Your dollars are needed. The yearly appropriations by certain counties must be augmented if we are to "carry on" as the need arises. A definite increase in illegitimacy is now evidenced.

We urgently request you to apprise your County Board members of this urgent appeal at their next meeting. May we not hope that this letter and the enclosed folder of our work will help you to get a favorable response.

Gentlemen:

At a meeting of the Board of County Road Commissioners of Marquette County, Michigan, held September 23, 1942, the following resolution was adopted:

"Whereas, the Board of County Road Commissioners has adopted all Township Roads, including all streets and alleys in unincorporated villages, into the County Road System, pursuant, to the requirements of Act 130, Public Acts of Michigan, 1931, as amended;

AND WHEREAS, under the provisions of said Act 130, as amended, Marquette County will receive money to assist in the maintenance of these roads, adopted because of said act, which sum of money is estimated at Sixty Seven Thousand Thirty Dollars and Thirty two Cents (\$67,030.32);

AND WHEREAS, Section 10 of said Act 130, provides for raising by taxation of such sum of money as shall be necessary in addition to the money received by the County pursuant to such act, so that sufficient money shall be provided for the maintenance of these roads;

AND WHEREAS, it is estimated there will be needed for the maintenance of the roads, streets and alleys, adopted into the County Road System pursuant to the requirements of said Act 130, for the next year, the sum of One Hundred Thirty Two Thousand and Seventy One Dollars and Sixty Four Cents (\$132,071.64) and we estimate the return of money from the State to apply thereon will amount to Sixty Seven Thousand Thirty Dollars and Thirty Two Cents (\$65,041.32) pursuant to the provisions of Section 10, Act 130, Public Acts of Michigan, 1931, to provide the money necessary for the maintenance of such roads:

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of County Road Commissioners of Marquette County, Michigan, that the amount of money to be raised by taxation, for the next year, pursuant to Section 10, Act 130, Public Acts of Michigan, 1931, as amended; and in addition to the monies raised for general County Road purposes which are raised pursuant to Act 283, Public Acts of Michigan, 1909, as amended; be fixed at and determined at the sum of Sixty Five Thousand Forty One Dollars and Thirty Two Cents (\$65,041.32), such sum to be spread on the assessment rolls of the Townships and Cities of the County, and when collected to be credited to the County Road Fund, for use in the maintenance of the roads, streets and alleys adopted into the County Road System because of the provisions of said Act 130."

MORGAN HEIGHTS SANATORIUM

Honorable Board of Supervisors of Marquette County:

We are submitting herewith the Ninth Annual Report covering operations at the Morgan Heights Sanatorium for fiscal year ending September 30, 1942, It is accompanied by special reports, as follows:

Certificate of Morrison Audit Company.

The detail of proposed budget.

Report of Robert F. Berry, M. D., Superintendent.

Report of Laboratory and X-ray Department, made by Dr. William J.

Ford, Director, and Miss Irma Besola, Technician.

Report of Miss Mary M. Murray, R. N., Field Nurse.

Practically all the items listed in our report last year, under the heading of "Permanent Improvements and Contingencies", have been taken care of. The following summarizes the additions to the permanent improvements:

The tunnel was extended to connect with the new well and has resulted in better service in the water department. We believe we have the plant in excellent shape and do not anticipate any major improvements during the ensuing year.

In line with our constant endeavor to supply the best of service at the lowest possible cost we have centralized all cooking and have moved the equipment formerly used in the so-called Children's unit Building to the main building, and now have one kitchen. This makes closer supervision possible and economies have resulted. We now serve the patients in the new building by means of two portable trucks which have been electrified, thus making it possible to bring the meals to the patients at the farthest points at the correct temperatures. While making this change we encountered a situation regarding our wiring which demonstrated to us that we have been operating without the proper factor of safety. We found that to do the job properly and provide wiring to meet the new kitchen situation, and to also give the entire plant proper wiring facilities, would necessitate an expenditure of approximately \$2500.00. This was not the most serious factor, however, for it developed that we were absolutely unable to do this work under prevailing Government restrictions due to the war emergency. The change which has been made, therefore, is a temporary one insofar as the wiring installation is concerned but we expect to get by "for the duration". The change was made at a cost of less than \$500.00, which will be paid for within the next month.

We are especially fortunate in having accomplished this combination at this time in view of the difficulties we are having with the personnel in this and other departments. Naturally in these times, with so many places of employment available, we are particularly hard hit at the Sanatorium because of the fact that it is out of the city. This condition extends through all the departments but is of special concern to us as regards nurses. The demand for nurses in other activities is so great that all hospitals are confronted with this condition. Increases are being made in salaries paid to Sanatorium personnel as we are obliged to meet the competition. Our problems pertaining to personnel are accentuated by the new transportation regulations involving gas and tires. Consequently, we are obliged at this time to make provision of some kind for transportation of the Sanatorium employees to points throughout the county.

We are proud of the fact that the employees at the Sanatorium are enrolled one hundred per cent on a ten per cent payroll deduction for purchase of War Bonds.

We are submitting the Budget for the calendar year 1943, showing at the same time actual for 1941 and 1942. You will observe that in our operations for the year 1942 we have hewed to the line and, in fact, are very much on the safe side. You will find some increases in the proposed 1943 budget, but these are brought about entirely by the war conditions. Notwithstanding our desire to submit a budget lower than those presented in recent years, the total is \$50,000 and, frankly, we see no way of improving the picture or lowering the estimate. We believe our figures are as nearly correct as it is possible to estimate them at the present time. We say this, however, with full realization that war conditions can alter the situation materially. We are hopeful that your honorable body will see fit to approve the appropriation as suggested.

We are aware of the proposed change to bring all county activities on the calendar year basis and in this connection we are disposed to adjust our operations and cooperate with you to the fullest possible extent. As for the remaining three months of this year, we feel that in providing for our operation in this period you should base your figures on one-quarter of the 1942 budget.

We wish to take this opportunity to express our appreciation of the cooperation of the staff and employees of the Sanatorium, who are endeavoring in every possible way to maintain high standards. We have enjoyed our association with the county officials, the Board of Supervisors, and the Contact Committee which represents the Supervisors and acts as a liaison with us.

REPORT OF MORGAN HEIGHTS CONTACT COMMITTEE
TO BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

October 12, 1942.

Your committee begs to hereby report that the members thereof made an inspection of Morgan Heights Sanatorium on Thursday, October 8, 1942, and held a joint session with the Board of Trustees at that time.

We carefully considered the general condition of the Sanatorium and particularly the improvement effected during the year.

We fully reviewed the Annual Report and discussed the same with the Board of Trustees and the Superintendent.

We found the institution in excellent physical condition and believe all operations are conducted efficiently and economically.

We reviewed the operations for the past year as detailed in the Annual Report and discussed the proposed Budget for the calendar year 1943 in detail.

