
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

The meeting was called to order by the Chairman, D.W.Powell.

Deadman, the newly elected supervisor from the second precinct, Marquette City, who has been appointed by the Commission of that city to fill out the unexpired term of Mr. Fahlstedt, being present, he was asked to take a seat on the Board and assigned to the same committees as his predecessor.

The reading of the minutes of the previous meeting was dispensed with A letter from the Michigan Hospital School thanking the Board for their appropriation, given them at the last annual meeting was read and ordered filed.

A communication from the Department of Public Instruction announcing the date of their meeting at Atlantic City was read and ordered filed:

A proclamation from the Governor relative to Victory medals was read and upon motion duly made and seconded, the Clerk was instructed to have same printed in all papers in this county, and to be laid upon the table and brought up at the next meeting for further action.

The report and application from Mr. Wells, County Bealer was read and ordered filed, and Mr. Wells was appointed County Sealer for the ensuing two years. The motion prevailed by the following yea and nay vote.

Doelle, asking the Board's opinion as to the advisability of a residence fishing license, in order that the fish commission would have funds to establish more hatcheries, was read, and it was moved and carried that the Clerk prepare a suitable resolution, making the fee for said license one dollar (\$1.00), and only necessary for all male persons over eighteen years of age, and present same to the Board. In compliance with theabove the Clerk presented the following:

BE IT RESOLVED, By the Marquette County Board of Supervisors that the members of the House of Representatives from this County and the Senator from this District be instructed to vote for, and use all honorable means for the passage of a bill providing for a resident fishing license in this State, and to provide a fee of one dollar (\$1.00) for same. The monies so collected to ber turned over to the Michigan Fish Commission for the purpose of establishing Fish Hatcheries and the general propogation of fish throughout the State: be it further

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- Record to 30th

Resolved, That this license shall only be necessary for male persons over eighteen years of age.

Resolution was unanimously adopted.

The matter of the uniform accounting and bookkeeping system proposed to be installed by the Auditor General's Department, under the provisions of Act No.71 P.A. of 1919, was brought to the attention of the Board by the Clerk. This new system entailing considerable expense for installation and for hiring of additional clerical help, the matter was referred to the Prosecuting Attorney, with instructions to report to the Board at their next regular meeting.

A bill from the Duluth, South Shore & Atlantic Ry. for the installation of the grade crossing at Champion Beach was read and upon motion, ordered placed on the Auditing Committee's report.

The report of the Auditing Committee was read and adopted by the following yea and nay vote.

Thoren, Register of Deeds; James H. Yelland, Mine Inspector; K. I. Sawyer, Drain Commissioner; William Prin and John T. Bennett, Coroners.

L.R. Walker and J.A. Doelle addressed the Board on matters pertaining to the County Fair and stated that under the law there must be one hundred paid members, and asked the Board to sign up. They also asked the Board to hire a boy club leader, for the purpose of working among the boys on the farm to encourage them to make more exhibits at the Fair, and aid them in getting better stock and more suitable crops. Supervisor VanRiper stated that he did not think this as nearly necessary as to have club leaders for other lines of work. After considerable discussion it was moved and seconded that the matter be brought up at the next meeting, under the head of new business. The motion prevailed.

T.M. Wells stated that some suitable legislation should be passed covering small weights and measures. The Chair referred this matter to Supervisor Vandenboom.

Your committee on county roads and bridges reports in the matter of a project to build a State Trunk Highway between Little Lake and Lathrop, officially known as Job 35-8.

Your committee met with the Board of County Road Commissioners and a representative of the State Highway Commissioner on June 8, 1921, at which time bids were received by the State Highway Commissioner for the constructing of the above mentioned road, with the Board of County Road Commissioners sitting jointly in the letting to recommend thereon and to act as to concurrence for the counties interested in the project.

We found that there was keen competition in the bidding. After analysis of all figures presented, the lowest bidder was asked to appear before the meeting. From his statements it was found that his bid was incompetent, being too low to properly construct the job. It was recommended that this bid be rejected, and the State Highway Commissioner later confirmed the recommendation.

The next to the lowest bidder was then called. His figures were also some sixteen thousand dollars under the engineers estimates of cost, but he showed possession of such machinery and equipment as would make it possible to do the job at his figure using the high grade equipment in his possession. Therefore the bid of W.S.Peters was determined as the lowest competent bid.

