Reports From Mexico Are Generally of a Reassuring Nature Disturbed Districts.

State Department Takes Steps to Prevent American Neutrality From Being in Any Manner Violated-All Is Quite on the Rio Grande Border.

Eagle Pass, Texas, Nov. 23.-Torreon, Mexico, was captured by the revolutionists today, according to the employes of the federal telegraph company, who say that followers of Francisco I. Madero seized the city today and confiscated all the arms and ammunition they could find. Rumors of other actions by the rebels were numerous, but there seems to have been but little fighting today.

Previous clashes at Torreon seem to have been bloody. An American conductor arriving from there says that he counted twenty-one bodies of Mexican soldiers in the streets of Gomez Palacio, near Torreon. The revolutionists carried away their dead and wounded. A Mexican officer says that fifty-two federal troopers were killed at Gomez.

The Mexican somiers today raided the San Enrique ranch, which belongs to Madero, the rebel leader, who today declared himself the president of the provisional government of Mexico. Madero was not found on the ranch, but the soldiers captured nearly 300 horses col-

lected for rebel cavalry. It was reported tonight that desultory fighting was proceeding near Torreon, but there was no definite news as to Gen. For the first time since the revolutionary movement assumed definite form troops moved today along the United States side of the Rio Grande. On the Mexican side of the river everything is reported as trauquil. How far south the tranquility extends is unknown. The government has a cordon of 6,000 men patrolling the border. The border is also well guarded on the American side, a cordon of soldiers extending from Brownsville to Eagle Pass.

Lack Concerted Organization.

"The insurrectionists are entirely without concerted organization," was the statement Governor Diego Redo, of Sinaloa, made today. "The government will be able to cope with the outbreak successfuly as soon as the military forces can reach the scenes of the disor-

DISTRICT COURT OF APPEALS

FINDS AGAINST ABE RUEF. The decision was contained in forty-six pages written by the presiding judge, Judge Cooper, and it affirms the lower court on all points. Ruef was sentenced to fourteen years imprisonment, and is at liberty on bail. Ruef's attorneys were allowed forty days to prepare an appeal

Col. Clowry Has Given Up Office After Long and Distinguished Service.

New York, Nov. 23 .- Colonel Robert 2. Clowry, who resigned today as pres-dent, continues a director and a member of the executive committee of the Westrn Union Telegraph company. Theodore N. Vail, president of the American Telegraph and Telephone company, which controls the Western Union, was appointed to succeed Colonel Clowry as president.

On leaving the army he returned to his chosen work and he served continually until today, being promoted steadily until, in 1902, he was made president of the Western Union.