We are convinced that the Budget has been prepared in a conservative and efficient manner and recommend to you that the appropriation of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) for the year 1943 be granted as requested. Barring unforeseen events, it is our considered opinion that the institution can be operated for the figure stated.

Nevertheless, we must realize that with the country at war, many things now not contemplated can happen, in which event the costs may materially increase. That, however, is a bridge we will not attempt to cross at this time.

We commend the Board of Trustees for the thorough and painstaking manner in which the affairs of the Sanatorium have been administered, realizing that as public-spirited citizens, they are devoting considerable time to the affairs of the institution without any remuneration whatever. We also commend the capable administration of Dr. Berry and his corps of assistants.

Supervisor Van Riper then moved that the County Treasurer be authorized to purchase the necessary rubber stamps to carry out this work. Your Salary and Budget and Executive Committee, jointly, have had under consideration the various salaries on the County Payroll. In the case of an emergency or in case a Department requires additional funds or needs some special equipment, which could not be foreseen at the time of the annual meeting, we recommend that the head of that Department present this matter to the Board of Supervisors for their consideration and that they grant, where deemed necessary, authority to exceed the figures established in the annual budget.

If it develops that the amount stipulated in the budget of any Department exceeds the needs of that Department or if a sum authorized is found unnecessary then we recommend that authority be granted transferring a sum or surplus to some other Department by proper resolution of the Board of Supervisors.

Gentlemen:

Your Finance and Taxation Committee recommend that the Marquette County Board of Supervisors re-adopt the plan made effective at the Annual Meeting of October 10th, 1932, with reference to fees and salaries of county officers. We also recommend, however, that the Board of Supervisors make an exception in the case of the Sheriff, and that he be allowed to retain all of the fees collected by him.

It is also understood that the Register of Deeds is legally entitled to retain the abstract fees. With these exceptions, the Board recommends that the other county officers turn their fees over to the County Treasurer on the last day of each month, and that the County Treasurer withhold, the payment of salary checks until the fees have been properly deposited. Your Committee also wishes it clearly understood that the amount of \$4,500.00 allowed for the Prosecutor's office covers the Prosecuting Attorney's salary for a year, clerk hire, and all office expenses.

The amount of \$100.00 set up in the budget for the County Welfare Agent's department is intended as a donation for the payment of telephone, stationery, postage, and other office expense, excluding clerk hire, and we have been informed by the Prosecuting Attorney that we are under no obligation legally to assume any clerk hire or office expense for the Welfare Department's office.

It is also recommended that when a substitute clerk is hired to fill in during a vacation period, that the amount paid the new clerk be limited to the daily rate arrived at on a salary schedule of \$75.00 per month.

All other salaries of elected County Officers shall be expressly in lieu of fees.

Gentlemen:

In October 1931 the Judge of Probate requested that some action be taken to collect money due Marquette County for board of dependent children. As a result of that action there has been One thousand three hundred and thirteen dollars and five cents (\$1313.05) paid into the General Fund during the past thirteen month.

Your County agent had six men who refused to contribute to their children's care arrested for non-support and five of those men pleaded guilty during the last term of Circuit Court. Of those cases one man was sent to Marquette Prison for a one to three year term. The other four were ordered to contribute a total of one hundred dollars each month toward the support of their children. Of that hundred dollars eighty is to be paid into the General Fund and twenty goes to the Holy Family Orphanage. The sixth non-support case has been continued to the next term of Court.

On November 1st an allotment check from the War Department was received. The amount was three hundred and sixty dollars (\$360). The soldier who made the allotment has never been asked to take any responsibility for his children's care since they were made Court Wards until a few months before leaving for service. He contributed a small amount each month before he left and when he found out he could make an allotment for their care now, he promptly did so and the General Fund will receive sixty dollars each month as long as he is in service for the support of his children.

There are a number of others who can and will be made to help care for their children. There is no reason for the County to bear the whole burden in many of these cases. I can do a much better and more thorough collecting job if the Board would give me clerical assistance. I also will be able to spend more time looking after some of these children who cannot get to the Clinic unless some one takes them.

Last month I spoke to the members of the Budget and Executive and Finance Committees asking that the Board rate for children be increased. I would like to withdraw that request and ask instead that we provide for our children as the Michigan Children's Aid Society does by furnishing such extras as haircuts, shoe repair, school supplies, etc. I agree with Mr. Stakel that it would not be fair to the Aid Society for us to raise the board rate and until they raise their rate, I recommend that we do not raise ours.

I have contacted the Managers of the four largest clothing stores in the County and they agree that the price of clothing has increased on the average of ten to twenty per cent over a year ago and such things as silk and rubber goods more than that. They all agreed, however, to give our children special consideration and any reduction in price that is possible.

Your County Agent would like to assure you that he will continue to buy as sensibly as possible and is willing to cooperate in any way that will be a benefit to the County and to the children.

A communication from Mr. L. B. Hadley, Sec'y. of the Marquette County Rationing Board, was read. The communication dealt with the inadequacy of the transportation facilities in the County of Marquette and suggested that the Board might be able to bring some pressure to bear on the Michigan Public Utilities Commission to remedy the situation, inasmuch as the Rationing Board, and also the Chamber of Commerce had given the matter much study and had already written the Commission but as yet had heard of no remedial action to be taken by them.

After remarks by Supervisor Stakel on the matter, as affects the mining industry and college students and others, and discussion by Supervisors Nardi, Ferring, Lindstrom and Nicholas, it was moved by Supervisor Nardi that Supervisor Stakel and the Clerk be authorized to confer with the Rationing Board and the Chamber of Commerce and then to formulate a Resolution and forward to the Michigan Public Utilities Commission the same with the idea in mind that such procedure would help bring the matter to the immediate attention of the Commission and thus help expedite improvement of the present facilities. Supervisor Nardi further moved that the committee have power to act in the matter. Above motion supported by Supervisor Ghiardi and carried unanimously.



Relative to disposition of money received on account of motor vehicle license taxes and gasoline taxes returnable to this County for the calendar year 1943, and in conformity to Public Acts of Michigan Numbers 7 and 8 of the Extra Session of 1934 as amended, your Board of County Road Commissioners recommend:





Dear Sirs:

At the request of the Budget & Executive Committee of your Board, I have examined the question of the legality of a proposed investment of a part of the public funds held by the County Treasurer in securities of the United States Government.

Act 70 of the Public Acts of the State of Michigan of 1933 provides as follows:

"Investment of county funds, Sec. 1. The Board of Supervisors of any county, or the board of county auditors in those counties having a board of county auditors, is hereby authorized to invest public moneys received by the county treasurers of their respective counties, in interest bearing bonds, notes or other securities of the United States government."

A reading of the foregoing section raises the question as to the meaning of "public funds". Act 40, of the Public Acts of the State of Michigan of 1932, first extra session, which is the act providing for the designation of depositories for public moneys and related matters provides as follows:

"Public moneys; definition. Section 1. All moneys which shall come into the hands of any officer of any county or of any township, school district, city or village, or of any other municipal or public corporation within this state, pursuant to any provision of law authorizing such officer to collect or receive the same, shall be denominated public moneys within the meaning of this act."

