TRADERS IN STOCKS

New York, Nov. 16 .- The most effective interest in the movement of the prices of stocks today was the early absence of any aggressive operations for an advance. The traders watched for the appearance of these orders in United States Steel, Union Pacific and Reading. They sold these stocks and ment by concentrated dealings in the three stocks. The reappearance of the buying in Steel and Union Pacific in the final hour pulled the prices up again and left them higher than last night.

The general decline in the prices of meat came in for much attention today, because of its direct bearing on the mon ey market and its broader influence on wages and the public unrest as implied by the election results. In a more restricted financial sense the high prices are held largely responsible for the great expansion of the banking credits of the interior banks. Wheat Market Weakens.

Arsenic Coloring in Excess of One Part 700,000 Will Constitute Adulteration

Washington, Nov. 16 .- Additiona precases arising under the pure food and drugs act have been approved and established by Secretary of the Treasury MacVeagh as follows, the rulings including Boston, where a labora ings including Boston, where a labora tory of the department of agriculture is maintained. In all cases covering goods to be adulterated, where repacking is practicable and will produce a satisfactory article, the chiefs of laboratories have authority to report such matters direct to the collector of customs and the repacked material shall be reexamined to ascertain whether the articles are properly cleaned, and if so, he shall make a representation based on this fact to the collector. When products ordinarily used as foods are brought in for technical purposes and the latter fact is not developed until the time of hearing, the chief of laboratory shall have authority to report such matters direct to the collector for the lat-

ter's action. Colors brought in for food purposes part in seven hundred thousand shall be reported as adulterated. Products la-belled as having an ingredient removed when, as a matter of fact, such ingredient has not been completely removed, for example, when coffee is labelled as being "caffeine free" when examination shows that the caffeine has not been removed, shall be reported as misbrand-

"The board of education has accepted the plans for medical inspection and we expect to inaugurate the same beginning with the week of Nov. 21. The following will be the schedule for the present: Drs. Turner and Scott, East Houghton; Drs. Courad and Betteys, West Houghton; Drs. Farrand, Jackson and Harkness, Central; Dr. Parisan, Huron. The physicians will change off and visit each building at least once each week, on Wednesday if possible. They are to visit each room and examine in a cursory manner all pupils pointed out by the teacher. They will aim to minimize the danger from contagious diseases by excluding promptly all who are infected or have been exposed; to detect other diseases and ailments other than communicable diseases, and to supervise the detection of all defects of sight and hearing. In the case of eye and ear defects the teacher will make all tests.

"It will be wise for the teachers in the lower grades especially to be present when the physician examines the children, so that the element of fear will be eliminated. Principals should accompany the physician on the first They should also report the progress of the work in all its phases, but more especially that part pertaining to the eye and ear tests. These tests should be made one at a time."

The scrap is being sent north in 700 ton lots, and three years will be required to ship it all. Each of the loconotives left by the French yields between \$400 and \$600 worth of copper alone. The commission will save old steel rails on the isthmus to be used as re-enforcement in the concrete work and as telephone and telegraph poles.

Some of the old French junk has been found in extraordinary places. Dredges have been discovered almost buried completely in sand, hundreds of feet away from any body of water and overgrown with dense tropical vegetation. Apparently they had been carried away from the river bed by high water or the river itself has shifted its course. Several of these buried dredges were in a fairly good state of preservation and are now doing work on the isthmus.-Balti-



To offset this cut retailers asserted

"A representative of a leading packing house reported the price of one brand of bacon at 281/2 cents a pound, or 11/2 lower than two weeks ago, and said that a proportionate reduction had been made in wholesale prices of all smoked and cured meats. This as denied by retaileris, who asserted that fancy bacon was still as difficult to obtain as ever.

"Market quotations on live hogs during the day were 75 cents to 85 cents a hundred pounds lower than on Nov. 1, cattle were 40 to 65 cents lower, and lambs 25 cents to 50 cents lower, Wholesale prices of fresh pork products were tens, Fur Contains at the beginning of the month while dressed beef cuts were ½ cent a pound lower and dressed mutton was unhanged to 11/2 cents lower.

Miss Emily S. Kane died at St. Luke's hospital Tuesday night at the age of seventy-seven.