The matter of the unemployment of large numbers of residents of the county was then brought into discussion and consideration was had of the advisability of the county bidding this road in, so as to place the employment of men to accomplish as much relief to unemployment as was possible. This being possible under the statute of placing a bid in the name of the county less than the lowest competent bidder and this less the bond premium, as a bond is now required from the county

Pertaining thereto, after considerable discussion, the following resolution was unanimously passed by your committee and a copy thereof subscribed for use of the Board of County Road Commissioners in negotiating the contract with the State.

The resolution passed reads.

Resolved, that the Board of County Roads Commissioners be instructed to enter into greement with the State Highway Commissioner of Michigan for the construction of

Resolved, That any action of the Board of County Road Commissioners in so contracting have the endorsement and approval of the Board of Supervisors of the county of Marquette.

And further

Resolved, That the State Highway Commissioner be urged to accept such tender, both because of the fact that it is a reasonable figure for the construction of the road, that the construction of the road is necessary, and further for the reason that it will make work and afford relief for the labor in this district, which is fast becoming indigent.

Pursuant to this resolution the Board of County Road Commissioners has secured this contract in the name of the county. They have organized an employment board to recommend persons for employment so as to investigate and make employment as far as practicable, this Board being W.H.Moulton, Ishpeming, Chairman; Peter Trudell, Negaunee; John Stickney, Marquette.

Work of installing camps is started and we are advised that the main crew should be started after the 4th of July.



Seventy-five persons have been inmates of the county infirmary during the year and fifteen hundred thirty persons have received temporary mid during the year, two hundred eighty-seven in first district, nine hundred seventy-three in second district, and two hundred seventy in third district.

We regret that we are again ending the year with a deficit, namely, fourteen thousand one hundred ninety-eight and five one-hundredth dollars (\$14,198.05).

Owing to the fact that there are many men out of employment and in all probability the poor board will have many calls during the coming winter, we feel it would not be wise to ask for less than one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000.00)

Therefore, your superintendents of the poor respectfully request that your honorable body appropriate the sum of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000.00) as relief for the poor of Marquette county for the ensuing year.

The crops at the poor farm were poor this year, owing to the fact that there were so many potatoe bugs and grasshoppers. We note the following supplies on hand, estimated, viz:

300 bu. potatoes, 100 heads cabbage, 90 bu. carrots, 18 bu. parsnips, 20 bu. beets, 12 tons hay, 3 tons wheat straw, 300 heads, celery and 314 cords of 16-inch wood.

Sirs- Your committee on county roads and bridges reports:

In the matter of assistance to Skandia township for the construction of a highway between the end of a highway in Turin Township at the Skandia township line and the county road east of Carlshend, petition for which was received by your board and referred to this committee.

Your committee did on the 5th day of August view the site of this proposed road, did look over this territory in Skandia and Turin townships to be benefitted and did determine that this is a worthy project and one which should have assistance and be built.

Further, your committee did meet with the board of county road commissioners on the 19th day of September and consulted with them thereon. It develops that this project may be handled so that this road can be used as a detour to State Trunk Line job 35-8, providing this road can be used as such in the early spring and thence during the time this latter job is under construction, and that the state is willing to assume its share of not exceeding five thousand (\$5,000) to make this road into a detour.

Therefore, if twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2500) is made available to the county road commission to use on this road, it will be possible for them to work with Skandia township, construct this road, expending not over five thousand dollars (\$5000) of county money, and receive a refund of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2500) from the state. To that end we recommend that the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2500) be appropriated from money not otherwise appropriated to the use of the board of county road commissioners to be used in co-operating with Skandia township for the constructing of this road in Skandia township.

Gentlemen: - Your committee on county roads and bridges begs leave to report:

That on the 19th day of September they met with the board of county road commissioners at their request.

Figures, estimates, plans of future work and the agreements with the state highway department and budget estimates for the ensuing year were presented and discussed. The board of county road commissioners adopted a resolution, which has been reported to you in their determination, and is before your board at this meeting. Your committee unanimously adopted a motion that the action of the county road commission in this matter be approved and we respectfully report that in our opinion the determination as given should be received and the taxes levied.