The Michigan Penal Code, Section 490, has a similar provision regarding the denomination of particular funds as "public moneys". It must be borne in mind that the denomination of all moneys coming into the hands of a county officer, pursuant to a provision of law, authorizing the officer to receive the same, as "public moneys" contained in the Penal Code and in the quoted provision of the Depositories Act is simply for the purposes of each of those two acts, and the mere fact that these funds have been denominated "public moneys" in connection with the two cited acts does not necessarily mean that they are "public moneys" within the meaning of Act 70 of 1933.

However, I have been unable to find that there has been any other legislative or judicial construction of the word "public moneys" in Michigan, and the general subject matter of Act 70 of Public Acts of 1933 is related to the general subject matter of the Depositories Act and the Penal Code provisions in which "public moneys" is defined.

I am, therefore, of the opinion that under the provisions of Act 70 of 1933, quoted above, the Board of Supervisors is authorized to invest in interest-bearing bonds, notes or other securities of the United States Government any moneys coming into the hands of the County Treasurer by virtue of any law authorizing him to collect or receive the same. This, however, would not apply to funds of which the County Treasurer is the custodian or trustee, such as funds deposited with him by order of the Probate Court, et. cetera.

Your County Accountant, after careful examination of the County financial status, respectfully recommends to your Honorable Board that the County Treasurer be authorized to make the following investment of funds, now in his trust, before the end of January, 1943:

That the sum of \$100,000.00 be placed in United States Series "G" current income War Bonds. "G" bonds pay $2\frac{1}{2}\%$ a year, semi-annually by Treasury check. Priced at par and payable at par if held to maturity, 12 years from issue date. Redemption values prior to maturity are somewhat less than par but the cash value at any time, plus interest payment received, always totals more than the purchase price. "G" bonds are redeemable in whole or in part, after 6 months from issue date at fixed redemption values, on the 1st of any month, or at least 1 month's notice.




The Chair called on Mr. Stanley Elder, newly elected representative to the State Legislature from this district, and asked him to say a few words.





Gentlemen:

✓ At the last meeting of the Board of Supervisors held in February there was referred to me for my opinion the matter of a claim of Joe DeGroot for reimbursement for the death of five head of cattle. The circumstances are these:

Mr. DeGroot owns a farm situated near Northland, Michigan. On December 1 and 2, 1942, five head of cattle, consisting of two heifers due to freshen this spring and three steers (two year olds) ready for market, were found dead, and the stomach of one heifer on analysis was found to contain arsenic. Dr. F. K. Hansen, State veterinarian, gave it as his opinion that all five head of cattle had died from the same cause, and there seems to be no reason to doubt his diagnosis.

Mr. DeGroot advises that the cattle had been placed in an old barn which has been unused for some time and that prior to placing the cattle in the barn he had removed therefrom a metal drum which was about half full of a grasshopper poison containing arsenic. An examination of the place from which the barrel was moved after the death of the cattle showed that the cattle had dug up and apparently eaten the earth from beneath the spot where the barrel had stood to a depth of several inches. Mr. DeGroot, stated that the barrel must have had a leak although there apparently wasn't any large leakage.

Mr. Walker, the County Agent, confirmed Mr. DeGroot's statement that three or four years ago the barrel had been left at the DeGroot farm by Mr. Walker after mixing and distributing part of the poison from the barrel to Mr. DeGroot and some of his neighbors. The barrel and its contents had been supplied through Federal Agencies for use by farmers in that area and was left at the farm for their use.

There seems to be no reason to doubt that the death of the cattle was actually caused by eating of poison impregnated earth which had so become impregnated either by leakage or spillage.

Mr. DeGroot values his cattle as follows:

for which he asks reimbursement.

In my opinion, there is definitely no responsibility upon the part of the County toward Mr. DeGroot. As far as I can determine Mr. DeGroot was under no obligation to keep the barrel and its contents and to return it to Mr. Walker or to the Federal authorities. The barrel and its contents were supplied for his convenience and use as well as that of his neighbors. He had control of it and could have taken any necessary precautions to prevent the damage caused, although, of course, I realize that he had no reason to suspect the leakage or subsequent injury to his cattle. He did know that the poison would likely be fatal to the cattle if eaten by them since a few years ago one of his cattle died from eating grain which had been impregnated with the poison and had been put out for grasshopper bait. The occurrence is one of those unfortunate accidents for which no one seems to be liable. Although the loss of these cattle is a severe hardship to Mr. DeGroot, it is my opinion that his claim should be denied by the Board of Supervisors.

We find that Mr. Hanson is residing on Perch Lake in Sections 33 and 34 of Town 46 North, Range 28 W.

Perch Lake is in an area which, according to the zoning ordinance, is restricted.

At the time of this zoning ordinance there was no part of this area listed as non conforming and therefore Mr. Hanson is resident in an area contrary to the provisions of the County Zoning ordinance.

The area in which Mr. Hanson resides is used for resort purposes and in recent years plowing services were given at times so that the cottage owners could use their properties. This service is subject to restrictions as conditions require.

Because Mr. Hanson is now resident and has been provided with plow service by Ely Township, notwithstanding the fact that this road was not included in the plow schedule this year by the County, and as it would be very difficult for Mr. Hanson to make other arrangements at this time, the Road Commission will keep the road open for the balance of this winter.

Plowing services given Mr. Hanson this season should not be considered as a precedent which will bind the County Road Commission at any future date or add this road to the plowing schedule.

Gentlemen:

At the March meeting of your Board there was referred to the Sheriff and the Prosecuting Attorney the matter of the bill of H. M. Hansen of L'Anse, Michigan for ambulance service for Oscar Joki, of Negaunee.

An investigation disclosed that Oscar Joki was injured in an accident September 7, 1941. The accident occurred on Highway M 28, Baraga County, Covington Township. Subsequently, Joki was taken to L'Anse and placed under the care of Dr. H. J. Winkler. He was taken to the Ishpeming Hospital at Ishpeming by ambulance on September 8, 1943. Shortly thereafter he died.

Apparently, attempts were made by Mr. Hansen to collect the bill from Mrs. Joki, but these attempts were unsuccessful. Since the meeting of your Board, at which time Mr. Hansen's bill was referred to us, two additional bills have been received by the County, as follows:

H. J. Winkler, M. D., L'Anse, Michigan--X-rays, medical services, hospitalization and nurse's services rendered Oscar Joki--\$38.00.

Mrs. August Strieter--Nursing services night of September 7, 1941 and day of September 8, 1941, furnished to Oscar Joki--\$14.00

Inasmuch as all of these bills concern the same individual, we thought it best to prepare a report on the whole matter for your consideration. A check with the County Welfare Department indicates that Oscar Joki was not an indigent person and had never received aid from the County.

