Honorable Board of Supervisors, of Marquette County, Michigan.

Gentlemen:-

Your Committee on County Roads and Bridges met with the Board of County Road Commissioners at their meeting held on August 27th at which time we considered the petition from Humboldt Township for plowing out the Black River Road.

It develops that in order to do the plowing it will be necessary to erect a new bridge over the Black River.

That Humboldt Township is willing to join with the Board of County Road Commissioners and proceed under the provisions of Act 202 P.A., 1927, and erect a bridge on a 50-50 basis.

That the plowing of this road will make it possible for Humboldt Township to transport 68 children who are now being served in two one-room schools to Republic where they can be taken care of in a Consolidated grade school and given proper education.

In the estimate of the Committee it is a very meritorious undertaking and your Committee has recommended to the Board of County Road Commissioners that they cooperate with Humboldt Township and erect a bridge over the Black River on a 50-50 basis.

Your Committee further recommends that the sum of \$600 be appropriated from moneys not otherwise appropriated, be paid over to the County Road Fund for the purpose of helping to defray the cost of plowing the Black River Road the ensuing winter.

Beard of County Road Commissioners,

The following report of the Committee on Legislation and County Parks was read and adopted and ordered filed:

Honorable Board of Supervisors, of Marquette County, Michigan.

Gentlemen:--

Your Committee on Legislation and County Parks report:

That on July 31st we met with the Board of County Park Trustees and inspected the County Park at Gwinn and the County Park at Champion.

That we found both Parks well kept, clean, neat and well appointed.

At Gwinn we found that a bath house is going to be needed in the near future, but otherwise the park seems to be adequate for the use to which it is being put.

At Champion we found that a large number of improvements have been made including the erection of a new bath house with checking for 500 bathers simultaneously; erection of considerable playground equipment which had been secured at a very nominal cost from the Ishpeming School Board; the underbrushing and opening up for use of considerable new area in the park grounds; the addition of tables, stoves and other accessories; the converting of the old bath house into tool sheds and enclosed kitchen for use of transients, and a very large improvement on the beach to the old grass cover thereby widening the beach about 50 feet over the whole length of same from the old bath house to the track.

Recommendation to put a new roof on the pavilion was approved and in our estimation the greatest needed improvement at Champion Beach is to fill in the swamp between the railroad tracks and the bath house and to erect a place for the custodian.

Champion Beach is being very largely used at present, the tallies of day tourists running up better than 600 to 700 cars or from 3,000 to 4,000 people on good Sundays and holidays and the use of the same by tourists for tenting is showing a considerable increase.

We also recommend that suitable sign boards be erected advertising particularly the Gwinn Park, and advising tourists to camp in County Parks.

Mr. Stubenrauch submitted the following figures as a tentative estimate of the cost of the new building and equipment and changes to be made:

The new building will be about 215,000 cubic feet space.

Motion by Wiseman that the committee recommend to the board of Supervisors that they authorize a bond issue for the sum of \$130,000.00 and submit the same to the legal voters at the regular election to be held on Monday, April 1, 1929; that the County Clerk and the Prosecuting Attorney prepare the proper forms and the ballots necessary. The condition of the old building was carefully considered, as this is not fireproof. The wiring perhaps should be inspected so as to eliminate as far as possible all fire hazard.

Dr. Lojacono will take up with the Ashley Company the condition of the present sewer disposal system, also as to recommendations for capacity for the additional sewage from the new building.

On motion by Wiseman, the minutes of the meeting of July 20, 1928, were amended so that the sum authorized for the salary of an assistant physician shall read \$125.00 to \$150.00 per month as may be found necessary.

In this regard we call attention to the fact of needing protection to our workmen in many cases; of needing close control of traffic over our operations when we are tarring and on similar work; also to the fact that the county has considerable investment in gravel pits, timber reserves and wider rights of way and that work in preventing trespass would be handled in such manner. At times when not working at special assignments such a man could assist in traffic control.

To work to the best interests we believe this man should be a deputy sheriff and we recommend that the sheriff be authorized to deputize a motor patrolman who shall be hired and paid by the County Road Commission.

The following report of the Committee on County Parks was read and adopted and ordered filed.

Committee on County Parks.

