

executive departments hardly seem worth while. And it is astonishing that under such circumstances interest in these comparatively small savings can be maintained. These savings can only be disappointing to the public who have such figures as \$300,000,000 in mind; and they cannot receive any popular credit, for they can only seem to be small triflings with great things. And yer they can only be produced by labor-ious, painstaking, and persistent methis and devotion.

When it is the fact that the entire ordinary expenditures of the government last year were less than \$660,000,-000 and when a great part of those expenditures is not reducible at all, as, for example, the interest on the debt, and the pensions, one can readily see that there probably is not very much more than \$300,000,000 gross left on which to save \$300,000,000. How, to effect a saving of \$300,000,000 when the whole expenditure amenable to any saving is \$300,000,000 is, of course, not easy. I appeal to the sense of proportion of congress and the American people; for it is very important to have these impressions corrected in order that there may be some encouragement given o those men scattered through the departments who want to bring about all he improvement possible."