The matter of marking railroad crossings as provided in a new statute, was then discussed and action was had by the board of county road commissioners and approved by your committee, directing the superintendent of the board of county road commissioners to address a letter to the board, suggesting that signs be erected by the board, as requested by the Michigan Public Utilities Commission, and reported to your board at the July meeting, and requesting an appropriation of one thousand dollars (\$1000) be made for that purpose, and your committee respectfully reports that in our opinion this request, when made, should be granted and the work handled in this way.

A proposal made by Frank Klotz, to sub-contract major portions of the Little Lake Lathrop road, was brought before me by the board of county road commissioners, In this matter your committee had viewed the work at the time and together with your board while making the inspection trip over the county roads. We examined the books and accounts, and after careful consideration the following resolution was unanimously adopted.

Whereas, as has been heretofore reported to the board of supervisors, this committee did on June 8, 1921, after careful consideration of the bids for constructing the Little Lake Lathrop road and consideration of the present condition of lack of employment within the county, advise the board of county road commissioners to bid this job in from the state in competition with a contractor's bid which was nineteen thousand dollars below the engineer's estimate in order that the county could control what men to be employed and thereby use the job for relief so far as practicable; and

Whereas, the board of county road commissioners did bid this job in as advised and reported, and both of which actions were approved by the board of supervisors at the time when reported, and

Whereas, the county road commission now has a proposition to sub-let the job

so that no loss in money would acrue to the county, but the county would lose control of the employment of men, and

Whereas, an inspection of all costs and earnings upon the job seems to show that . the job is proceeding about along the lines as originally shown on the engineer's estimate; therefore, be it

Resolved, That this committee advise the board of county road commissioners to ... continue the control and operation of the little Lake-Lathrop road and to reject the proposition of Frank Klotz for sub-contracting the same, providing that they may at their discretion deal with him for hauling on contract as with any other party; and be it further

Resolved, That this action is reported to the board of supervisors with the recommendation that such action by the Board of county road commissioners be approved.

The board of county road commissioners complied with our recommendation in this matter by a motion, which was unanimously adopted therefor.

Supervisor Bush presented the following resolution, which was, on motion duly made

and seconded, unanimously adopted:

whereas, due to industrial conditions now prevailing in Marquette county, a large number of men are working part time or out of work entirely, it appears desirable for this board, through its individual members to keep in close touch with the superintendents of the poor in their respective communities, in order that every worthy case entitled to county aid shall be found and proper assistance furnished therefore be it resolved.

One. That the superintendents of the poor of the several districts be and are hereby instructed to furnish each supervisor, each month, a list of persons receiving county aid in his community.

Two. That each supervisor be and is hereby requested to keep in close touch with the Superintendents of the poor in his district, and be diligent in assisting him in his work,

Three. That the chairman of the committee of this board on "Superintendents of the Poor", be and is hereby instructed to attend the meetings of the superintendents of the poor, thereby becoming familiar with the conditions throughout the county and act as the agent between this board and the board of superintendents of the poor. Said chairman to report to the board of supervisors from time to time such facts and information deemed necessary by said board. Said chairman shall also report upon his own initative any information that may come to his attention by virtue of his attendance at the meetings of the board of superintendents of the poor, or otherwise, as may be of value to the board of supervisors.

Four. That all bills against the county for aid be referred, after being approved by the board of superintendents of the poor, to the auditing committee of the board of

supervisors for audit and payment.

Five. That the superintendents of the poor be and are hereby instructed to avail themselves of and request the aid of the Red Cross, public, industrial and private nurses the health officers and other officials of the different communities to assist them in the work of locating and investigating needy persons, and in following up and caring for such cases as may develop.

Six. That the clerk of this board be and is hereby instructed to write to each superintendent of the poor, firnishing each of said superintendents with a cppy of this

resolutionm with instructions to put same into immediate effect.

Seven. Realizing as we do that the present industrial conditions are exceptional, we feel that more than ordinary methods of handling this matter are necessary; therefore, this resolution is presented with the object in view of making sure that every person in Marquette county entitled to aid is adequately cared for from this time forward.

Supervisor Deadman reported that the Yellow Dog river bridge was unsafe and requested

that the clerk notify the county road commission.

At the April 1921 meeting of this board a committee report was adopted giving the agricultural agent and the school commissioner the privilege of buying the county's Ford cars used by them for \$225 and \$200 respectively. It was moved that this report be made to read \$200 in each case. The motion was duly seconded and carried.

