

ALLEGHANY ON MAIDEN TRIP. New Steamer of the Anchor Line Arrives

in Portage Lake.

The new steamer Alleghany of the Auchor line, arrived in Portage lake Satur-oay on her madien trip. The Alleghany is not a monster freighter, like the big ore and grain carriers. She is only 380 feet long, but is substantially built and is supplied with every convenience. On her upper deck are small hoisting engines which do the heavy work of the deckhands in hauling lines. 



POTATOES MENACED.

Tubers Attacked by Germ Disease in Various Parts of Country.

Every schoolboy is familiar with the "eyes" of the homely white potato, which appears on the average American's ningham, 25. table in some form at almost every meal, but many of the oldest and most experienced farmers will look puzzled 25; Roberson, 10; Hatch, 25; L. Foard, 25; Quarters, 15; B. Zerbel, 45. when they read Uncle Sam's latest bulletin on the "Blackleg of the Irish Po-

"Blackleg" is a bacterial potato disease on the stems of the potato, originating in Europe, where in Germany it was called "black stem" or "black shank." Blackleg has been accepted as the English translation of the German name, even though it does not fit in with the anatomy of the vegetable which is such a great money-maker in many sections of the United States.

Three and a half million acres o land are planted to Irish potatoes this country, with an average yield of about 106 bushels to the acre, or total production of nearly 400,000,000 bushels, with the enormous value of more than \$200,000,000. With such tremendous farm interests at stake, the new disease is not to be considered lightly, say the experts. Reports to the office of experiment stations in the agricultural department show that it is becoming widely distributed throughout much of the potato-growing areas of the United States. In describing the disease, Prof. W. J. Morse of the offlice of

experiment stations, says: Blackleg probably was introduced into Canada from England and from there into the United States. It occurs, to some extent at least, over a considerable area of the potato-growing. sections in the eastern United States and Canada. A similar disease is also found in England, Germany, France and

The attacked plants are usually unthrifty, light green in color, or even yellow, and undersized. The branches and leaves have a tendency to grow upward, forming a rather compact top. The most characteristic symptom is the inky discoloration of the stem at or below the surface of the ground.
