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





What the Human Bloodshed Will Be, Now That Thousands of Men Are About to Take Up the Annual Chase of Deer, Is Awaited With Apprehension.

Almost a Score of Casualties Have Marked the Fall Season in the Woods of Upper Michigan Up to This Time, and Six of These Have Resulted Fatally,

St. Ignace, Nov. 9 .- Although the twenty-day period during which deer are legal game does not open until to-morrow, and although it is during that period that the greater number of casualities take place each year, the fall hunting season in Upper Michigan has already been productive of a shocking array of accidents. Nearly a score of casualties have been recorded, and six of these have resulted fatally. Now that an army of ten thousand hunters is about to take up the chase of big game, most of its members armed with high-powered guns that shoot a mile

or more and a great many of its members men of little experience in woodcraft, what the full toll in bloodshed will be is something that is awaited with grave apprehension. There is little question that the present list of accilents will be materially increased. The casualities to date are as follows:

Roster of the Dead.

Those who have died: Alphonse Ethier, a boy; Perronville, Delta county; shot himself while in act of stepping over a log; succumed to ockjaw.

John Garp, married; Crystal Falls; killed while alone in the woods by the lischarge of his rifle.

John Headman, a boy; Pequaming, Baraga county; killed by a stray bullet while hunting partridges. Eli Peltola, married; Crystal Falls; fatally wounded when his hunting dog leaped against and discharged Peltola's