Gentlemen: - In making an appropriation to the County Road Commission for the purpose of making it possible, relocate the road in the vicinity of Michigamme, there was a condition placed upon the appropriation that the Township transfer certain properties to be used for industrial purposes.

So far as I know the Township has not transferred these properties to date, but it is my understanding that they do intend and expect to do so. In any instance, the job is well worth its cost and I believe should be carried on at this time when the State is willing to carry it on and the State does carry 80 percent of the cost of the project.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors, Marquette County, Marquette, Michigan. Gentlemen: The State Highway Commissioner has assured the Board of County Road Commissioners that he will call for bids about the 4th or 5th of May, for the construction of a penetration macadam job running west of Ishpeming.

As you are aware, the County last year bid in the job between Little Lake and Lathrop, so as to use this job to relieve the unempolyment situation in the County, desiring to control the employment of this labor so as to make the selection of labor as effective as possible in relieving the unemployment situation and to that end an employment Board was formed and their advice and assistance has been used in the employing of men upon this job. This job has up until within ane week ago, employed better than 100 men continuously since the 1st of last July and during the peak of work last season, there were upwards of 200 men on the job and throughout the winter months there were from 140 to 150 men upon the job. This job will, by the 1st of May be completed to the point where it will require the services of but few men and these will necessarily be mechanics or similar trades, that is roller men, truck drivers, etc., and it will be of no further use as a labor relief proposition.

The State law provides that a County may bid in any job such as this west of Ish-

peming job, at a figure less than the lowest competent bidder.

Your Board of County Road Commissioners would like an expression from your honorable body as to whether you consider the unemployment situation in the County still such as to make it advisable to bid in this west Ishpeming job, provided the figures are such that it appears feasible for the County to do the work.

Further, if your honorable body feels that the Board of County Road Commissioners should handle the construction of this proposition, we would thank you to authorize your Committee on County Roads and Bridges to meet with the Board of County Road Commissioners at the time when bids are received and recommendations made to the State Highway Commissioner, with power to act in the matter.

For your general information we desire to inform you that the camps, camp equipment, machinery and tools now upon the job between Little Lake and Lathrop can, with the single exception of rollers and a few trucks, be released to this other job by the date of lett-

Further, the County is adequately equipped with all machinery and tools to handle this job, with the single exception that in order to handle both jobs with the necessary speed, it will be necessary to lease for a short time, at least one or two rollers and the Board knows where these are available and subject to lease.

Resolved, further, that the Board of Supervisors shall appoint three qualified electors, residents of the county, to be superintendents of the poor within the county of Marquette, and that said persons be appointed for the terms and in the manner provided by statute, and that said persons be allowed their actual and necessary expenses in the performance of their duties and the sum of ten dollars (-10) per day for actual attendance and services at meetings of said Board, and that the compensation of each of said superintendents of the poor shall not exceed the sum of one hundred and twenty dollars (120) annually, and that said superintendents of the poor, when appointed, shall have all the

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powers and duties fixed by law for the superintendents of the poor of Marquette county.

Resolved, further, that said superintendents of the poor shall have authority and are hereby directed to employ a qualified person as secretary, who shall hold office during the pleasure of said superintendents of the poor. Said secretary shall maintain an office in the court house and shall have exclusive charge under the orders and direction of the superintendents of the poor of the maintenance of poor persons by the county of Marquette, and the expenditure of poor funds. The secretary shall give all of his time to the duties of his office and shall be engaged in no other work or business. He shall keep such accounts and records and make such reports as are required by the superintendents of the poor and the Board of Supervisors. He shall make personal inquiry into the circumstances of all applicants for poor relief and shall visit from time to time all persons and families receiving county aid, and a record of such visits shall be kept in suitable records in his office subject to the inspection of the board of superintendents and the board of supervisors. The superintendents of the poor shall have authority to remove said secretary at any time at the pleasure of the superintendents of the poor and to appoint a successor.

Resolved, further, that the superintendents of the poor shall have authority to employ a clerk and bookkeeper who shall be continuously in the office of the Board during business hours, and who shall be removable at the pleasure of the superintendents of the Poor and shall receive a salary to be fixed by said board.

