It is reported that influential Republicans are preparing to urge on Mr. Osborn that he make no attempt to remove Dick Fletcher from his office of state labor commissioner until the end of his term, which will occur next summer.

SOO ASKS RELIEF.

A delegation of Soo citizens has left for Washington to see what they can do to fend off the threatened suspension of operations of the Carbide works, the principal industry that is dependent for power on the Lake Superior power canal.

The residents of the Soo would like to have the regulations regarding the use of water changed. They are said to be unnecessary and to serve no good purpose, while they play hob at the Soo, at irregular intervals, by interfering with the steady operation of one of the town's largest employing industries and thus throwing large numbers of men out of work.

Annually the Soo people are having borne in on them the folly of the original projectors of the power canal in not going for their power to the rapids, where they had a chance to acquire all the existing rights at a cost much less than the expenditure on the canal project.

OSBORN SPRINGS SURPRISE. Mr. Osborn's announcement that he will not be a candidate for a second term as governor came as a complete surprise to the state.

There is much merit in the reasons that Mr. Osborn gives for his course. He has particularly in mind demonstrating to the legislature that he is absolutely disinterested, so that its members will attach more value to his recommendations than they would otherwise, being assured that he cannot possibly aim to serve any personal purposes.

But we have no doubt that even without this declaration Governor Osborn would have been successful in impressing on the legislature his disinterestedness and his devotion to a high sense of duty, just as he was successful in impressing it on the state in the primary campaign and in the campaign forerunning the November election, and that he would have found that body both willing and eager to back him in all desirable projects for changes in the state government.

Most people will find it difficult to believe that Mr. Osborn seriously contemplates retiring to private life on the conclusion of one term as governor of Michigan.

