



# COURT IMPOSES THE SENTENCES

### Samuel Robinson, Convicted of Manslaughter, and Mary Houtala, a Self-Confessed Disorderly, Were Given Terms in State's Prison by Judge Flannigan.

### Oscar Lindgren, Who Stole a Fur Lined Coat from Salvation Army Barracks, Will Spend Four Months in Jail—Liquor Responsible for Three Offenses.

Three of those convicted of criminal offenses at the December term of circuit court received their sentences at the hands of Judge Flannigan yesterday, leaving only Mrs. Elizabeth Hibering, who has pleaded guilty to illicit sale of liquor at the Baraga cafe in this city, yet to be sentenced. Mrs. Hibering is now supposed to be in Ishpeming and is under bonds. It is likely that she will be sentenced within a day or two.

Those who were meted out their punishment yesterday are Samuel Robinson, convicted by a jury of manslaughter last week; Oscar Lindgren, who pleaded guilty to having stolen a fur lined coat from the Salvation Army headquarters in Marquette, and Mary Houtala, of Ishpeming, who pleaded guilty to drunkenness and disorderly conduct, third offense.

Robinson, who shot Clement Schmidt at Northland last September, was sentenced to not less than five and not more than fifteen years in the Marquette prison, with five years recommended by the court. In the trial a week ago Robinson alleged that he had fired the fatal shot in self-defense, believing that Schmidt was about to do him great bodily harm. In pronouncing sentence, Judge Flannigan stated that he was not particularly impressed with the self-defense plea, but that he considered alcohol to have been wholly responsible for the crime. The court stated that he did not consider Robinson a dangerous man when not in liquor, and was certain the crime would not have been committed had all the parties not been intoxicated. For this reason he was disposed to make the sentence as lenient as consistent with the circumstances and the protection of society.

In sentencing Oscar Lindgren, the court stated that he had found no one who knew anything about Lindgren or his previous record. Lindgren stated that it was drink that caused him to steal the coat and that he had never been arrested before. Judge Flannigan asked the prisoner which he would prefer, a term in prison or a term in the county jail, and Lindgren's choice was a jail sentence, promising to work faithfully for the sheriff during the term of his imprisonment. A sentence of four months in the county jail was then imposed. Mary Houtala, the third prisoner sen-

tenced yesterday, has been a disturber of the peace in Ishpeming and Segauone for several years. The county jail record shows that she has been imprisoned in the jail for drunkenness and disorderly conduct no less than twelve times. She is unable to speak English, and her conversation with the court was carried on through an interpreter, A. W. Jurma. Judge Flannigan was of the opinion that her troubles, too, were at the bottom caused by the liquor habit, and stated that the sentence was imposed, not as a punishment but in the hope that she might be placed where she could break away from intoxicants. The court then decreed that she should be confined in the Detroit House of Correction not less than six months nor more than two years, with six months recommended. Mrs. Houtala is a woman past middle age and does not look to be the disturbing element that she has been, according to the reports of the police.

In the action brought by the American Sales Book company against Chas. J. Anderson, of this city, to recover on a contract for a book called the "Recapitulator," Judge Flannigan handed down a decision in favor of the defendant. Anderson claimed that the book was misrepresented to him when he signed the contract, and the court was inclined to take his statement as true, inasmuch as there was nothing in the contract itself describing the exact nature of the book.

The motion to quash the suit brought by Roach & Seebach against Abraham Fine was granted, for the reason that the original writ of garnishment had not been properly sworn to by a notary.

At the May term of circuit court, Judge Flannigan decreed that Frank Dams must pay his wife \$25 a month for her separate maintenance. At this term he reduced the amount to \$17 per month.

# FINIS ON FISHING UNTIL NEXT SPRING

### Local Fishermen Hope Legislature Will Make Any Changes Early in Session.

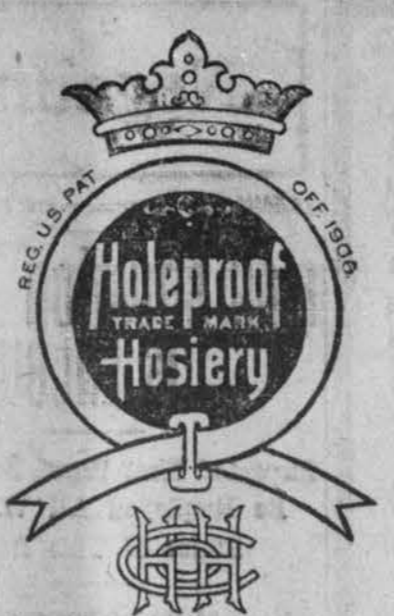
Local fishermen have taken in their nets for the year and no more fishing will be done until next spring. The four tugs which were engaged in the herring trade are being laid up for the season, with the exception of Ethel J., which will be used in fishing in the vicinity of Keweenaw point all winter. The Theora and Columbia are now being put in shape for the winter here and the Silver Spray has returned to Munising.