Honorable Board of Supervisors, Marquette County, Michigan.

Gentlemen--Your committee on County Parks Reports that on the 12th day of September we met with the County Park Trustees and visited both County Parks.

At the Gwinn Park we found that there had been erected a new change house for bathers having a capacity for approximately one hundred bathers and seven change stalls in each in each of the ladies' and men's change rooms and that there had been erected a small tool house and two additional latrines in the campers' portion of the park. These latrines being equiped with the caustic chemical vaults heretofore used at Champion Beach and found to be too small for that park.

At Champion Beach we found that a bungalow had been built for the custodian and equiped strictly modern, with hot air heat, electric lights, water and bath room facilities spectic tank sewage disposal. That two additional two seat latrines had been built in the campers' portion of the park and that new large capacity concrete vaults had been installed under the new latrines and under those formerly in use and equipped with steel caustic vaults, and that an extention has been made to the concrete porch and walks built at the bathers' change house.

We found that both parks were neat, clean and well kept up, new roofs being placed on buildings which needed them and benches, tables, playground equipment, etc., was in good repair.

It appears that the greatest need at present, in the Park Department Is to make provisions for larger crowds at Champion Beach as the crowds now using the park tax the parking and picnic grounds to capacity at times and with the completion of the concrete road to Champion increased use of Champion Beach is to be anticipated.

In connection with this park work we desire to call attention to the Board that this past season during the months of July, August and the first part of September we had an unusually severe dry spell and withstanding this condition there were practically no forest fires in Marquette County. It is our opinion that provision of these parks which give to our people the privileges of outdoor recreation under conditions which are agreeable and where fire risk is abated so far as possible contributes to fire prevention in a way that is a considerable factor in the freedom from fires this past season.

The following report of the Committee on Airports was taken from the table and read. Upon motion duly made and seconded it was ordered that action in this matter be indefinitely postponed and report filed.

Honorable Board of Supervisors of Marquette County, Michigan.

Gentlemen: Your committee to whom was referred the matter of making investigations relative to an airport reports:

We have given this matter consideration, made many inquiries and investigations to the end:

1st. It appears that the provision of one airport should be sufficient for the entire County. Such additional up-town landing fields and emergency landings as appear necessary could be provided at a cost far less than an airport costs by the cities and other bodies.

2nd.--It appears that the cost of an airport will be more than it should be expected that any of the cities of the County should be expected to bear individually.

3rd.--Because of the two above reasons if an airport is to be built it should be built and maintained by the County.

4th.--The statutes now in effect permit the construction of airports by counties and specify that the Board of Supervisors name the Board, Commission or Agency in the County who shall have jurisdiction in the matter and construct, maintain, supervise and control such ports.

5th.--It appears that the most advantageous place for the construction of a county airport would be at Eagle Mills on the site visited by the Board in their last inspection trip, for these reasons:

The site is approximately midway air distance from Marquette and Ishpeming with Negaunee lying close by; it is crossed by Trunk Highway M-28 on which there is frequent scheduled bus service. The proposed landing area lies high and has good drainage and is comparatively level and will require a minimum of earth movement for good runways. It is but a short distance from US-41, electric and phone facilities and railroad connections are immediately available.

The site is capable of development to a field warranting a rating by the Department of Commerce of A 2 A and possibly of A 1 A, but it is doubtful if the East and West course can be constructed of sufficient length and within maximum limits of grade on runways to receive a number 1 size rating.

6th.--It appears from reconnaissance that a field approximately as shown on the attached blueprint is the proper layout of an airport at Eagle Mills.

7th.--From our investigations it appears that it will require the sum of fifty thousand dollars to acquire the lands required for this airport, to clear, grub and grade runways so that the field will be usable for airships and ready for preliminary rating

and listing and to provide a road easily usable by the public from M-28 to the landing area.

In conformity with the above we recommend:

1st.--That the Board of Supervisors determine by motion or otherwise whether they desire to have an airport .

If this determination is in the affirmative we further recommend:

1st.--That the Board of Supervisors by motion appoint the Board of County Road Commissioners as their Agent for Marquette County for the construction, maintenance, supervision and control of airports and landing fields.

2nd.--That the Board of Supervisors indicate their opinion of the site at Eagle Mills as an airport site.