The general act which provides free hospital, medical and surgical treatment, being Act No. 262 of the Public Acts of 1915, as amended by Act No. 304 of the Public Acts of 1939, applies only to indigent persons and those persons who by reason of severe physical injury may have become County charges and certain other classes of persons. The act contemplates investigation of cases before assumption of liability for charges by the County, and in the opinion of the Prosecuting Attorney it does not seem to apply to this particular type of situation.

Act No. 176 of the Public Acts of 1937 provides for ambulance transportation for persons injured on highways and provides that the cost thereof shall be paid from the general fund of the County. From the wording of the act, it is the opinion of the Prosecuting Attorney that the liability for payment of ambulance charges is a liability of the County where the accident occurs and that it does not contemplate payment for ambulance services other than a service rendered by transporting the injured person from the scene of the accident to a hospital or a place of medical care. It does not seem to contemplate payment of any subsequent transportation, and as we understand the particular facts herein involved. Mr. Hansen is asking payment for services rendered in taking Oscar Joki to Ishpeming from L'Anse.

It is our recommendation that the payment of all three of these bills be denied by the Board of Supervisors.

Gentlemen:

At the last meeting of your Board, there was referred to the Sheriff and the Prosecuting Attorney a letter from Mary C. Ryan, of Ishpeming, concerning the family dog.

Miss Ryan advised that on February 10, Mr. A. P. Christensen, county dog warden, had come to their home, entered and taken the dog away without the consent of her mother, although her mother was at home at the time and watched Mr. Christensen take the dog from the house. Miss Ryan advised that the dog was the property of her sister, Agnes Ryan, and her nephew, Robert, who also lived at the same house; that the dog had a good disposition and bore a license.

An investigation of the matter is not very revealing. Mr. Christensen advises that the occurrence took place February 11 instead of February 10, and that he had had complaints concerning a dog at the Barnum Location and while investigating was advised by one of the residents of the location that Mrs. Ryan wanted him to dispose of her dog. He states that he went over to Mrs. Ryan's house and inquired concerning the dog and that she said she would like to have it shot but didn't want it shot on the property. Mrs. Ryan asked him to take the dog and he came into the house to get it and did take it, then brought it to the city dump where he shot it and left it for incineration. Upon inquiry, Mrs. Ryan, the mother of Mary C. Ryan and Agnes Ryan, who is a woman about 78 years of age, supported her daughter Mary's story as outlined in her letter to the Board and denied that Mr. Christensen's story was correct.

The above, we think, fairly states the claims of the two sides involved, and it is difficult to find any additional information throwing light on the question of which story is correct. The matter of the dog being licensed or unlicensed is not of any importance since no matter whether the dog was licensed or not, if Mr. Christensen's contention is true, he certainly acted in good faith in taking the dog from Mrs. Ryan and did not commit a trespass in entering the house. On the other hand, if Mr. Christensen's contention is not true, he would not have had any right to take the dog from within the house whether licensed or unlicensed without first taking proper legal steps.

If Mr. Christensen entered and took the dog without authority, as claimed by Miss Mary Ryan, the County would incur no liability for his unauthorized act. The facts in this case as presented by each party to the dispute are so opposed, and it is so difficult to determine the correctness of the story of either party, that the proper procedure is probably to leave Miss Ryan or her family to a civil action if they still feel that the dog was wrongfully taken.

Mr. Christensen has been advised that in the future where he takes dogs on request for disposition he should as carefully as possible ascertain the ownership of the dog and obtain from that person a written request to take and dispose of the dog. If this procedure is carried out, a dispute of this kind should not arise again.

Gentlemen:

There is a tremendous shortage of farm labor at the present time all over the United States. There is a shortage of many food products also and will be more because of labor shortage and because the Government is purchasing at least 25 percent of all farm produced foods for Lend-Lease and the Armies of our country and our Allies. The Government has already contracted for 50 percent of all canned fruits and vegetables to be produced and packed this year. A large percentage of fresh fruits and vegetables are also used by the armed forces of this country.

This makes it very essential that every family, regardless of where living, raise and preserve its own fruits and vegetables if at all possible. This is not only essential for the sake of food but for health, especially growing children, as we all know fruits and vegetables are very essential to health.

The Extension Division of Michigan State College has offered Marquette County added assistance in organizing boys and girls for the production and preservation of food this summer. The Extension Department will pay the salary for a man, amounting to \$750, if the county will pay his travelling expenses, not to exceed a total of \$300.

The Agricultural Committee has considered the offer of the Michigan State College Extension Division and believe Marquette County should cooperate during the summer months and recommend that \$300 be taken from the general fund for this purpose.

We find all departments operating in the usual manner although all are handicapped for help and materials in carrying on their work.

At the Court House and Jail we found considerable repairs needed and the Purchasing Agent was authorized to call for bids, which have been received, and the bids and our belief as to proper disposition of the same is recommended to your Board in another communication being transmitted herewith.

At the Fair Grounds we find that the grand stand, exhibition hall and most of the buildings have been removed, and that the remaining buildings are deteriorating rapidly from vandalism and because of no occupancy of the grounds.

We are also making recommendations relative to the Fair Grounds in another communication being transmitted herewith.

We recommend acceptance of the report.

We do not believe that bids on balance of the work are favorable to the County and we recommend that all remaining bids be rejected and the County Purchasing Agent be authorized to make the repairs and do the most necessary painting; such work to do done, as possible, under his supervision, at a cost not to exceed Fifteen Hundred Dollars.





The Chairman appointed Supervisor Van Riper, Stanley Williams, School Commissioner and the Prosecuting Attorney to draft the proper resolution and asked if they would retire to compose the resolution and then present it to the Board before adjournment.







Dear Sirs: - You have asked for my opinion regarding the effect of Act No. 114, of the Public Acts of the State of Michigan of 1943, which Act amends Section 854 and 855 of the Compiled Laws of 1929, as amended by Act No. 257 of the Public Acts of 1931, and which latter Act of 1931 provided for the levy of a tax by the Board of Supervisors, not exceeding a tenth of a mill on each dollar, for the purpose of creating a fund for the relief of honorably discharged indigent soldiers, sailors, and marines of the Civil War, Spanish-American War, Philippine Insurrection, Boxer Uprising, and the first World War,

and for the indigent wives, widows, minor children, and mothers of such servicemen, and includes female nurses of all such wars.

The 1931 Act further provides that the Board may in any emergency appropriate a sum not to exceed two-tenths of a mill for such purpose. The new act, being Act No. 114, of the Public Acts of 1943, simply amends the 1931 Act to extend the relief to servicemen and nurses and the families of such servicemen "of all other wars or military expeditions in which the United States of America has been, is, or may hereafter be, a participant", and further provides that the funds raised in accordance with the amended statute "may be expended for the relief of indigent wives and children of soldiers, sailors, marines and nurses during the continuance of present hostilities and prior to the discharge of such soldiers, sailors, marines and nurses."