Fishermen are considerably interested in what the legislature may do as to changing the commercial fish laws at the coming session. While it is not generally expected that any radical changes will be made, as the law was pretty thoroughly made over two years ago, they are apprehensive that amendments to the present laws may be proposed.

"It is the wish of the fishermen," said August Anderson yesterday, "that whatever the legislature does in the way of amending the game laws be done early in the session. As a rule, fish legislation has not been taken up until near the end of the session and changes made at such a late date cause the fishermen much inconvenience. Now is the time that we should be buying our nets for next year, but we cannot buy until we know what kind of nets will be legal and what illegal. For this reason, the legislators will do the fishermen of the state a great favor by disposing of the commercial fish laws as early in the session as possible."

According to a Canadian dispatch, the negotiations between the United States and the Dominion relative to joint regulation of fisheries in international waters have reached a conclusion, which means that another year local fishermen are likely to be under national rather than state control. The dispatch says: "It is understood that as a result of the conference held here during the last three days between Prof. David Starr Jordan, the United States representative on the international fisheries commission, and Prof. Prince, the Canadian commissioner, an agreement has been reached whereby the joint international regulations governing the fisheries in inland boundary waters, as drafted over a year ago, will be brought into force without further delay by simultaneous promulgation at Washington and Ottawa."

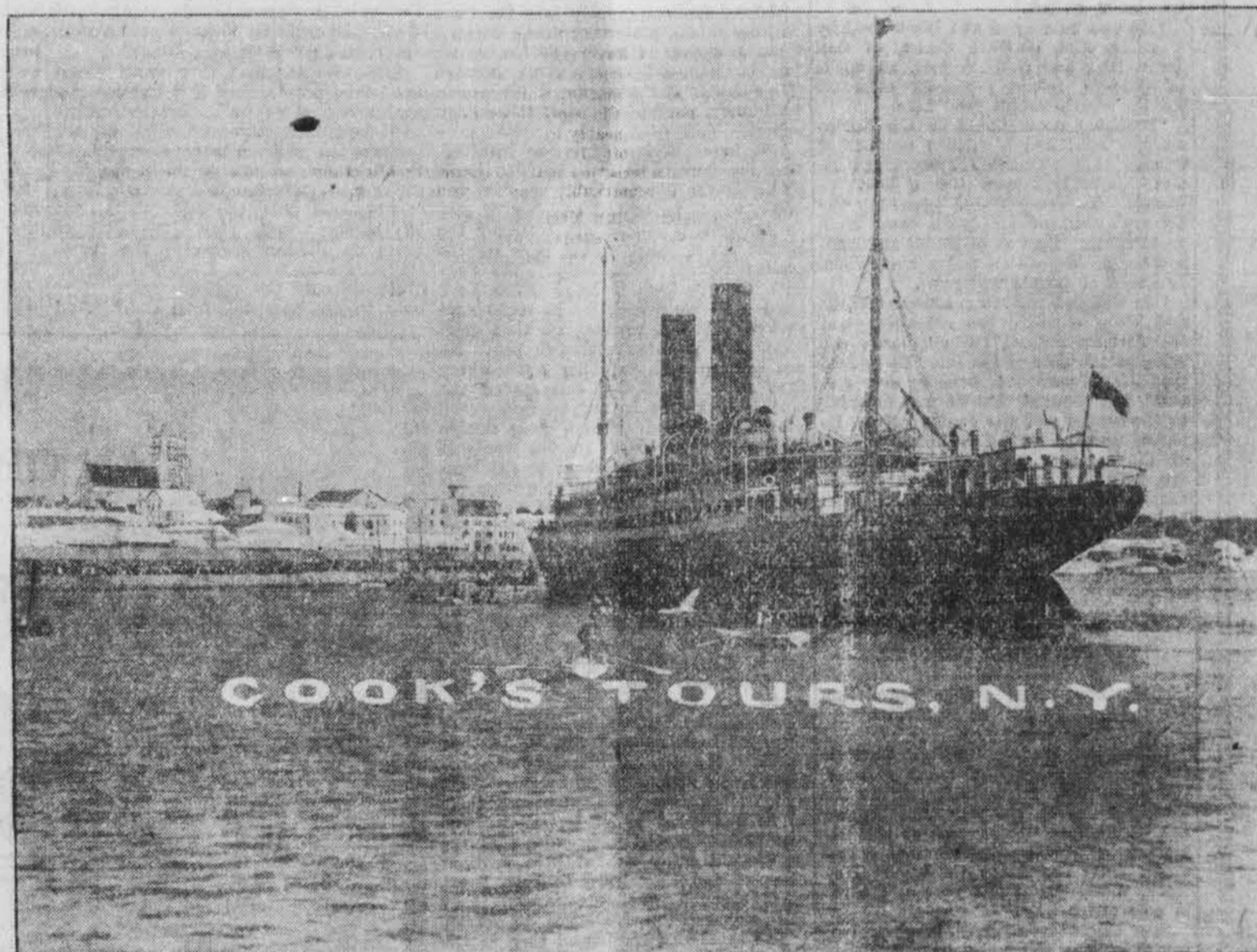

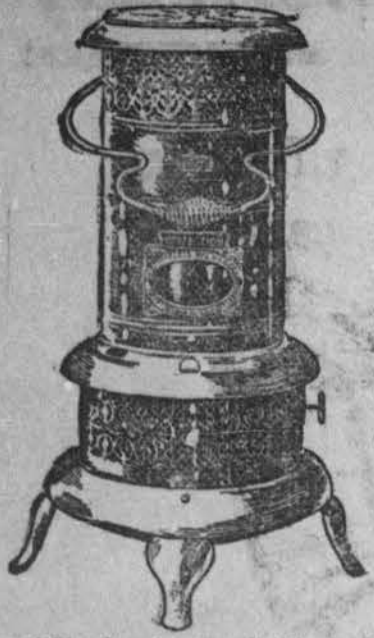

The only bull news for the day that was regarded as important was the low condition given on central and southern Illinois and yet, in the end, July was up but 5c, while the other months showed net gains over Tuesday's close of 7c to 1 1/2c. The bull leaders made enough show of buying a little, and the shorts were chiefly responsible for the later advance. ### MISUSE OF WOODMEN FUNDS IS CHARGED

Dubuque, Ia., Man Makes Detailed Complaint to Illinois Insurance Commissioner.

Chicago, Dec. 14.—Charges of the misuse of many of the dollars of the funds of the Modern Woodmen of America are contained in a written demand for an immediate and exhaustive investigation of the affairs of the fraternal organization, delivered in person to State Insurance Commissioner F. C. Potter by John D. Denison, Jr., of Dubuque, Ia.

