Death Occurred Suddenly. The senator died at 7:30 o'clock last night while one of his attending physicians, Dr. E. M. Van Patten, was ex-

Senator Dolfiver had so far recevered his strength as to be able to walk about the lawn. He had been up all day and in the evening entered the sitting room tor his daily consultation with his phy sicians. The senator informed Dr. Van Patten that he was feeling much improved, and that he believed he had recovered his normal strength. Dr. Van Patten cantioned him about becoming tco arxious to again resume his work. and then began an examination of ! is

The senator was sitting in a large Morris chair when the physician beganthe examination. While making the examination, the ohysician asked Mr. Dolliver how he was feeling, "I'm really feeling better than at any time since my recent sickness, but I suppose the wolves will be set howling about my successor," the senator laughed. He had frequently expressed in a humorous manner his opinion of having people pick a successor while he was yet alive.

Heart Stops Beating. The physician continued his work with the stethoscope, counting the beats of the senator's heart out loud. frequently was interrupted by Mr. Dolliver with the declaration that he

was unable to hear his own heart. When the physician had counted fourteen beats, he informed the senator, "That's good," replied Mr. Dolliver. "The most I've been able to count is

The physician continued the examination and suddenly noticed that the heart beats had ceased. He shook the ties to fix the number of candidates to stethoscope, believing it defective. Again applying the instrument, he discovered the party in each senatorial district of that the heart had ceased beating entire-Upon looking in the senator's face, he discovered that death had overtaken him. He had died without a struggle and without pain.

No one with the exception of the phy sicians were in the room at the time. Mrs. Dolliver was outside of the door and was on the point of entering when death overtook her husband. It was learned later that a consultation of physicians had been held a week ago and that they had discovered the senator was in a dangerous condition. Paris, Monday, Oct. 17 .- There was a terrific explosion of a bomb at 1:30 clock this morning outside the residence of Director Massard, of the Nationalist newspaper Patrie, in the boulevard Perie, next door to the home of Sarah Bernhardt, the actress. No casualties resulted. Securely fixed to Massard's door was a paper having written upon it: "First warning from the strikers." Considerable property damage resulted from the explosion.



#### THE PEANUT INDUSTRY.

A peanut is a very small thing, but annual crop of 5,000,000 bushels takes a pretty big item. Peanuts are rown more or less in all the southern states, the bulk of the supply coming from Virginia, North Carolina and

Down south they are not known as eanuts, but are called "goobers" or inders." The peanut has more uses than any other plant that is grown i this country. If you grind the nut yo get a good flour, from which excellent iscuits can be made. By squeezing the outs you obtain an oil which resemble olive oil, and is used in the manufacture of some kinds of chocolate.

Georgia housewives make rich pastry out of pounded peanuts, the confectioner has added peanut candy to his list of dainties, and, during the Christmas season peanut dolls may be seen in the shop windows.

The vines make good fodder for eattle, and after the crop has been gathered, the hogs are put in the field and oon fatten on what is left.

The demand for peanuts has doubled within the last five years, and mor growers are going into the business The plant is a prolific and hardy one and requires no more attention than does a crop of potatoes.