It will be noted from the foregoing that the amendatory act of 1943 is essentially similar to the prior act, except that it extends relief to servicemen in the present war and to their indigent dependents, and provides that the funds may be expended for the relief of the indigent dependents during the continuance of the present hostilities and prior to the discharge of the servicemen.

The language of each of the acts, the Act of 1931 and the amended act, placing responsibility on the Board of Supervisors for the levy of the tax, is identical.

With regard to the one-tenth of a mill tax, Act No. 114 of 1943 provides "That it shall be the duty of the Board of Supervisors of the several counties of this state to levy *****", and with regard to the two-tenths of a mill tax the Act provides "they may appropriate a sum not to exceed two-tenths of a mill on each dollar for said purpose."

Under date of February 17, 1933, the Attorney General issued an opinion to the effect that it is mandatory upon the County Supervisors to levy a tax not to exceed one-tenth of a mill for relief of soldiers, etc. and in the event of an emergency may levy not to exceed two-tenths of a mill in its discretion.

In my opinion, this is the correct interpretation and it is mandatory upon your Board to levy each year, for the purpose stated in the Act, a tax not exceeding one-tenth of a mill on each dollar.

You may, in my opinion, where an emergency justifying such a course exists, increase the amount of this tax to two-tenths of a mill.

Gentlemen: - The Marquette County Chapter of the American Red Cross has for many years cooperated with the County in a County Nursing Service program. By arrangement with you in recent years we have engaged the County Nurse and supervised her activities. You have paid her salary and we have supplied an automobile and paid all expenses. We have been quite enthusiastic about the work which has been done and the and the results accomplished throughout the County.

The National Organization of the Red Cross has a definite policy permitting local chapters to cooperate for a reasonable length of time with local public officials in matters of this kind but with idea that after a trial period such organization should absorb their public health responsibilities. Our Area Headquarters at St. Louis is naturally governed by that policy and feels that ample time has elapsed to enable Marquette County to determine the desirability of this service. Consequently, they have now requested that our chapter withdraw its support effective October first and we wish to so advise you.

We trust you will recognize the desirability of continuing this Nursing Service as a wholly operated and supervised County program. We are especially concerned that some constructive plans may be effected to develop high grade public health service. We should be pleased to confer with the proper committee and to cooperate in making the transition.

Gentlemen: - As you may know, I have been interested in the Salvage Program in Marquette County since its inception in January of 1942. First as Marquette County Salvage Chairman and later as Marquette City Chairman.

In the County we have eight separate salvage programs functioning. All of these programs are self-supporting except one. By self-supporting I mean that when the material is salvaged and sold to the junk dealer, enough is realized to that the expense incidental to collection can be deducted from proceeds obtained.

The one program which is not self-supporting is the Fur Salvage Program. This is a County Wide program and generally speaking, the plan is this: Individuals having fur coats, where the fur has not been damaged, may turn the coats over to Larry P. Schuster, Furrier, Harlow Block, Marquette, Michigan. The furs are all donated by the individual contributors. Mr. Schuster sorts, packs and ships these furs to the Master Furriers Association in Chicago. This Association working as individual workers on their own time, clean, cut and make these furs into fur-lined jackets which are delivered without charge to the United States Navy and United States Marines. In other words, there is not a cent of money handled, by anyone any place in the program. It costs us money to ship the furs to Chicago. Up to this time the express charges have been paid by the Marquette County Salvage Committee, but that Committee no longer has money available for payment of this expense. To date we have contributed approximately twelve hundred pounds of furs which is enough conservatively to make about seventy-five fur lined jackets. We believe the program is a worthy one, and one that we should not have to abandon because of lack of funds.

I, therefore, submit the above facts to you with the request that some money be made available to pay these charges. At the present time we owe Mr. Schuster \$16.68, which he has already advanced, and he has another lot of furs ready now to ship. It is my estimate that an appropriation of \$30.00 would cover what expense we need up to this time, and it is my suggestion that something in addition to this amount be appropriated so we would not have to make a request for money every time we have furs to ship.

This appropriation should be made to Miss Grace Wilson, Marquette County Salvage Chairman.

Report of Morgan Heights Contact Committee

October 8, 1943.

To the Honorable The Board of Supervisors
of Marquette County.

This is to report that we-all of the members of the Morgan Heights Contact Committee--made our usual annual inspection of the institution on Tuesday the 5th instant. At the conclusion of the tour through the institution, we had a dinner-meeting with the Board of Trustees and the Superintendent, at which time various matters affecting the Sanatorium were fully discussed.

We inspected the scene of the recent fire and learned that the loss had been adjusted, fully compensating for the damage. We approve the change which is being made by cutting through a door thus making it possible for a fire, if one should ever occur in the future to be handled more efficiently than was this one.

We approve the efforts of the Board of Trustees to engage an assistant to the Superintendent, who due to War conditions has been alone on the job for about eight months. We discussed and approved the tentative budget of \$45,000.00. We understand that the annual report, which heretofore has been made at this time, will not be prepared until after the first of the year due to change in the fiscal year so that the same will coincide with the calendar year.

We again extend our entire commendation of the administration of the Board of Trustees and believe that the affairs of the institution are competently supervised and that these men are faithfully devoting an adequate amount of time to this job.

We feel that Morgan Heights Sanatorium and the County of Marquette are to be congratulated upon being able to have the services of Doctor Robert F. Berry as Superintendent. He is an able administrator and gives close attention to the details of management. In addition to that he is a recognized expert on Tuberculosis and a skilled surgeon. All necessary operations are performed by him at the Sanatorium, thus making it unnecessary to call outside surgeons or to send cases to Ann Arbor.





Sirs:-- Relative to disposition of money received on account of motor vehicle license taxes and gasoline taxes returnable to this County for the calendar year 1944, and in conformity to Public Acts of Michigan Numbers 7 and 8 of the Extra Session of 1934 as amended, your Board of County Road Commissioners recommended:

Pursuant to such acts, one half of each settlement on account of the above mentioned monies, is to be credited to the County Road Fund to be used for administration, maintenance, betterments, and constructions of County Roads.

Further, pursuant to such acts, that the remainder, hereinafter called the second half of such monies, as returned to Marquette County shall be applied as follows and in the following order of priority:

First priority of second half--The sum of \$26,339.87 shall be credited to the Highway Bond Retirement Fund to pay principal, interest, and disbursing fees on the General County Highway Bonds for payments due thereon, to and inclusive of the interest payments payable in April 1945, which interest payment comes due prior to anticipated receipts on monies from these sources for the year 1945.

Second priority of second half--The difference between the second half of such above mentioned monies and the amount of money to be credited to the Highway Bond Retirement Fund is then to be divided and applied as follows:

Gentlemen:--Your special committee appointed to look into the matter of post war planning reports

We have had two meetings at both of which the Road Commission had representatives. We appointed a special sub committee who met with the Prosecuting Attorney and we developed these findings.

