To such a court should go for final adjustment any questions that otherwise could not be satisfactorily set-

The court should have a standing in the eyes of business men compar able to that of the supreme court in the eyes of lawyers. Its dignity should be so unquestioned that service upon it would be the crowning achievement of a business man's

Such a court would be fair and equitable with respect to the enterprise before it and fair and equitable to the people. It would not interfere with every day management of business, but would allow free play for the improvement and development of trade

Federal regulation should carry with it the most complete publicity. No honest business enterprise, no honest man, fears public knowledge of his affairs. Knowledge breeds confidence and confidence is a business man's capital. A policy of secrecy gives rise to suspicion and dis-

Moreover, under modern conditions, it is impossible to maintain secretive methods. The facts become known and intercommunication spreads the information with lightning like rap-

Public opinion has condemned such methods and is demanding full, open and honest accounting from business concerns.

Some corporations with farsighted wisdom adopted publicity several years ago, with the result that they are having less trouble with their labor and the public than other enter-prises. Through this action labor