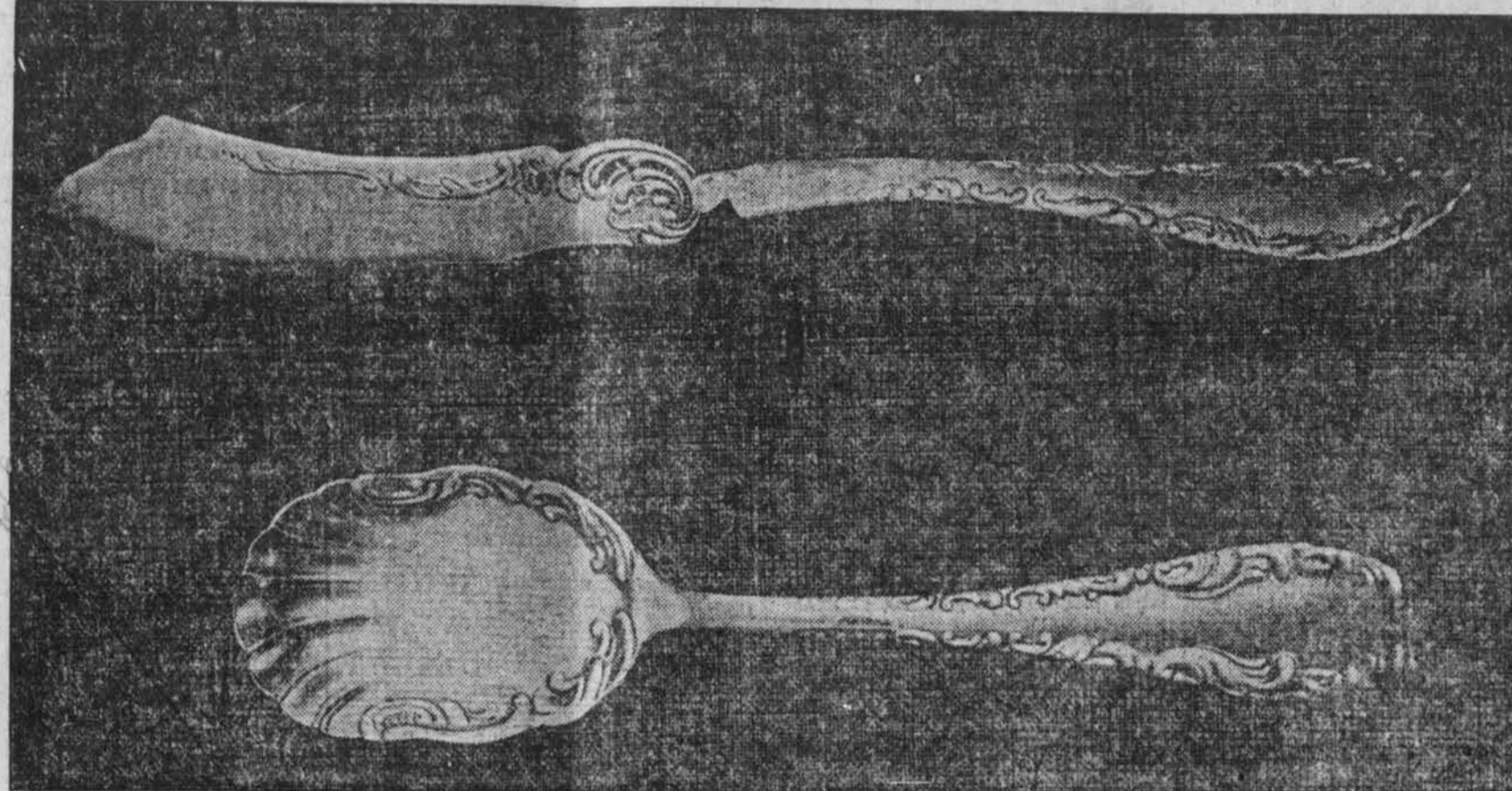

Indications last evening were that it would be slightly warmer today.

 \$399,000 for Marquette—According to a telegram received by The Mining Journal from Congressman H. O. Young yesterday, the river and harbor bill to be reported this week will contain an item of \$399,000 for the Marquette harbor, of which \$88,000 will be in cash and \$311,000 under a continuing contract which may be entered into immediately by the government upon the bill becoming a law. This appropriation will be used for extending the breakwater, contract for which has already been let to a Duluth firm.

 Baseball Fans Met at City Hall Last Night—Another Meet, Dec. 13.
 A few of the thirty-third degree baseball fans met at the city hall last evening for the purpose of discussing preliminary plans for the game in Marquette next season. There is strong sentiment that it is none too early to begin to lay the foundation for next season, by electing a board of directors and getting things under way. It was decided to call another public meeting next Tuesday night at the city hall, and a special effort will be made to get out a large attendance.
 The successes and shortcomings of the past season were informally discussed at the meeting last evening and a number of suggestions for next year were offered. It was the unanimous opinion that it was time to begin looking out for players and especially for a playing manager, who could be given full charge of the team and make the players practice constantly and consistently. Those in attendance also agreed that it would be more satisfactory to pay the players so much per game, and to pay them every Monday, than the division of net receipts plan followed last year. There was also discussion of the most available fourth team for the league, to take the place of Crystal Falls. Marquette fans would like to see Edwin Come in as the fourth team, but there is understood to be sentiment in favor of Escanaba at Ishpeming and Negaunee.

TWO AMENDMENTS WANTED.
 Otherwise, Brewers Are Said to be Satisfied With Present Liquor Law.
 A prominent member of the Michigan State Brewers' association says that while the matter of the legislature, at its coming session, amending the Warner-Cramton liquor act, has not been considered at any of the meetings, the prevailing sentiment so far as he observes, among those who have their money invested in the business, is for two amendments. One is to leave it to local governing powers to fix the opening and closing hours for barrooms. Those favoring such an amendment contend that if it is the desire of a majority of the people in a small town to have their bars closed at say 9 p. m., then let her own council so decree. If a large city is satisfied to have its barrooms do business until midnight, all right. The law as it now stands makes the closing hour for all barrooms in the state the same. The second amendment desired is to make it easier to transfer a license from one person to another. As the law now stands, it is regarded by those who would like a change to be so rigid as to sometimes work an injustice. Also, they allege it tends to create a landlords' trust. With the two exceptions the Warner-Cramton act is said to be satisfactory to the wets, according to prominent members of the association.

MOTION TO QUASH F. L. BALDWIN CASE

Validity of Complaint in Libel Suit Against Escanaba Editor Argued Yesterday.