Charges of every sort and description in the conduct of the affairs of that society are made by Denison. He charges: That the society is never standing another loss of \$50,000, when a former officer of Beloit, Wis., is actually responsible. That the now dead banker, whose failure cost the society \$200,000, was in the habit of sending out packages of money to "certain persons" who are not named. That former Lieut. Gov. W. A. Northcott, by letters, which are produced, is influencing the election of the officials who have charge of the money in the order. Mr. Denison's petition to Commissioner Potter concludes by saying: "As a benefit member of the society of the Modern Woodmen of America of Rock Island, Ill., I respectfully request investigation along the lines above stated and that you call all the persons above named and examine them under oath touching the matters herein mentioned."

### CHINA PLANS TRUNK LINES.

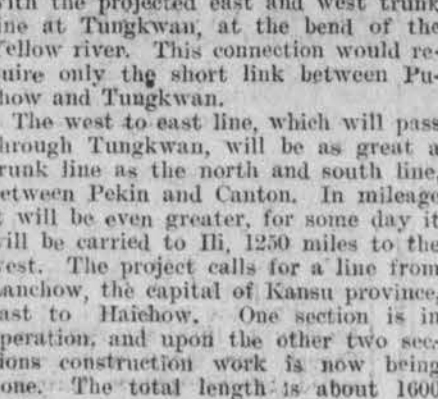
Much Railway Activity Displayed Throughout the Empire.

Pekin, Dec. 13.—China is pushing forward plans for a comprehensive system of trunk lines, and local railroads. Tang Shaoyi, president of the board of communications, hopes for a great advance in the next two or three years. Leaving out of consideration the projected Manchurian railroads, which, being destined entirely for strategic purposes, will be more or less controlled by Japan, many definite projects in other portions of the empire show real progress. Work is going ahead on the Chang-sui extension of the Pekin-algan line. This splendid railway leading from the capital to Kalgan, on the edge of inner Mongolia, was constructed wholly by Chinese, without any foreign assistance or advice. The credit for it belongs to Jeme Tienyuu, who is a graduate of Sheffield scientific school, Yale University, and is called "the father of Chinese railways."

world can be raised and that vegetables and other farm products can be raised at a cost which will greatly lower the cost of food in Chattanooga and the surrounding territory.

Mr. Grahame says that in the country lying on both sides of the A. G. S. Railroad there are available 20,000,000 tons of hard fossiliferous ore above the water level which can be easily mined and 100,000,000 tons which can be mined provided the same conditions obtain which are the best results in the manufacture of steel. Chattanooga in other words is the centre of all the best conditions which obtain in the manufacture of high-grade steel.