It is possible that post war unemployment could reach (at some time) at peak in

this county which would require provision for approximately 10,000 cases. To meet such a demand efficient planning and use of every possible agency in a coordinated plan is of course necessary.

The Legislature, in its last session enacted a statute providing for a State Planning Committee and specifying its powers and duties. The same session of the Legislature amended the act having to do with a County Planning Commission. While the session laws for 1943 have not been received in the County, the provisions of these laws are now before us in a manual issued by the State Planning Commission.

The Legislative Acts governing the State Planning Commission and the County Planning Commission are not complimentary. Confusion is possible unless prevented through a proper set up in this County is not in accordance with these new Statutes.

We believe Marquette County should create and have a County Planning Commission set up along the lines prescribed in Act 285 PA 1931 as amended, and with powers and duties as outlined by resolution of this Board.

In accordance with such finds your committee recommend that the Board of Supervisors adopt the following resolution: viz--

"Resolved by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Marquette, that in line with the provisions of Act 285 PA 1931, as amended, by Act 163 PA 1943, that Marquette County create and have a County Planning Commission to be known as the Marquette County Planning Commission:

That said planning commission have all powers and duties as provided in the aforementioned statutes including the assuming of all powers and duties of the County Planning Committee heretofore established pursuant to the provisions of the Marquette County Planning Ordinance:

That said County Planning Commission be charged with responsibility, for after the war planning with cooperation with all State and Federal Agencies having to do with unemployment or other relief, and with the coordinating of all programs, so far as possible to the end that the greatest possible good be accomplished and the greatest possible aid be given through utilizing such abilities and funds as may be or become available, and to that end such County Planning Commission is directed to cooperate with the State Planning Commission and any or all Federal Agencies. The County Planning Commission shall have the same powers and duties within the County as the State Planning Commission has within the State; and

That said Planning Commission shall cooperate with any and all Boards, Committees and Groups, within the County, and assist so far as possible in coordinating all activities;

Be it further resolved that the County Planning Commission shall be a body of nine men. That the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors shall be one of those nine and that an Administrative official of the County and one other member of the Board of Supervisors appointed by the Chairman of the Board and approved by the Board of Supervisors shall make up the three ex-officio members on said Commission, and that the remaining six men in the nine man commission be citizens of the County appointed by the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors, provided that all appointments shall be approved by the Board of Supervisors prior to becoming effective:

That the ex-officio members hold office during the tenure of office of the Chairman as Chairman of the Board of Supervisors, and until their successors are elected and appointed to this Commission, and that in the first instance two of the remaining members of the Commission be appointed for one year, two for two years and two for three years and thereafter two members of the Planning Commission shall be appointed each year at the Annual Meeting of the Board of Supervisors each to hold office for a term of three years, or until their successors are appointed and take office.

To start the operation of the County Planning Commission, the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors shall direct a time and place for holding the first meeting of the County Planning Commission, at which time the members of the Commission shall meet, elect a chairman from among their own members, create such offices and committees and fill them from their own membership, and do such things as appears proper for carrying out the intent of this resolution. They shall prescribe rules of conduct and provide from time to time ~~during~~ for amending such rules and determining matters of policy and procedure, providing that nothing herein shall be construed to prevent the County Planning Commission from cooperating with Planning Committees of the various political subdivisions within the County or with groups of interested citizens and provided further, that said County Planning Commission be empowered to appoint and create committees in townships, cities, or for special purposes, when in the opinion of said County Commission such committees are deemed desirable, to be made up of citizens not having membership on said County Commission."

Gentlemen:--Our County finances are such that we have funds available for investing. At one time we were able to purchase Certificates of Deposit, but the interest is so low on this type of deposit at the present time that it is more to our interest to have our money in Government Bonds. The matter was discussed at our last meeting of the Budget and Executive Committee and seeing there is to be a campaign in January to sell the fourth issue of U.S. Bonds, it was thought advisable to bring this matter to the attention of the Board today, so that approval for the purchase may be had at this meeting.

I therefore offer the following resolution:

WHEREAS, The County of Marquette has, at the present time, surplus funds in the amount of \$50,000.00 which could be invested in Government bonds; and

WHEREAS, Investment of said sum would cause no serious depletion of working surplus, but on the contrary would redound to the advantage of the County:

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of Marquette County authorize the County Treasurer to purchase between the dates of January 18th and January 31st, 1944, \$50,000.00 of United States Series "G" current income war bonds. "G" bonds pay 2½ per cent per year, semi-annually by Treasury Check. Priced at par and payable at par if held to maturity. 12 years from issue date. Redemption values prior to maturity are somewhat less than par but the cash value at any time, plus interest payment received, always totals more than the purchase price. "G" bonds are redeemable in whole or in part, after 6 months from issue date at fixed redemption values, on the 1st of any month, on at least 1 month's notice. Gentlemen:- In accordance with your request I have gone into the question of the matter of fees and compensation of the county dog warden, and have discussed the matter with members of the Auditing Committee and B. & E. Committee and with the present dog warden, Mr. Christenson.

Based upon my investigation and discussions aforesaid, a resolution has been drafted covering the matter, copy of which is attached hereto.

The difference between the proposed resolution and the resolution which was adopted by your board on June 27, 1940, are as follows:

1. The dog warden is authorized under the new resolution to maintain a dog pound for keeping and feeding dogs which come into his custody and for which he shall be compensated for at the rate of \$30.00 per month.

Mr. Christenson has in the past maintained such a pound and has been paid at the rate of \$1.00 per day with the approval of the Auditing Committee, but the matter has never been specifically provided for by resolution of this board.

2. The dog warden is authorized under the new resolution to charge the owners of stray dogs which have come into his possession on complaint the sum of \$1.00 as a pound fee and the sum of \$.25 per day for each day that the dog remains in his custody and he is further authorized to demand that the owner be required to secure a license for his dog before releasing it. These fees are to be kept by the dog warden.

Mr. Christenson advises me that he has made these charges in the past but there has never been any specific provision in the resolutions of this board authorizing it.

3. The new resolution appoints A. C. Christenson as dog warden for a period of One year commencing January 1, 1944.

It is my recommendation that your board adopt this resolution so as to avoid confusion and misunderstanding as to what the dog warden is entitled to.

Be It Resolved: That pursuant to the provisions of Section 16 of the state dog law, the Board of Supervisors for the County of Marquette, hereby appoints A. C. Christenson as dog warden for Marquette County for a period of One (1) year, commencing January 1, 1944.

A. Such dog warden shall have all the powers, rights and duties allowed by law to enforce the state dog law. The dog warden shall enumerate all dogs in the county; and may assist the treasurer in selling dog licenses.

His compensation shall be as follows:

Ten cents (10¢) for each dog enumerated; ten cents (10¢) for each dog licensed; and One (\$1.00) Dollar forv each dog killed and buried.