The greater part of yesterday in circuit court was taken up with the arguments of the attorneys on the motion to quash the case of the People vs. F. L. Baldwin, charging criminal libel, which is now pending in the circuit court of Delta county. The arguments on the motion were heard in Marquette by mutual agreement of the attorneys interested. Briefs were also submitted by both sides and Judge Flanigan has taken the matter under advisement. This suit against Mr. Baldwin, editor of the Escanaba Journal, was brought on complaint of Governor-elect Chase S. Osborn, because of the publication of an alleged libelous article reflecting on Mr. Osborn's character and political reputation, which was published and widely distributed throughout the state during the primary campaign. The first hearing in this case was before an Escanaba justice of the peace, by whom Mr. Baldwin was bound over to circuit court. In the arguments on the motion to quash made yesterday, Mr. Baldwin was represented by Attorneys A. H. Ryall, of Escanaba, and Judge C. R. Brown, of this city, both of whom spoke at considerable length. Representing the People were Prosecuting Attorney H. B. Dotsch, Attorneys N. C. Spencer and T. E. Strom, their contention being that the pleadings were sound and that the issue should be settled at a jury trial. In order that the arguments might be concluded yesterday, an evening session of court was held. The arguments of Mr. Baldwin's at-

torneys in favor of quashing the charge against him were largely technical in their essence and involved only points of law, it being claimed that the pleadings were so drawn that no offense against the criminal laws of Michigan was alleged. The most emphasized contention was that the declaration was too general and that in order to make a case, the prosecution must set up in separate counts each of the offenses charged. Judge Brown went through the alleged libelous article sentence by sentence, for the purpose of showing that none of the statements made was necessarily libelous or criminally defamatory, and in support of his points quoted extensively from the dictionary and minutely analyzed the meaning of many of the words and expressions used in the article. The attorneys for the prosecution, on the other hand, maintained that it was not single words or sentences in the article that were libelous so much as the article as a whole, the evident imputation and purpose of which was to degrade and disgrace Mr. Osborn in the eyes of the people of Michigan. For this reason, the prosecution argued, it was impossible for the article to be libelous, and that it was for a jury to determine whether or not the whole article, taken collectively not piecemeal, was libelous under the law. In case that the complaint now standing against Mr. Baldwin should be quashed by Judge Flanigan, the attorney that were libelous in the charges against Mr. Baldwin will not be dropped. If the present complaint fails, it is said that a new complaint will be formulated immediately and that Mr. Baldwin will be re-arrested. It is also understood that both Mr. Baldwin and Amos S. Musselman of Grand Rapids, one of the candidates for the Republican nomination for governor in the primary campaign, will be served with summons in a civil suit for \$50,000 brought by Mr. Osborn, the papers for which are said to have already been prepared.

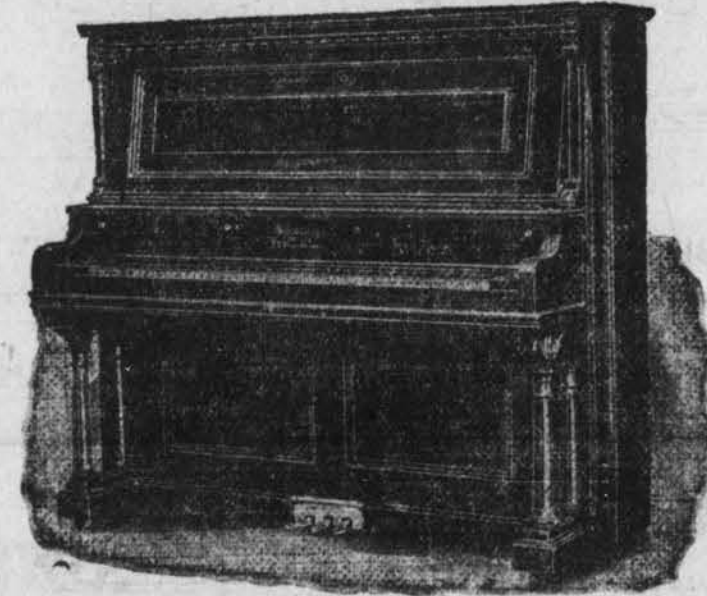

STEAM PLANT IN GENERAL FAVOR

Because of the Necessary Shut Down of Light and Power Generating Station a Few Days Ago on Account of Lack of Water, Problem is Much Discussed.

That Steam Boilers to be Used in Times of Accident and Emergency Should be Installed Appears to be the General Belief, and Prompt Action is Likely.

Since the trouble at the electric light plant a few days ago because of the flow of water in Dead River suddenly giving out, there has been general discussion among citizens concerning ways and means of putting the plant on a basis where an unforeseen accident would not put the entire system out of commission.

Those who have given particular study to the situation are forced to admit that the demands on the plant for current are now greater than the potential power of Dead River, at least without providing immense storage dams to furnish a reserve during periods of drought and in extremely cold weather, when many of the tributary streams freeze up solid.

