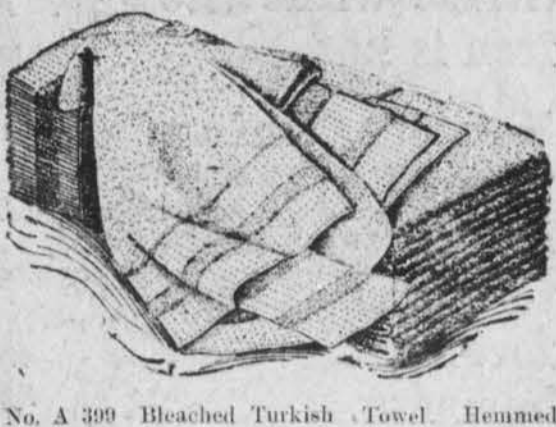

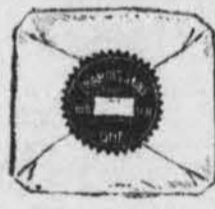

Ishpeming PILAKOFF INJURED IN MATCH WITH CUTLER

'Finnish Lion' Proved a Most Worthy Opponent for the Big Chicago Grappler.

Fred Pilakoff, the "Finnish Lion," who made many friends and admirers in Ishpeming during the week he spent here prior to his exhibition three months ago, gave Kid Cutler one of the hardest matches of his career in Duluth Thursday night, and it is a question if Cutler would have obtained a decision over Pilakoff if the latter had not been injured by a fall from the platform, after an hour and nine minutes.

Kid Cutler is considered America's greatest wrestler, outside of Frank Gotch, and it was thought by many of the wrestling fans in Duluth, who had seen him work in previous contests, that he would have little difficulty throwing Pilakoff on account of his superior science, but what the latter lacked in science he more than made up in strength.

Most of the people who attended the match at the Auditorium, which was packed to its capacity, declared that Pilakoff was the fresher of the two. There was not a moment of lagging in the entire period the wrestlers were on the mat. The endurance of both men was a subject for wonder, but at the expiration of the hour it appeared that Pilakoff was the fresher of the two. The newspaper reporters, in their account of the match, praised Pilakoff for the game fight he put up and his willingness to mix with Cutler. They claim the latter had nothing on the mighty Finn. As an exhibition of strength the defense of Pilakoff was the most wonderful ever seen at the head of the lakes.

Several times Cutler worked Pilakoff into dangerous positions; then, with a convulsive movement of his giant body, the Finn would throw him away. Like a big animal he would at times spring at the Chicago man and several times during the contest the agility and quickness of Cutler was all that saved him from the mighty lunges of the "Finnish Lion." The end came with unexpected suddenness, and it was an exciting climax to a match that abounded in thrills from the call of time.

Pilakoff brought mighty cheers from his followers by heaving Cutler to the mat. Whenever Cutler became exasperated at his failure to turn Pilakoff he would increase his speed in an effort to catch his opponent napping. For a few minutes before the sudden end Cutler roughed with all his strength and all the cunning at his command, and suddenly he gave a mighty heave and the big Finn went clear off the platform. He struck his ribs on the corner of the platform and slowly crawled through the ropes in intense agony. Referee Barton ordered the men to wrestle, but after they had taken another hold it was evident that Pilakoff was in no condition to continue and Cutler was given the match.

In his dressing room following the

contest, Pilakoff sat doubled up with agony. He said he was willing to continue with the match, but his manager refused to let him go on again as that might mean permanent injury to him. Cutler declared after the contest that Pilakoff has as much strength in the arms and shoulders as Zbysko. He said he could not hold him in one position, nor hold him down, and that he is one of the strongest men in the world. He declared that after Pilakoff learns a little more of the science of catch-as-catch-can he is going to be one of the greatest wrestlers the world has ever seen. His showing in the contest against Cutler was nothing short of wonderful. He made Cutler go at every stage of the journey.