In order to properly flux the lime ore it is necessary to have the brown or silicious ore. This is found in large quantities about Taylor's ridge, and can be easily transported to the steel plant here over the new Chattanooga Southern and Rome & Northern extension of the Seaboard Air Line.

At Estelle, the quantity of iron ore available is approximated at 40,000,000 tons. In the last section named in the report, which extends into Tennessee, the iron ore resources are described as indeterminate but unlimited. Starr's mountain is the centre of the supply of this section.

In addition to the ore 75,000,000 tons of the best coking coal is to be found in the section which the new company will develop. The cost of producing steel in the plant to be erected here, however, has been based on the coke to be secured from the Virginia coal. The making of its own coke would lower the cost of production.

# LIFE SAVERS CLOSE SEASON

### Boats Have Been Laid Up for the Winter and the Crew Has Disbanded, Though All but Two Men Will Remain in Marquette Until Spring—Was a Quiet Year

### Keeper Kimball, at the Light House, Expects to Put Out Lights in a Few Days—Building Enlarged and Thoroughly Overhauled During Summer

In the closing of the life saving station which took place last Friday, and discontinuing the light house service, which may be done any day now, and will surely happen within the next week, will be written the last chapter in the navigation season of 1910. The life saving crew maintains its vigil in the watch tower until the last boat has left the harbor which, this year, was the Tampa, while the light on the point is kept burning until Keeper Chas. Kimball is sure that all boats are out of Lake Superior.

Captain Cleary, of the life saving crew, expects to have the same men next year as he had this. The members of the crew the past year have been: John Anderson, Dan Sheison, Barney Holman, Fred Jarvis, Alex Roubeau, Fred Perry, Henry Hanson and Fred Liedke. Six of these men will spend the winter in Marquette. Fred Jarvis will spend the winter with relatives at Oquoc, and Alex Roubeau has gone to Alpena until spring. Those of the crew who live in Marquette the year round, in most cases, have secured winter employment. John Anderson runs a boat building and launch repairing establishment, while Captain Cleary also plans to build a few boats during the winter.

The season has been a very quiet one from the standpoint of the life savers. Since the opening of navigation the crew has not been called out more than fifteen or twenty times, and most of these calls were to tow in launches that had broken down. The hardest trip of the year was the run made to Big Bay reef in October, to the relief of the Sacramento which, however, released her-

self before the crew arrived. This trip was made in the face of a howling nor-wester and was a night that the members of the crew will not soon forget.

### Improvements at Light House.

Keeper Kimball's two assistants at the light house are Oliver St. Andre and Frank Otto. Mr. St. Andre lives in the cottage at the foot of the light house and will spend the winter here. Mr. Otto is unmarried and will go to his home at Kenosha, Wis., as soon as the lights are put out.

During the past summer Keeper Kimball's residence on which the largest light is placed, has been doubled in size and thoroughly remodeled. The old building has been raised from a story and a half to two stories high, and a kitchen and store room have been built on the rear. A steam heating plant has been installed, the building formerly having been heated with stoves. Every room in the building has been redecorated and hardwood floors have been laid. A modern plumbing and sewage system has been installed, making the house as now equipped modern in every respect; as well as giving Mr. Kimball several more rooms, which were badly needed.

Mr. Kimball states that within a short time the government will have to make repairs at the signal station on the point, as the boilers are getting old and in bad condition. The bell and whistle on the point are operated by steam, while the light and bell at the end of the breakwater are operated by electricity. By throwing a switch at the light house, the electric light of bell, or both, can be turned on or off at the will of the operator. The large red flash light in the tower above the light house burns kerosene vapor.

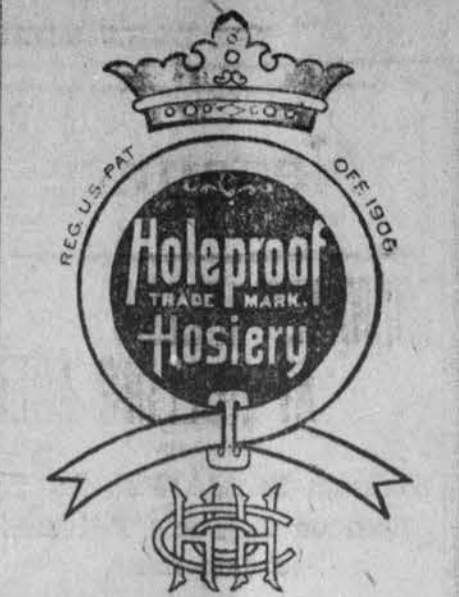
