—Ishpeming at Negaunee. Oct. 22—Marquette at Negaunee. Oct. 29—Ishpeming at Marquette. Nov. 5—Negaunee at Ishpeming. From fifteen to twenty candidates for the Marquette eleven have been getting out nightly for practice, and under the

teaching of B. E. Brown, one of the high school instructors, have already become familiar with the new rules and are developing speed and team work. The Marquette squad is very light, but lack of weight is not so serious a handicap as in the close formation style of football, and by diligent practice the team should be able to make a creditable record. No attempt has been made as yet to assign the candidates to positions or to name the line-up of the team, and the make-up of the eleven will probably not be announced before Friday night or Saturday. The game will be called at 3 o'clock.

The new rules, under which football is being played this fall, differ from those formerly in force in the following respects: Pushing or pulling runner after the ball is prohibited. Interlocked interference is no longer allowed. Forward pass may go over any part of the line.

Crawling by a runner fairly downed is prohibited. Center may not put ball in play by kicking it forward. Kicked ball cannot be recovered by scrimmage, unless fumbled. Forward passes of more than twenty yards beyond scrimmage are prohibited. Players taken out of game up to the last quarter may re-enter the game once. Kicks or forward passes from scrimmage formation close to the line not al-

lowed. Blocking the end and others on their way down the field on kicks or forward passes prohibited. One attacking player may be in motion obliquely, as well as directly, toward his own goal before the ball is snapped. Players (except guards) may advance the ball without its being first handled by quarterback, and through any part of the line.

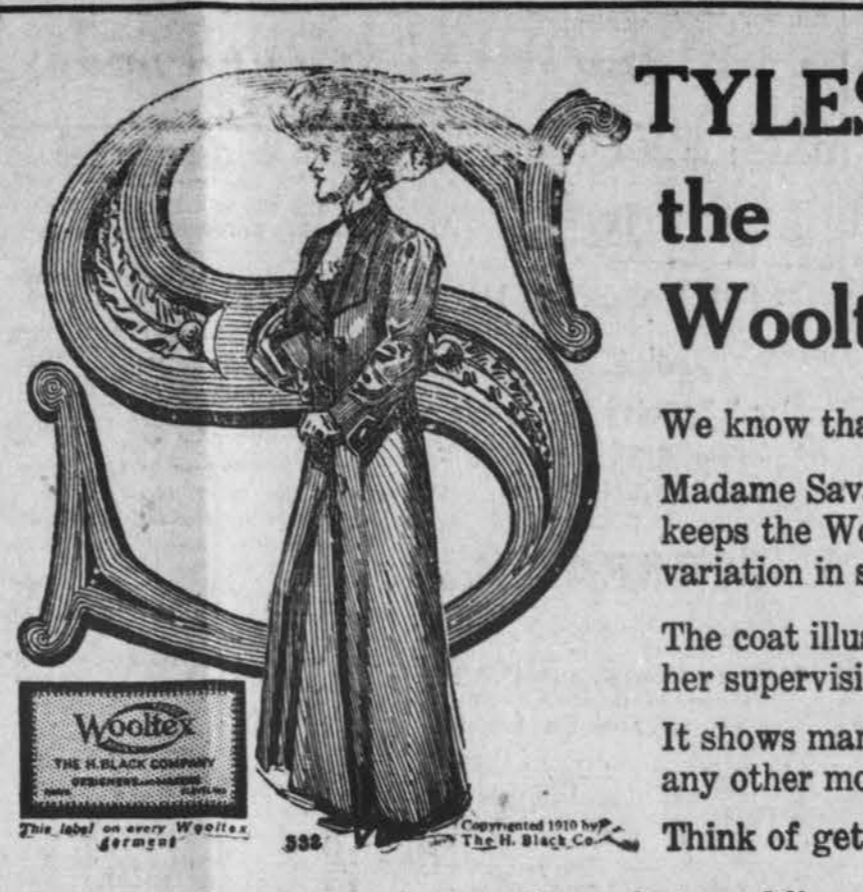

REV. C. L. ADAMS GOES TO CALUMET

Popular Ishpeming Clergyman to Be Transferred to Copper Country Metropolis.