3rd.--That the Board of Supervisors provide for the raising of money for airport purposes to the amount of fifty thousand dollars and that when so raised the money be appropriated to a County Airport Fund to be expended and handled by the Board of County Road Commissioners in the same manner as County Park Funds are now handled by by said Board as near as may be.

Gentlemen:

An error was made last October at the Annual Meeting of the Board of Supervisors in making up a budget for summer 4-H club work in the County. I made out a budget and mailed it to Mr. Charles Stakel, Chairman of the Finance and Taxation Committee on October 3rd. The Annual Meeting was held October 14. Mr. Stakel received my letter October 15th. I asked Mr. Stakel to place \$600 in the budget for summer 4-H club work, stating that the Michigan State College would appropriate \$300 making the total \$900 for summer 4-H club work. The Clerk was directed to request the County Road Commission to make a special effort to gravel the Carlshend road from the end of the concrete to the County line on the east.

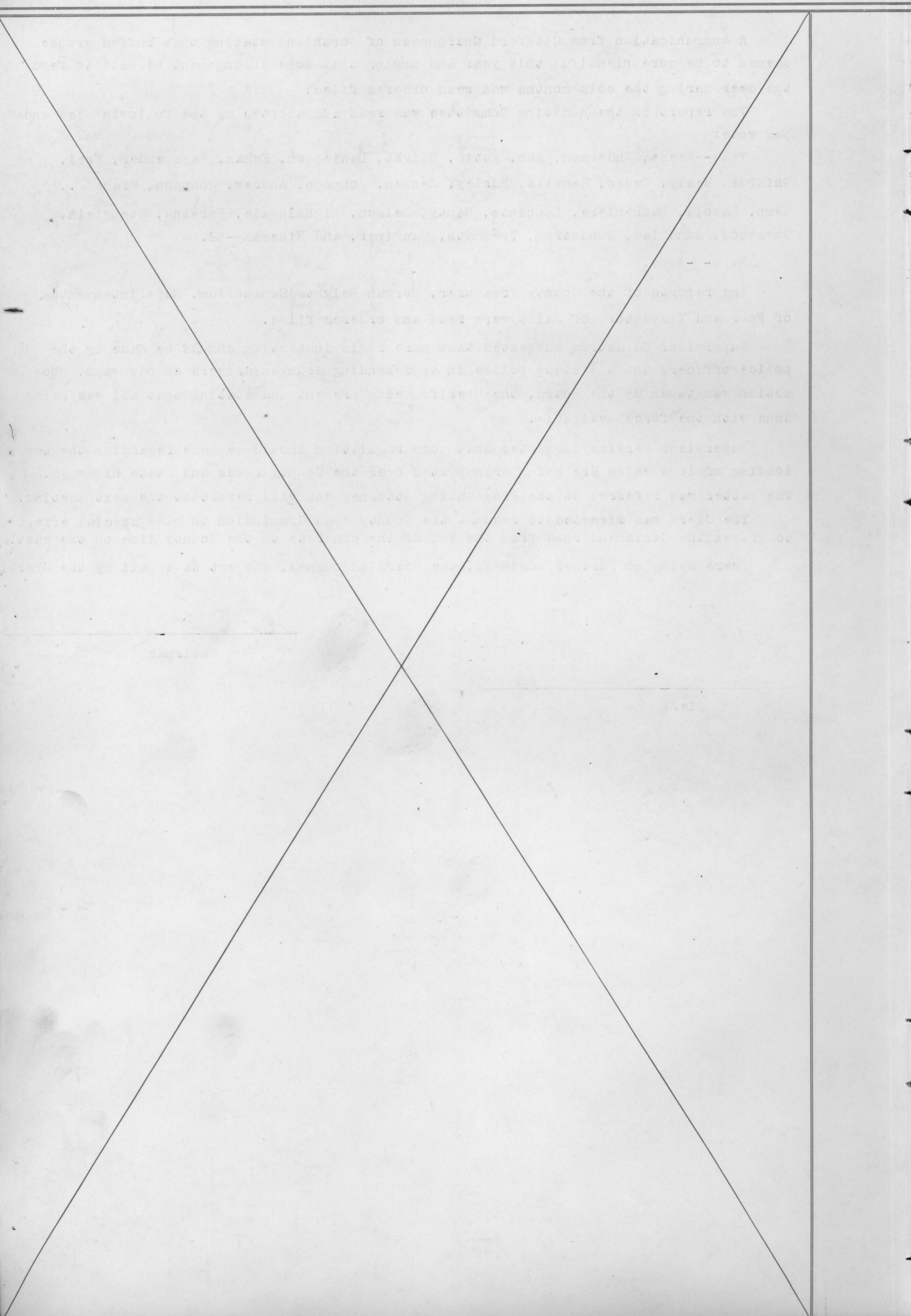

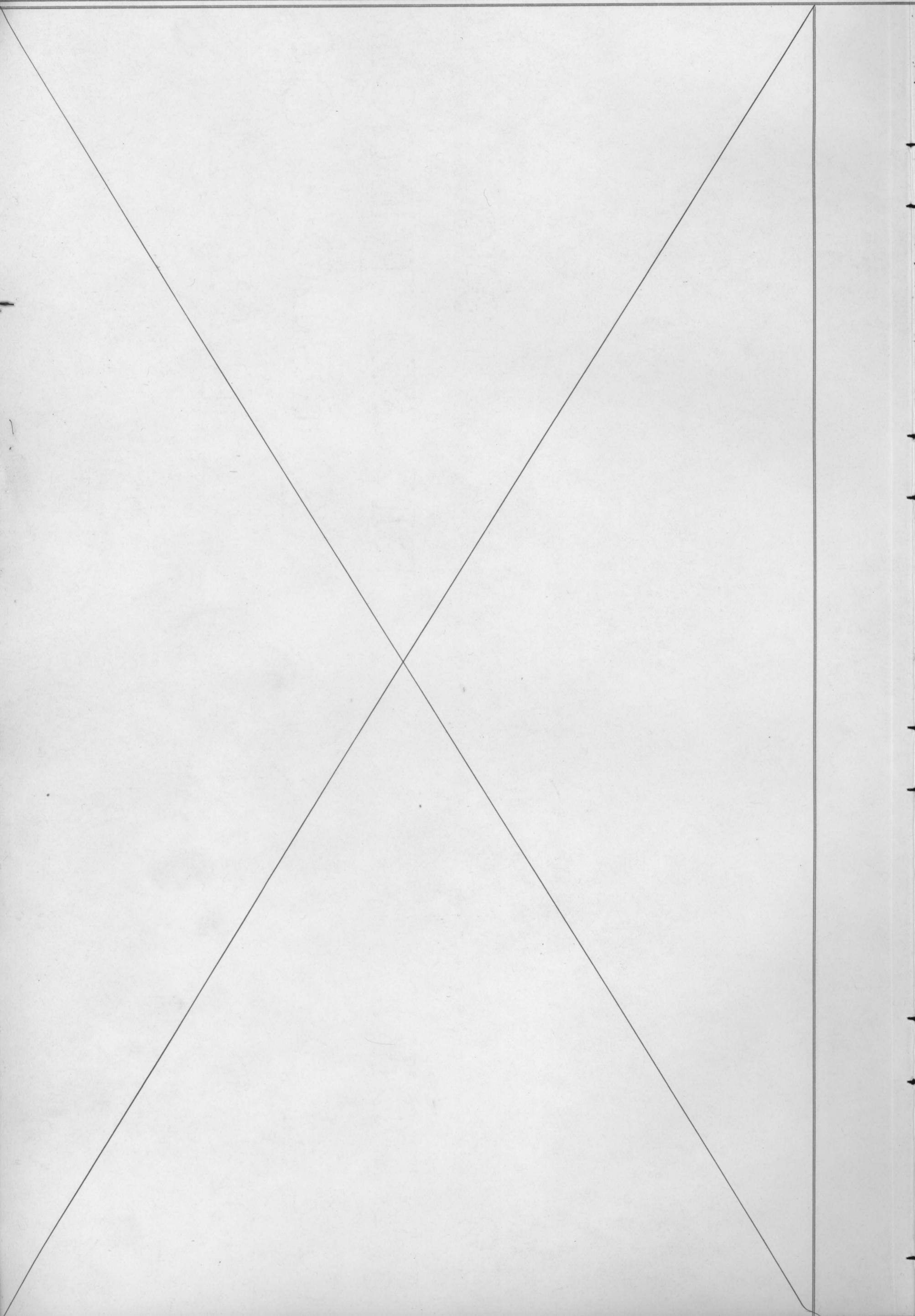

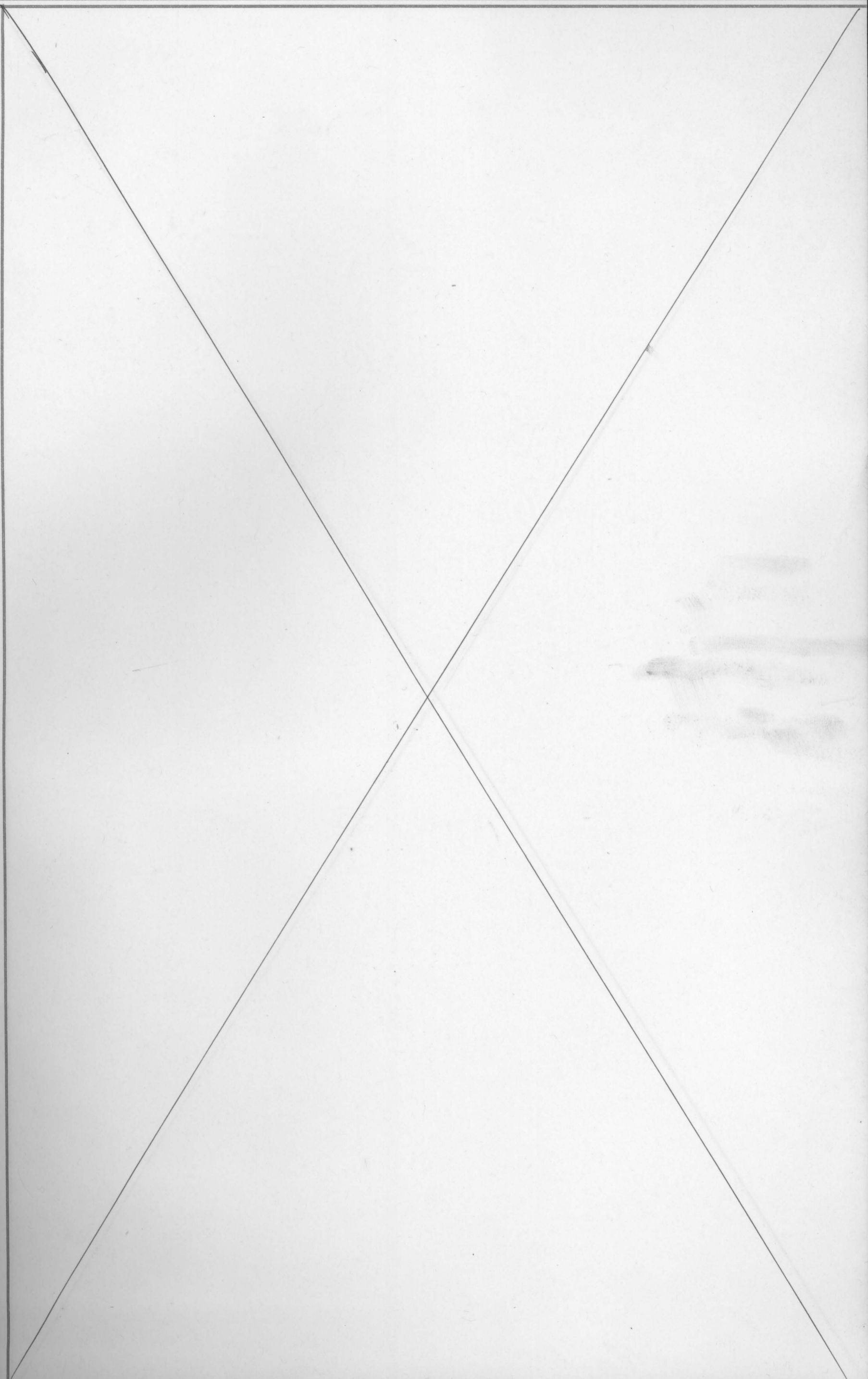