B. The dog warden shall maintain a suitable dog pound in which he shall keep and feed dogs which come into his custody and for so maintaining and keeping said dog pound, he shall receive from the county, the sum of Thirty (\$30.00) Dollars per month.

C. For all dogs which the dog warden shall keep in his pound and which may be claimed by and returned to the owner, the dog warden shall be entitled to a pound fee of One (\$1.00) Dollar for each dog plus Twenty-five (\$.25) cents per day for the board of said dog, which shall be paid by the dog owner and which may be kept by the dog warden. The dog warden may require the payment of these fees before releasing the dog and he shall also require that a dog license be procured for said dog before releasing it to the owner.

D. Other legal and reasonable expenses of the dog warden shall be audited and paid for by the Board of Supervisors.

E. The dog warden may appoint a deputy who shall have the same powers and duties as the dog warden, but for whose acts the dog warden shall be responsible and who shall be compensated by the dog warden.

F. Any provision in any prior resolution of this Board of Supervisors contrary to or in conflict with this resolution is hereby repealed.

Supervisor Wiseman moved the resolution be adopted, supported by Supervisor Beaudry and carried. Supervisor Aho moved, as an amendment to the above motion that the Board





We, the Members of the Board of Supervisors of Marquette County resolve:

I, That it is particularly fitting at this critical period in our country's history that we review and rededicate ourselves to those principles which have made general education available to all of the people, which is so important in a democratic form of government. It is as true now as when Jefferson, said, "Above all things, I hope the education of the common people will be attended to",-- and Washington in his Farewell Address said, "promote then, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the diffusion of knowledge."

II, That in keeping with these principles we recognize the importance of educational opportunities for our children on the elementary, the high school and the college levels, and that we as individuals as well as members of county boards of supervisors shall encourage the maintenance of these opportunities for our children.

III, That in keeping with the principles of a democratic society it is important that educational opportunities on a college level be made available to the young men and women of the Upper Peninsula to enable them to meet the increased responsibilities which we are asking them to assume.

IV, That, to meet the needs of these young men and women, the State of Michigan through its Legislature and respective boards of control be encouraged to make provision for such changes and additions in the educational programs and physical plants as may be necessary at the Michigan College of Mining and Technology and at the Northern Michigan College of Education.





At the last meeting of the Board, the matter of a claim for Seventy-five dollars (\$75.00) for funeral expenses of John Cooney, an honorably discharged soldier of World War I was referred to me.

This is to advise that Section 4.1321 of the Michigan Statutes Annotated provides that whenever any honorably discharged soldier shall die, leaving an estate of \$3,000 or less, and has left a dependant or dependants surviving him, the County shall pay the sum of Seventy-five Dollars (\$75.00) towards such funeral expense.

I discussed this case with Commander Robbin Young of Marquette, who is in charge of Veterans Funerals for the Marquette Branch of the American Legion and he advised me that John F. Cooney died without leaving an estate and that he was a Veteran of World War I. An Investigation of the records of the Probate Court revealed that his estate has never been probated.

On the basis of the above facts, it is my opinion that the County is obligated to pay the sum of Seventy-five Dollars (\$75.00) to Mrs. John F. Cooney towards her late husbands funeral expense and I recommend payment of the claim as filed.

I questioned the dog warden about this matter and attached here to is his signed statement as to his version of the matter.

It is my opinion that the county is not liable for damages caused by the misconduct, if any, of the dog warden, and that the proper remedy of one who has suffered an injury or has a claim for damages as a result of the misconduct on the part of the dog warden is a civil action against him personally in a court of law.

The dog warden is engaged as such in the performance of a governmental function and the county is not responsible for misconduct on his part, but he is personally responsible to the persons aggrieved by his misconduct, and it is for the court and the jury to pass upon the question of whether he acted in an illegal manner.





Gentlemen:

At your last meeting you referred to me the matter of the claim of Carl W. Carlson of Negaunee for eleven (11) chickens allegedly killed by dogs at \$1.50 each on April 16, 1944.

This is to advise that under the provisions of Sections 20 to 23 of the dog law any person who claims damages as the result of the killing or destruction of fowl or other animals must make a complaint forthwith before a Justice of the Peace. It is then the duty of the Justice to thoroughly investigate the matter and if he finds that the complaint is true he must make a report to the Board of Supervisors setting forth the facts and the extent of the damage. Upon the filing of the report, it is then the duty of the County to pay the claim.

I consulted Mr. Robert Northey, Municipal Judge at Negaunee who advised me that he and the dog warden made an investigation of the matter and found the claim to be correct but he failed to file a report.

The statute sets up a limit on the amount of compensation to be paid for damage for fowl and livestock and in the case of chickens the top limit is \$1.00 for each head.

I have secured and am attaching hereto Mr. Robert Northey's report and I recommend the payment of the claim to the extent of \$1.00 for each chicken or a total of \$11.00.

Gentlemen:

Your Committee on Buildings, Grounds and Insurance met on June 21 and June 22 and inspected the Infirmary, the Court House and Jail group, the Road Commission buildings at Ishpeming, Gwinn, Skandia, Marquette and Republic, the buildings at Morgan Heights, the County Airport and at Van Riper Park.

We find the buildings and grounds being well maintained, and we commend the various County departments for the manner in which they are operating.

At the Court House we find that the windows and exterior trim are in need of repair and painting, and we recommend that the County Purchasing Agent be wuthorized to call for bids on glazing and repairing the windows, and for repairing and painting all exterior wooden trim on the Court House.

At the Jail we find that the floor in the kitchen has sagged considerably, and that the linoleum covering in the kitchen should be replaced. Also at the Jail we find that the wooden steps on the Baraga Avenue entrance are in need of repair.

We recommend that the County Purchasing Agent be authorized to make the necessary arrangements for the repair of the steps, and that he be authorized to arrange for repairing the kitchen floor and providing a new linoleum, or other suitable material. We realize that due to the labor and material situation, the repairs to the kitchen floor can, at this time, probably be only of a temporary nature.

Your Morgan Heights Contact Committee begs to report that it met at the Sanatorium in the evening of June 12, 1944, for the purpose of discussing the resolution referred to it at the last meeting of the Board of Supervisors. Present at the meeting were the six members of the Contact Committee, Prosecuting Attorney Davidson, Trustees Collins and Pearce and Superintendent Dr. Berry.

The entire question of the incidence, diagnosis and treatment of the disease known as silicosis was discussed at length.

It was pointed out to the satisfaction of your Committee that the personnel and facilities of the Sanatorium have at all times been available to the people of Marquette County, largely of course for the prevention and treatment of Tuberculosis, inasmuch as that is the particular function of the Sanatorium. It was stated that copies of the report dealing with the interpretation of the x-rays had always been furnished to the patient's family physician, but, that it had not been the practice of all times to give copies to the patients.

However, Dr. Berry agreed to make three copies of the reports in the future, so that a copy would be available to the patient if he desired to have the same.