It is said that no one in the audience censured Pilakoff for giving up the match as it was evident that he was badly injured and all were delighted with the great showing he made.

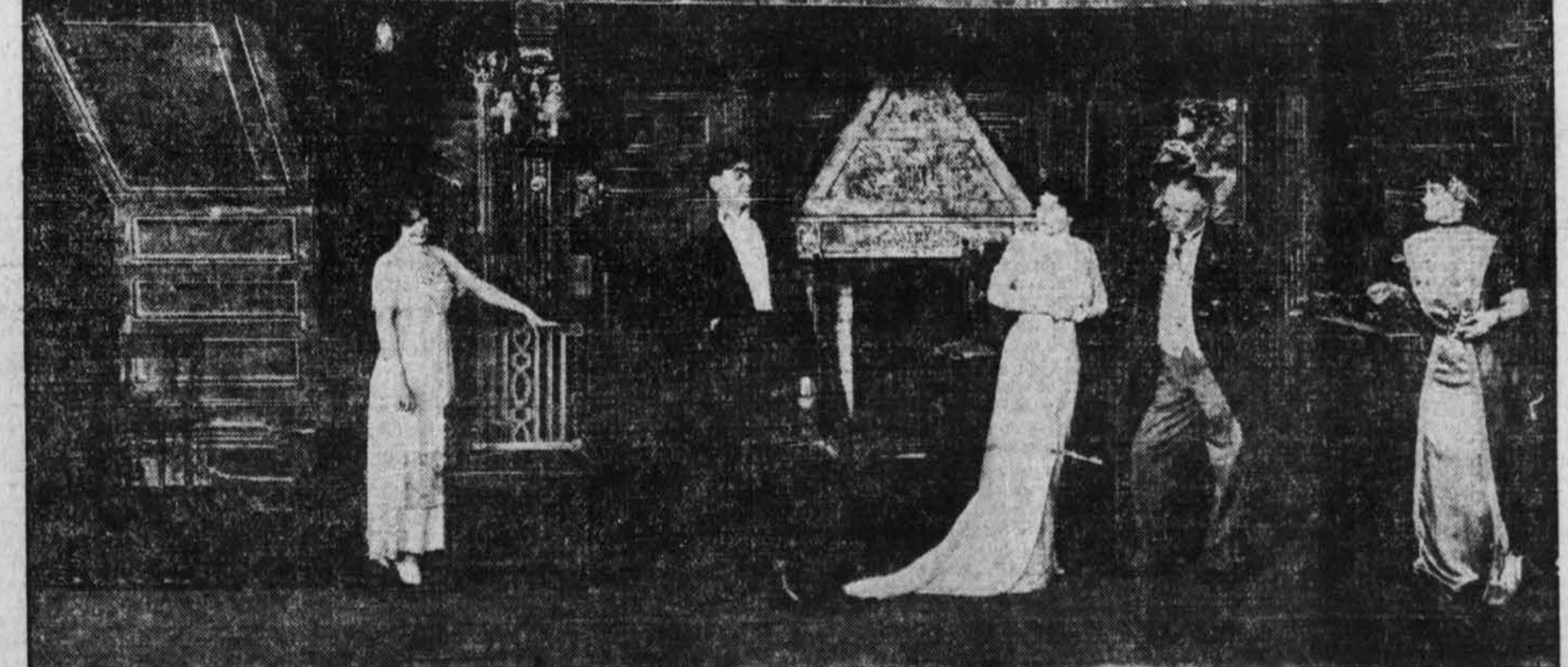
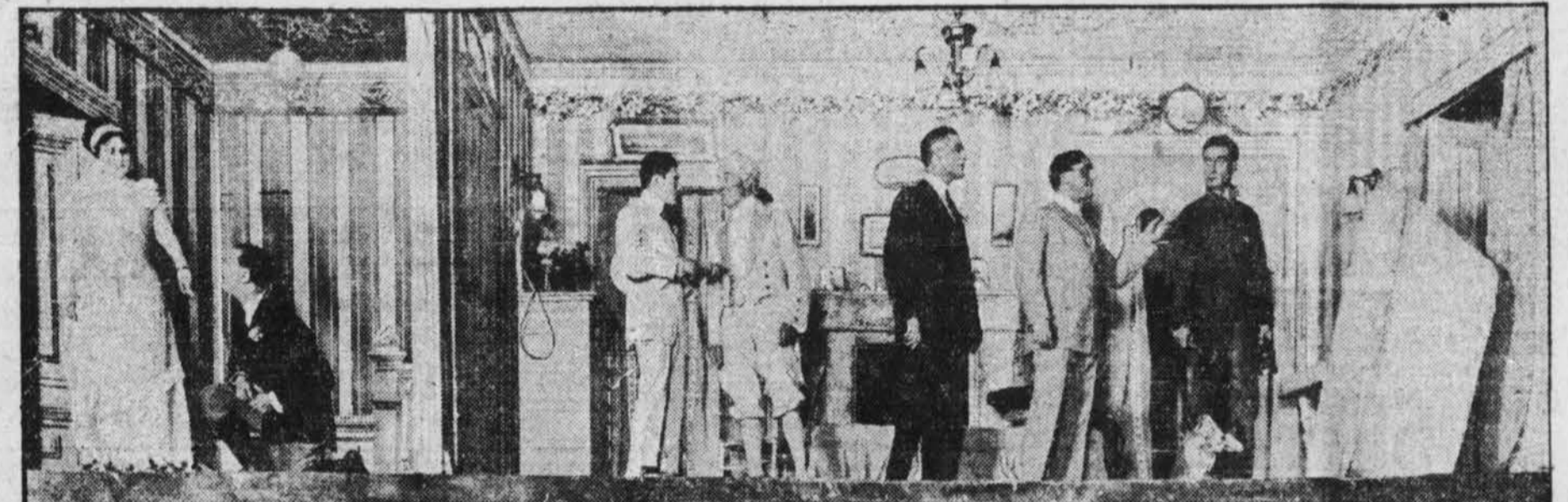