Rev. C. L. Adams, pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal church, who has been in attendance at the Detroit conference the past ten days, yesterday wired Mrs. Adams that he is to be transferred to Calumet, and that Rev. C. S. Robinson, of Saginaw, will succeed him as pastor of the Ishpeming church.

The announcement of Rev. Adams' removal from the Ishpeming parish to Calumet will be both a surprise and a disappointment to his parishioners, as it was generally thought that he would be returned to this city. At a meeting of the congregation, held a short time before he left for Detroit, he was invited to return by a unanimous vote. Rev. Adams is expected home tomorrow at midnight, and it is believed that he will preach his farewell sermon next Sunday.

Rev. Robinson, who will succeed him, is said to be one of the ablest pastors in the conference, but he is known to only a few members of the Ishpeming congregation. He has been pastor of the West Branch church, in the Saginaw district, for the past four years.

Rev. Adams has been pastor of the Ishpeming church for the past four years, having come to this city from the lower peninsula. During the time he has been here he has made many friends, who will regret his departure. He is an effective worker and during the past four years the debt on the Ishpeming church has been greatly reduced. It is expected that Rev. Robinson will arrive in the city early next week.

MUCH INTEREST IN GYMNASIUM WORK

Season of 1910-11 at Y. M. C. A. Has Had Satisfactory Start.

The opening week of the gymnasium class work of the Young Men's Christian association has been a most satisfactory one. An increasing interest is being shown by the members, and classes are filling up rapidly, so that prospects are bright for an enthusiastic winter indoor season.

The Senior Leaders' corps was organized Saturday night, and Martin Paulson was appointed captain, with the following members enrolled: Wm. Rose, Harold Shaddick, Arthur Ericson, John Erickson and Chas. Johnson. The corps will meet Monday nights, at 7:15, for a special class in advanced gymnastics and class leadership. It was decided to organize the senior class into four sections, with two members of the leaders' corps assigned to each section, these leaders to be responsible for the presence and the work done by the members of their corps.

Intersquad competitions will be held once a month. Points will be given for apparatus work, games and attendance at classes. The competitions will include class calisthenics, gymnastics and games. The squad scoring the highest number of points during the month will hold a championship banner for a month and at the end of the year each member of the squad that has won the banner the greatest number of times will have his name inscribed on it, and it will be hung in the lobby of the Y. M. C. A.

The gymnasium classes are now working for the success of the opening day on Oct. 21st, when an exhibition of the work will be given. The junior and intermediate boys will hold a reception for their parents in the afternoon, from 4 to 6 o'clock, when a program of class drills and games will be run off in the gymnasium. A swimming exhibition will also be given by the boys. No boys will be allowed in the building after 6 o'clock. The senior exhibition will be given in the evening.

Much interest is being shown in the business men's class, and the attendance is increasing with each session. Many men are interested in the installation of the hand-ball court, and this game has promise of being popular with the businessmen during the winter. The businessmen's class meets every Tuesday and Friday afternoons from 5 to 6 o'clock.

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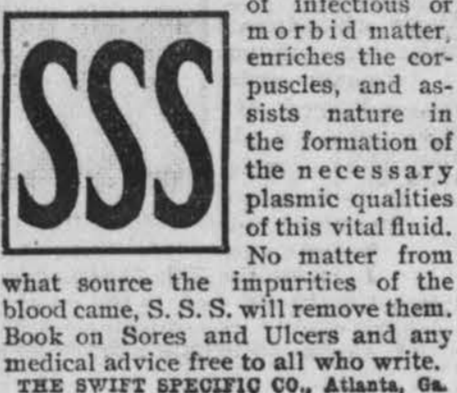

TEACH THE BOYS USE OF RIFLES

Capt. Percy Patterson, of Michigan National Guard, Tells Why Young America Should Be Taught to Handle and Shoot Fire-arms in Times of Peace.

Expresses Himself as Highly Pleased With Town and Country Clubhouse, Which He Says Is "Just About the Best of Anything in This Part of Country."

Visitors who came to Marquette this week on account of the Town and Country club shooting tournament expressed themselves as delighted with the reception and entertainment they have received. Many expressed surprise and admiration when they inspected the beautiful clubhouse, with its delightful location and surrounding grounds.