Resolved, further, that no officer, supervisor or other person except said secretary shall furnish or give poor relief to any person or persons. Any case requiring county aid shall be reported to the secretary, who shall make immediate personal inquiry into the circumstances of the applicant and shall furnish or deny aid, as the circumstances warrant. In every case a suitable written record of the action of the secretary, and signed by him, shall be made and filed in the office of the Board, subject to inspection.

Gentlemen: In the matter of the appropriation of \$4,000.00 recently made by your Board to be used in connection with money to be raised by Skandia Township for the construction of road in Skandia township, starting from the county's road No.15, about three miles east of Carlshend, running thence south to the township line, I beg leave to report as follows:

On the 10th of this month, bids were called by Skandia township for the construction of this highway. The road had been heretofore laid out to be built with a twenty-foot grade and was broken into four sections of approximately one mile each for the purpose of letting.

Upon taking the bids, it was found that the money available was not sufficient to award the four sections and purchase the necessary culverts and build the necessary bridge.

We found this situation as to the finances.

Skandia township had heretofore cleared the right of way over the entire distance and still has left \$3,000.00 to be used with the county's \$4,000.00, which, when combined with the new appropriation, makes the sum of \$7,000.00, and the combined bid with the necessary culverts and bridge runs to approximately \$9,000.00.

After consideration of the bids, the town boards, with sanction of the undersigned, decided to award the three southerly mikes on this job. These three miles start at the township line and run north, and for that purpose the south mile was awarded to Walter Lattrel, and the other two miles to six residents of Ruse, bidding together. The figures received on these miles were very satisfactory. The dirt work being at 32,33 and 40 per yard on the various sections respectively, and the balance of the bid in proportion.

It was considered by this action that an earlier opening of the road would be secured than otherwise, as there is an old trail paralleling the section which was not awarded which can be put in usable shape at a nominal figure and which the township agrred to put in shape from their repair fund.

Dear Sir: - The recent report of investigation made by our representative of the Marquette county jail states that your jail is old and hardly fit to detain prisoners in. Some of he toilets are in bad condition and a majority of them do not flush at all. The bath tub on the second floor is not at all satisfactory. When one is through taking a bath and lets the water out of the tub, the contents of the sewer pipe usually backs up into the tub. This, of course is very insanitary. It is damp inside and the ventilation is very poor.

In view of this report this commission recommends that the board of supervisors give serious and deserved consideration to building a new jail.

As county clerk may we kindly ask you to present this recommendation to the board of supervisors, at their next meeting.

The following report of the superintendents of the poor committee was read.

A ugust, 23, 1922.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Marquette County,

Marquette, Michigan.

We, the undersigned poor committee beg leave to report that on Saturday
August 19, we visited the county poor farm. The grounds about the building are well
taken care of and the crops are in fine condition. The barns and storage buildings are
clean and well kept. Some of the emmbers who visited the Farm on previous inspections
commented on the improvements that had been made this year.

In regard to the home, we found everything in first class shape and the inmates are very well satisfied with the food and management. Several were uestioned about conditions and without exception they spoke in the highest terms of Mr. and Mrs. Morrison. The committee voted the management a vote of thanks for the fine dinner served them.

At a meeting held after the inspection, we made the following recommendations.

1. The purchase of a new rug for the office. The rug now in use is nearly worn out.

2. The purchase of a new double wagon. About forty-five cars of slabs are handled each year from the farm and delivered to the poor families at Marquette. In previous years the unloading and delivery was let to outside parties at a cost of between twelve and thirteen hundred dollars. Mr. Morrison can do this himself without extra help, if the wagon is purchased, and this will be a great saving to the county. The wagon would cost about \$125.00.

- 3. The purchase of a Ford car or some other small make touring car. This car is to replace a driving horse that had to be shot, having outlived his usefulness. At present, when inmates are to be transported, a car has to be hired. During the winter months one of the working horses could be used for trips to town.
- 4. That a competent man be hired to make the necessary repairs to the ventilating system, which is in bad order.
- 5. That the plaster in the boiler room, which is inbad condition, be repaired before fall.
- 6. The purchase of a piano at a cost not exceeding one hundred dollars. Weekly religious services are held and the only instrument they have is an old worn out organ. This request came from the inmates, and Mr. Morrison told us that it would be greatly appreciated.
- 7. That the moving picture owned by the county be sent to the poor farm occasionally to entertain the inmates.

dollars per month for each inmate.

