It is contended that the Steel cor portation has a monopoly of the trans-portation facilities in the western and biggest portion of the Lake Superior re-gion and that, while it pays the same high rates charged to independents, the shipping receipts go back into the corporation's coffers.

# EXPORTS OF FOOTWEAR REACH HUGE TOTAL

This Year's Outgo More Than Twelve Million Pairs, Sent to 85 Countries.

Washington, Nov. 17 .- The American shoe manufacturer is extending his sales n all parts of the world In the fiscal year 1880 we exported less than 400,000 pairs of boots and shoes; in 1890, 600,-000 pairs; in 1900, over three million pairs; in 1905, over five million pairs; in 1910, over seven million pairs, and in the calendar year which ends with next month the number will excede eight million pairs, to say nothing of the one million pairs going to Porto Rico and Hawaii. These figures relate to boots and shoes of leather; while if to this we add those of India rubber, we get an additional three million, bringing the otal number of American made boots and shoes passing out of continental United States in 1911 up to an average of a million pairs per month, against about a half million per annum twenty

This increase, it should be remembered, has come in the face of a large manufacture in foreign countries of boots and shoes called "American" manufactured by foreign workmen and of foreign material, but upon American patterns and following American methods of manufacture. It is a wellknown fact that arge quantities of shoes sold in various parts of the world under the title of "American" are, in fact, made in European countries upon patterns and forms and by methods of manufacture developed in the great manufacturing establishents of the United States; and it is thus probable that the number of boots and shoes of American type and thus American in the sense of form and meth od of manufacture sold in foreign cou tries is very much greater than that inerty, J. It is written, of course, with reference to the employers' liability acts of 1908 and 1910 but the principles disussed are necessarily of universal appliation. Indeed, it has been cited as one of the objections to the railroad liability law now in force that it differentiates railroad employes from other persons for whose safety employers should be eld to a strict financial accountability The discussion is timely. The federal employers' liability act, notwithstanding it was once remodelled to meet the views f the supreme court, is again before that tribunal on the question of constitutionality. The same question is found embarrassing by the employer's liability and workmen's compensation commis-sion of which the able Senator George Sutherland of Utah is chairman; for ailroad counsel, although their masters are bowing to public sentiment and inimating their willingness to suppor legislation admitting the principle of employer's liability in every case of injury, still profess to have their doubts whether such legislation can be framed that will not violate the Constitution.Mr. Doherty disposes ad seriatim of objec-tions raised upon this ground and seeks
