Their Failure to See Each Other Is Considered by Observers to Constitute the Most Significant Feature of the President's Two Days' Stay in New York City.

Mr. Roosevelt Is at Oyster Bay, Only 33 Miles Distant, Yet as Far as Known No Communication Has Passed Between Them -This Sets Tonges a-Wagging.

New York, Oct. 19.-President Taft brought his New York visit to a close tonight, and is due to return to the White House early tomorrow. His last day in this city was given over to political conferences, the situations in New York state and Ohio sharing almost equally in the interest displayed by the president as to present day conditions

and the election day prospects. To observers, prohably the most sig nificant feature of the president's stay here is the fact that Colonel Roosevelt has been at Oyster Bay-only thirtythree miles from New York-and so far as known no communication whatever has passed between him and Mr./Taft. The fact that no steps were taken by the friends of the president and the col-onel to bring about a meeting under the

opportunities offered by the president's presence in New York seems to indicate that further interviews between the two in the near future are most improbable

### Dinner to the Mayor of Tokio.



Bids for constructing the rip rap foundation for the extension of the Marquette breakwater were opened at the office of United States Engineer Graham D. Fitch in Duluth at noon yesterday, and the lowest hidder proved to Francis L. MeDonald, of Duluth, whose price was eighty-four cents per ton for furnishing the rock in place. The bids ranged from eighty-four cents to \$1.99% per ton, the government's estimate being \$1.50 per ton. Powell & Mitchell of this city were among the bidders, their figure on the job being

\$1.34 per ton. The plans on which the bids were submitted call for placing approximately \$6,000 tons of trap rock along the botquarry to the place designated, as well as to put it in place. 