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HIS CONTRACT SAID TO BE N. G.

No Quorum of Water Board Present When \$190 a Day Agreement Was Entered Into With Wanless, the Intake Contractor, of Firm of Wanless & King.

Four of Six Members Should Have Been Present to Have Constituted a Legal Meeting of the Board—Cut in \$10,000 Bill Will Probably Be Insisted Upon.

Further inquiry into the matter indicates that the contract held by Wanless & King, under which they have asked the water board to pay \$190,000 for raising, cleaning and relaying the old intake pipe at the city pumping plant—\$190 a day for fifty-five days—is no contract at all, and that not a single dollar can be collected under it from the city, for the reason that at the meeting at which the board agreed to these terms only three members, not a quorum, was present.

City Attorney Brown has repeatedly ruled, he says, that three members of a board composed of six members is not a quorum, and that no business can be legally done unless four members are present.

The water board, it is stated, is not the only board that has done business with less than a quorum. There are instances where other boards have also proceeded with their work with less than a quorum.

There are six members of the water board, five holding their office by virtue of appointment by the mayor, and the sixth being the mayor himself, who is an ex-officio member.

NEARLY 30,000,000 TONS.

Ore Movement Up to Nov. 1—Bad Weather Delaying Vessels Now.

Total ore shipments up to Nov. 1 were 29,007,102 tons, which is a decrease of 10,371,206 tons compared with the same period last year, when the movement was 39,378,308 tons.

In October the mines sent forward 4,769,965 tons. That is 107,476 tons less than the fleet moved in October, 1910, when the shipments were 4,877,441 tons.

There will be a decided let-up in the movement this month, and unless there is quite a change in the weather shipments will not be as heavy as planned.