Superintendent Rettelle's solution of the problem is an auxiliary steam plant, and this idea seems to have favor with many citizens.

of the plant. Nearly every kind of industry has some kind of auxiliary on which to fall back upon in cases of emergency, and the light and power plant should be protected in the same way.

According to Superintendent Rettelle, water power plants all over the country are installing auxiliary steam plants to provide against accidents and emergencies.

It is estimated that a steam plant capable of generating 1,000 horse power, which is about the necessary capacity to meet all demands for current at all times, could be installed for \$25,000.

There has been considerable discussion of a proposition to consolidate the light and power commission and water board, it being understood that the steam plant at the water works might be used to generate electricity in cases of emergency.

Superintendent Rettelle believes that an auxiliary steam plant should be built at the present generating station, so that there would be no delay in case it became necessary to use it.

MUNISING-ONTONAGON HIGHWAY PROBABLE

Movement on Foot to Build Connecting Link Between Nestoria and Covington.

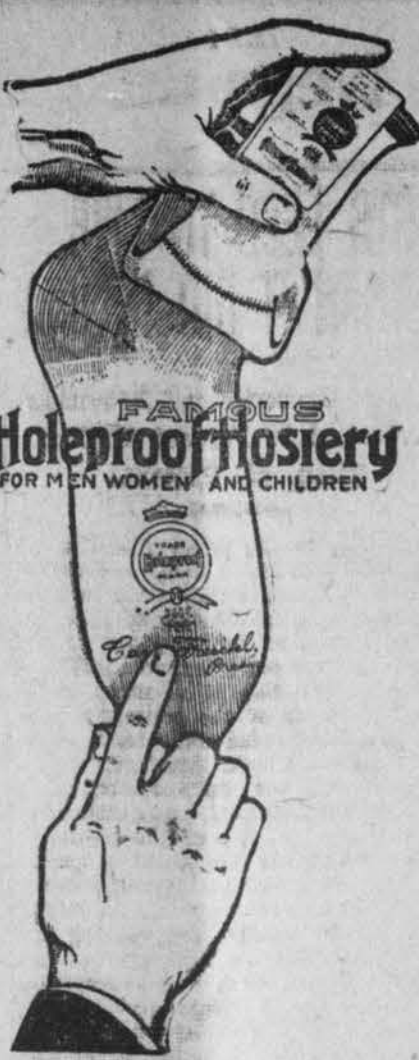
At an important meeting of the board of supervisors of Baraga county held yesterday, a petition was considered, the ultimate result of which may be the construction of the connecting link in the iron-copper country highway, which has long been hoped for by all upper peninsula motorists.

For some time the many farmers in the vicinity of Sidnaw have been using their best efforts toward the construction of a road through L'Anse township from the Covington line to Nestoria, but to date the L'Anse township board has done nothing.

Three of the five supervisors of Baraga county expressed themselves favorable to granting the petition yesterday, while a fourth did not take sides, leaving only the L'Anse township supervisor opposing the transfer of land.

As the matter now stands, there is excellent prospect that the twelve miles of road will be built in the near future, for if L'Anse cannot or will not build it the four townships through which the road would pass will probably be turned over to Covington township, which would certainly mean that the road will be built as soon as possible.

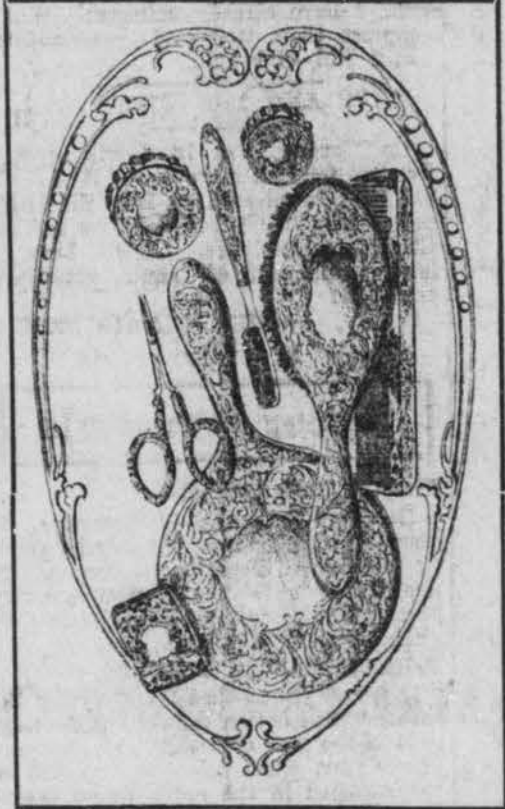
