Hemans' Club Meeting—A meeting of the Hemans club will be held at the city hall this evening. As this will be the last meeting before election it is especially desired that a full representation of the membership be present, as plans for getting out a full vote on election day will be perfected.
Attractions Cancelled—Within the last few days, Manager Koepeke, of the opera house, has received notice of the cancellation of Miffred Holland's engagement here, booked for the latter part of this month, and also that of D'Urban's band. Miss Holland is ill and has had to cancel all her dates, while poor business is given as the reason for cancelling the dates booked for D'Urban's band. Roberts, of Ishpeming, candidate for representative to the legislature, and James Hoogerhyde, state organizer of the party, and others. Any recognized speaker of any other political faith is invited to attend the meeting and debate the issues of the day with the Socialist speakers. The issues of the day advocated by the Socialists in this campaign are the passage of a law providing for an eight-hour working day; an employers' liability law; the direct nomination and election of mining inspectors, and the repeal of all conspiracy laws that in any way abridge the rights of organized labor.
New Fuel Superintendent—G. C. Dow arrived in the city yesterday from Boyne City and will succeed R. H. Jenney as fuel superintendent for the Lake Superior Iron & Chemical company, Mr. Jenney having recently handed in his resignation to take effect Nov. 15. MUCH COMMENTED UPON.
Communication Concerning Price of Meats Generally Discussed.
"A Meat Eater's" communication in The Mining Journal yesterday, quoting prices of meats as advertised by the Duluth Provision company in the Duluth News Tribune of last Saturday, has aroused general discussion of the meat question here. The prices quoted by the Duluth firm were much lower than are charged by local dealers and Mr. Meat Eater further claimed that prices here were higher than in Negaunee, in which opinion he is upheld by others. Local dealers approached yesterday stated that the prices quoted must be for inferior goods, as they have to pay more for the quality of meats they handle than the selling prices advertised by the Duluth firm. "Marquette people would not buy such meats as the Duluth company is selling at these prices," declared one retailer.
Several citizens expressed the opinion yesterday that the packers are largely to blame for the higher prices in Marquette and that carelessness of the retailers in giving credit to customers also has a bearing on the situation. "There is pretty strong evidence that the people of Marquette are paying more for meats than residents of other nearby cities," said one observing citizen, "and the whys and wherefores should be ferreted out. It is generally believed that none of the Marquette retailers are getting fabulously rich, but, nevertheless, there is something wrong somewhere. It is the duty of the retailers to tell us where the 'nigger in the woodpile' is. Are the packers charging Marquette retailers more than they charge retailers in other cities? Are those who pay for their meat also paying for that sold to persons who do not pay their bills? Are the local retailers making an exorbitant profit? Live cattle are selling in Chicago only one cent per pound, or about 20 per cent, higher than ten years ago, while all kinds of beef are from 50 to 100 per cent higher than then. There is something wrong somewhere, and the public wants to know where it is."

RESIGNATION ACCEPTED.
Presbyterian Church Wishes Rev. J. M. Rogers God Speed in New Work.
At a congregational meeting of the Presbyterian church held last evening, the members voted to accede to Rev. J. M. Rogers' request to unite with him in asking that the presbytery dissolve his relation as pastor of the Marquette church. As previously announced, Mr. Rogers has been appointed superintendent of missions in the upper peninsula by the state Presbyterian synod. The request to be released from the pastorate of the Marquette church will be presented at a meeting of the presbytery in Iron Mountain today, and it will undoubtedly be accepted.
Rev. Mr. Rogers has been pastor of the Marquette congregation for eleven years and during that time he has been a power for good in the community. He expects to take up his new work Dec. 1 and until that time will continue to fill the local pulpit, if no other pastor is secured. The congregation unanimously adopted the following resolutions, drafted by a committee composed of W. S. Hill, B. W. Wright and H. C. Davis:
"Whereas, Our pastor has been appointed by the synod to a higher position and a broader field for work in the Master's service, and
"Whereas, It seems to be for the advancement of the interests of the Presbyterian church of the upper peninsula that we allow him to accept that advanced work, therefore,
"Resolved, That we accept his resignation and hereby join with him in requesting the presbytery to dissolve the relation of pastor and congregation; and be it further