"This clubhouse is just about the best of anything I have seen in this part of the country," said Captain Percy Patterson, of Sault Ste. Marie, and an active member of the Michigan National guard, last evening. "The building is well adapted to the needs of a social and out of doors club. Its location is ideal and the grounds around it should make it a most popular resort, both summer and winter. It seems to me that the clubhouse should be especially popular as a place for giving small and large social dinners, such as are given in many similar institutions in and surrounding Detroit. It is an ideal place for bachelor spreads, family dinners, and almost any kind of a small social affair. Such a club as this is a source of great enjoyment to the members, and a fine thing for the city."

"The Town and Country club is to be congratulated on the great success of their first shoot. The visiting trap shooters and rifle men have enjoyed themselves immensely and will be glad to come again when they have opportunity. The weather was not all that could have been desired, but the wind of yesterday gave the shooters some new and valuable experience, though it kept the scores down. Of course, I am particularly interested in rifle shooting and believe that boys everywhere should be given instruction in handling and shooting fire arms."

"What reasons are there why, in your

opinion, boys the country over should be taught to shoot and shoot well?" Captain Patterson was asked.

Rifle Practice for Boys.
"That question is often asked me," said the captain, "and I am always glad to answer it. The United States war department has a bureau devoted to the promotion of rifle practice among boys and young men, and it urges rifle practice as a part of the public school curriculum. To many persons such a proposition looks absurd, but I am an ardent supporter of the idea."

"Nearly every thoughtful person will admit that there is still danger that this country will some time be plunged unexpectedly into another war, possibly with a first or second rate power, Japan, Germany or England, for instance. As long as that danger remains, the country should be prepared for war. The inefficiency of our fighting force was shown at the opening of the war with Spain. There were not enough capable officers in the country to direct the troops and it was necessary to give men commissions who knew no more of the science of war than did the men in charge of whom they were placed."

"The war with Spain resulted in the state militia being organized into a national guard, and the state troops are far more efficient today than they were then. But even now, if this country should go to war with a first rate power, a million men would be needed at once. There are now 100,000 in the national guard and 60,000 in the regular army; the rest would have to be recruited from the young men of the country."

"For this reason the government is urging that all young men should learn to use fire arms, particularly rifles. With the improvements in fighting machinery there is more science in war than ever before. Most of the fighting between armies today would be at a range of a half mile or more. To use a gun effectively at that distance requires practice and there would be no time to drill recruits after war had been declared. The boys of this country must know how to use and shoot a rifle in order for this country to have an efficient army in time of war, and after it is known that war is to come, there will be no time to drill men in the use of fire arms."

Boy Scout Movement.
"The Boy Scout movement, originated by Ernest Thompson Seton a few years ago, is a big step in the right direction. Boys' clubs are being organized all over the country, in which the members are taught some of the simple things about camp and out of door life. They learn how to find dry wood and to start a fire in wet weather; how to cook a meal in the woods; how to make themselves comfortable when compelled to spend a night in the open; how to determine the points of the compass, and wood lore generally. All this instruction is making for a more efficient volunteer mili-

tary service, as well as being a fine thing for the boys themselves. These clubs are growing in number and size all the time, and the day is not far distant when the boys of every community will be organized to learn how to live in and enjoy the great out of doors."

REV. MAYWOOD TO LEAVE CITY.

Highly Respected Pastor Transferred to Large Jackson Church.

Officers of the First Methodist church yesterday received the unwelcome though not unexpected news that Rev. Ames A. Maywood had been transferred by the Detroit conference to the First Methodist church of Jackson, one of the largest churches in the Michigan conference. Rev. Joseph Dutton, of Greenville, Mich., has been assigned to the Marquette charge.

Rev. Maywood has been pastor of the Marquette Methodist church for six years, an unusually long time for a minister of that denomination to be kept in one place. During that time he has won the respect and love of Marquette people, irrespective of church affiliation, in a degree seldom equalled by a man in any profession. He is not only an eloquent preacher with a powerful and soul bettering message, but a splendid example of twentieth century Christian manhood, and the entire city will be the loser by his being transferred into another and larger field.

His successor, Rev. Dutton, is unknown to Marquette people, but he comes well recommended. He is a man thirty-five years of age, married, and has several small children. He will probably arrive in Marquette this week and preach here Sunday.
