COUNCIL SETTLES PERPLEXING ISSUE

New Fire Hall Is to Be Erected on the Superior Lumber Company Site.

Ishpeming's new fire hall is to be erected on the Superior Lumber company site. This is on Lake street, facing Front and Pine.

The perplexing question relative to the location of the proposed new municipal building was definitely settled by the common council last evening. Incidentally the recommendation of the majority members of the special committee having the matter in hand was rejected.

The committee submitted two reports to the council. The majority recommendation, signed by four of the five members, proposed that the fire hall be constructed on the old jail site and the adjoining Nelson property, the latter to be purchased for \$8,000. The fifth member of the committee—Charles Kruse—submitted a minority report advocating the erection of the building on the Superior Lumber company site on Lake street, this property to be acquired by the city for a consideration of \$8,500.

The common council adopted the suggestion of Mr. Kruse. The vote was four-to-five. With the question of site settled, a committee was appointed to purchase the property at the price stated—\$8,500. This committee consists of Mayor McCorkindale and Aldermen Kruse and Sliney.

Poles Ordered Removed.

Another action taken by the council at its session last evening had to do with the proposed improvement of Main street. This thoroughfare is to be macadamized, although it is not at all likely the work will be undertaken until next spring. The council last night, acting on the recommendation of the board of public works and the street committee, adopted a resolution ordering the removal of the Main street wires and poles. They are to be transferred to the alleys extending north and south.

The council adjourned until next Monday evening, at which time it will formally order the delinquent sewer tax assessments spread on the tax roll for collection.

A delegation of teachers from the Ishpeming public schools will attend the sixteenth annual meeting of the Upper Peninsula Educational association to be held at Houghton today and tomorrow. Yutzy, in charge of the manual training school; Miss Anna Lacey, principal and Elizabeth Carlson, Olive Arebiloock, Cora Richards, Marie Olson and Mrs. Joseph Bargh of the grammar school; Winifred Lacey, principal, Beatrice Sedgwick and Christie Trebilcock of the Cleveland school; Olga Girz and Mildred Lundahl of the Ridge street school; Flora Lemire of the Central school, and Ida Burke, of the High street school.

FOREIGNERS WANT TO LEARN ENGLISH

Officers of Y. M. C. A. Will Direct Classes for Europeans in Negaunee.

Classes composed of foreign born men, who will be taught to read and write the English language, and given instruction in the duties of American citizenship, will be organized in Negaunee next Tuesday evening, at a meeting to be held in the Labor temple. The class work will be conducted along lines similar to the instructions given to foreigners by the Young Men's Christian association here last winter, and will be under direction of the Ishpeming organization. More than fifty foreign born Negaunee men have applied to Secretary R. J. Wise, and he has decided to start the work and to procure competent instructors to take charge of the class meetings.

Mr. Wise yesterday stated that he had been advised by the Negaunee men that from ninety to one hundred will join the class at the start. This will be the largest class of its kind ever organized in this section and Mr. Wise is very enthusiastic. He said the class will be composed largely of Finns, though other foreign born people will be welcome, as the work will be conducted entirely in the English language. The Roberts system of teaching English will be adopted.

Mr. Wise has not yet secured instructors for the classes, but intends to engage Negaunee men as teachers. The Labor temple people owned the building for the class work and each student will be charged seventy-five cents per month for expenses. Mr. Wise will be present next Tuesday evening, and besides giving the students a talk, will outline the course of the work. The students will meet four times a week, on Tuesday and Friday afternoons and evenings. The afternoon meetings will be for night shift men.

A class for foreigners will soon be started at the Y. M. C. A. building here. Last year's class was an entire success, and a number have already expressed a desire to take instructions during the coming season.

GIRLS' GLEE CLUB.

Organization of Lawrence College May Give Concerts in This Region.

The management of the Girls' Glee club of Lawrence college, at Appleton, the only organization of its kind in the middle west that goes on tour, may visit the upper peninsula during the coming year. The club has been reorganized under the direction of Mrs. Baby Ledward, of the Lawrence Conservatory of Music.

Most of the members are students in the Lawrence Conservatory of Music. For some years past it has been in great demand for concerts in Wisconsin. Miss Bertha Lefberg of Ironwood is the only upper peninsula girl in the club.

Although the itinerary has not been arranged, it is expected that the club will make two tours the coming winter, one through Northern Wisconsin and Upper Michigan and the other through the eastern part of Wisconsin.

OPENING OCT. 11.

The members of the athletic and social committees of the "Y" were served with a supper Tuesday evening in the "Y" building. Plans were discussed for a Halloween program for the members, and a committee was appointed from the joint committee to arrange for the entertainment. The committees then separated to transact business relative to their departments. The social committee is planning big things for the opening night, Oct. 11, when the ladies and friends will be invited to help the members "warm things up" for the winter.

The suppers for the members of the religious, athletic and social committees will be a monthly affair hereafter, and will be served the first Tuesday evening of each month.
