



## WHY CATS LAND ON THEIR FEET.

A scientist has constructed an ingenious model, says the London Globe, to show why a cat in falling invariably alights on its feet. This model, roughly speaking, consists of a cardboard cyliner wherein are stuck four rods to serve for legs, together with a tail devised on similar principles. The object of the experiment is to show that a feline's peculiar faculty depends on the rotation of its tail with sufficient vigor. This faculty is specially developed by climb-ing and leaping anmals such as members of the cat tribe, monkeys, squirrels, rats and most lemurs. As already stated, the tail plays an important part in the turning process. According to the investigator all tree inhabiting monkeys have long tails, and there is not the slightest doubt that these tails are of great aid to all climbers in enabling them to turn in the air. The tail also serves as a balancer, as evidence in the case of a squirrel, which may be seen walking along a tightly-stretched wire or string, swinging its tail from side to sde much after the manner of a tightrope walker balancing himself with