Twenty-two hundred and fifteen persons have received temporary care, three hundred forty-nine from the First District, fifteen hundred fifty from the Second District and three hundred sixteen from the Third District, classified as to causes as follows: Widowhood 806; out of employment 688; sixkness 397; old age 97; deserted 80; insanity 23; crippled 29; blind 3; husband in jail 61; orphans 11; shiftlessness 15; mother dead 5;.

The following supplies are on hand at the County Farm, estimated; 4 tonhay, 8 ton rye straw, 2 ton green oat straw, 300 bushels potatoes, 350 stalks celery, 29 bushels beets, 80 bushels carrots, 4 bushels tomatoes, 50 bushels parsnips, 35 bushels apples, 125 lbs. dry beans, 100 lbs. dry peas, 100 quarts canned fruit, 17 gallons pickles, 750 head cabbage, 3 cord of 16 inch slabwood, 7 cord of three foot wood for furnace.

As we are again ending the year with a deficit, viz; sixteen thousand one hundred. eleven and ninety four hundredth dollars \$16,111.94, and in order to wipe out same and care for the indigent poor of the county, we respectfully request your honorable board to appropriate the sum of one hundred twenty-five thousand dollars \$125,000 as relief for the poor of Marquette County for the ensuing year.

Gentlemen: I trust your Board will be interested in the following report of your County Fair which appears to be the vital and weak spot.

The weather was about as ornery as Stafford the Mule, which no doubt made a difference of two to three thousand attendance; farmers especially were scarce. It does not appear that the Fair is run on a good business basis as I do not think it can be done so under the present system; something must be done to get the farmers and their exhibits, the most practical way apears in engaging a Fair manager and giving him six months to stage the Fair, spending at least two-thirds of his time among the farmers and other exhibitors in addition to serving the Fair, he would be a great benefit to the improvement of stock in the county. Also make a trial next year of giving registered bull calves and swine as premiums to bona fide farmers exhibiting grade stock. If Marquette county is to hold honest to goodness fairs the farmers must be interested and induced to attend and exhibit liberally. Mr. Walke as secretary-manager worked hard and faithfully, but I am convinced that more time is needed than possible for him to give.

To sum up: The Fair Association can always buy good attractions and amusements, but they have got to get right next to the farmers and plug hard for exhibits before the Marquette County Fair will ever be a real Fair.

The Fair Association Board of Directors ask that your Honorable Board will again appropriate the sum of \$5,000 for the 1923 Fair.

Our department, being a state department, cannot favor any particular locality, but each part of the state through its development bureau can advertise its section of the state and point out its advantages. Michigan's land values are low. People over the country do not know that Michigan has millions of acres of good land as well as ppor land. Too often have we allowed unscrupulous men to sell sand and swamp to the man who had hoped to make his home with us and to live happily with us. You have seen the results.

We are working on a plan of certifying land before it is sold for agricultural purposes in carrying out this plan we need the development bureaus. We hope to see

the time that they will only do business through certified dealers.

It takes time ad money to work out these things and I hope you will try to be generous with your development bureau, so that we can help you make your part of Michigan well known and appreciated throughout the country. It is good business, We need to advertise. California spends millions of dollars for advertising her land, her products and her climate. We need to do that so that Michigan will take her place among the states whose land and climate is sought for and whose advantages, agriculturally, are known everywhere.

Gentlemen: - Your Committee on County Roads and Bridges, to whom a petition referring to assistance in the construction of a bridge over the Dead River in Marquette Township was referred, report that they have visited the site of the bridge, have ascertained from Marquette Township that they have approximately \$8,000 in cash available for the construction of this bridge that a contract has been entered into between the Township and Geo.

D. Sherman for the construction of a bridge over this river, utilizing 2 spans of a trestle formerly in the L.S. & I. viaduct over the same stream, that the contract price with Mr. Sherman for this structure is \$10,000 and that there will be approximately \$3,000 worth of additional grading and sundries to be paid for in connection with this river crossing.

After consideration of all matters pertaining to this highway crossing and realizing that a bridge such as this is a very difficult strain on the finance of an individual Township, your committee recommends that the sum of \$2,500 be appropriated from moneys not otherwise appropriated and paid to Marquette Township as assistance in the construction of the bridge above mentioned.