Attached hereto is a letter from the Chairman of the Board of Trustees and which may be considered in connection with this report.

The Contact Committee took the opportunity of being at the Sanatorium to make a brief trip through the institution finding the same to be in its usual clean and orderly condition.

Dear Mr. Ghiardi;

The purpose of this letter is to review briefly the discussion held last evening between your Committee and ourselves.

The reason for the meeting was to consider the resolution offered to the Board of Supervisors at its last meeting as presented by the Marquette County C. I. O. Council and which was referred to your Committee. This resolution had to do with the broad question of (and I quote) "having the technical personnel and facilities of the Morgan Heights Sanatorium available to employees of the mining companies who have or have reason to believe they have, the disease known as silicosis."

The various angles were discussed by members of your Committee, the Trustees and Dr. Berry, our Superintendent. Dr. Berry dwelt upon the medical phase of this disease and its relationship to tuberculosis.

Present at the discussion also was the County's legal advisor, Mr. Bernard H. Davidson, the Prosecuting Attorney. He discussed the history of the organization of Morgan Heights Sanatorium and more especially, the legal angles of its organization and the statutes under which it is operated.

To summarize the results of the discussion. The officials of the Sanatorium stated that at all times its personnel and equipment have been available in the past for the x-raying of all residents of Marquette County who had or feared they might have a chest disease, and that the x-rays have been interpreted and a copy of the report transmitted to the applicant's family physician. In some instances, copies of this report have

been given to the patient, but ordinarily not unless asked for. However, Dr. Berry stated that future reports would all be made in triplicate, one copy to be retained in the files of the Sanatorium, another copy transmitted to the applicant's family physician and the third copy available to the patient if he desired the same.

I trust the foregoing will be found helpful in the deliberations of your Committee.

This Board of Supervisors, at their annual meeting, October 13th, 1941, authorized a budget for general county purposes of \$416,121.84. Of this amount the sum of \$375,864.03 was to be raised by taxation and the balance or \$40,257.81 was to be taken from the reserve in the general fund.

The reason for using \$40,257.81 of general fund reserve was that the board found it necessary to give the city and township school districts more money to run their schools. The only way possible to give such aid was to cut the county tax millage rate down so that the county tax allocation committee could allocate more millage to the schools. The county and county road tax rate for 1940 was 8.2 mills or \$8.20 per \$1,000 of valuation. The action taken by the board reduced the county and county road tax rate to 7.4 mills or \$7.40 per \$1,000 of valuation for 1941. The reduction in millage was given to the school districts in order that some would not have to close their doors.

Since the action taken by the board of supervisors the state of Michigan realizing the necessity for raising more funds for school purposes ran thru legislation in 1941, an act known as Act 368 of the Public Acts of 1941, appropriating \$44,500,000, for aid in the support of the public schools of the state for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1942, and each fiscal year thereafter. The legislature in 1943 put thru an act known as Act 239 of the Public Acts of 1943, raising the appropriation for aid in the support of the public schools of the state to \$50,000,000. Under Sec. 29 of this Act there is a proviso which, I believe, materially affects county allocation of taxes, I quote: "Provided, That no school district shall be allotted or paid any sum under the provisions of this Act unless the operating tax rate of such district for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1944, is equal to or greater than the rate of the operating tax for school purposes in such district for the year ending June 30, 1943, except in such special cases as the superintendent of public instructions shall have approved a lesser rate".

I believe you can see the point in the case of Marquette County. If you gentlemen raise the county tax rate it will be necessary to take away from the tax rates of the schools, thereby jeopardizing state aid for our schools in this County.

The City of Ishpeming brought in an assessment roll today to this Board in which they have made a 10 per cent reduction in non-mining properties, amounting to \$389,650. The city of Negaunee have also a roll before this board today with a 5 per cent reduction in non-mining properties, amounting to \$100,000. In the case of both cities this means in plain English that the city of Marquette and the 19 Townships will have to pay an unjust portion of the city of Ishpeming and city of Negaunee taxes, unless this Board today equalizes the valuation back up where they belong.

I believe the majority of this board believes, that if ever there was a time in the history of Marquette County to raise valuations instead of lowering them, this would be the year. In reducing the tax valuation the sum of \$389,650 in the city of Ishpeming, the Ishpeming schools will lose \$2,883.41 based on their last year's tax rate, which I believe they can ill afford to lose. This board cannot help cannot help the school system in Ishpeming in this case. In reducing the tax valuation \$100,000 in the City of Negaunee, the Negaunee schools will lose the sum of \$740.00. In the case of the City of Negaunee the taxpayers of that city voted additional millage to help their schools. This board cannot help the school system in this loss based on the millage allocated by the Marquette County Tax Commission last year of 7.4 mills.

Gentlemen, based on the facts above, I recommend that the equalization committee bring back for the approval of this board of supervisors a report equalizing the city of Ishpeming by adding the sum of \$389,650 to the valuation of the taxable property in said city. Further, that the city of Negaunee be equalized by adding the sum of \$100,000 to the valuation of the taxable property in said city. I also recommend that the city of Marquette and the 19 townships of the county be equalized at their assessed valuations.

Gentlemen:

At your meeting in August, 1944, you referred to me the matter of the claims for funeral expenses for James A. Todd and William J. Boldt.

In the past, when these claims were referred to me I recommended payment for the reason that I had sufficient knowledge of the facts to be able to do so.

However, in the present two cases, I do not have the necessary information available and I therefore have referred the matter to Messrs. Ralph Magnuson of Ishpeming, John P. Collins of Negaunee and Joseph P. Gannon of Marquette, who are members of the Soldiers' Relief Commission for Marquette County, for the purpose of investigation and report back to your Board, as provided in Section 2 of Act No. 122 of the Public Acts of 1943.

The statute provides for reimbursement for funeral expenses in the sum of \$75.00 for deceased veterans in counties having a population of less than 50,000, which is the case in Marquette County.

Section 2 above referred to, which provides for reference of these claims to the Soldiers' Relief Commission and which section is self-explanatory, reads as follows:

"It shall be the duty of the members of the soldiers' relief commission of each county, whenever application is made for reimbursement by the county for such funeral expenses paid or advanced, or incurred for the burial of such deceased person, to make an investigation of such claim and report their action to the clerk of the board of supervisors of the county, or to the clerk of the board of county auditors as the case may be, in all cases setting forth all the facts, together with the name, rank and command to which such soldier, sailor or marine belonged and in case of wife or widow, the rank and command to which her husband or deceased husband belonged, the name and service rendered as such army nurse, the date of his or her death, place where buried, and his or her residence or occupation, while living. They shall require such person or persons who paid, advanced or incurred such burial expenses for such deceased person to furnish the board of supervisors or board of county auditors in counties having a board of county auditors, with a sworn itemized statement of the expenses incurred in the burial of the deceased person mentioned in the application. The members of the commission, except where they are paid a salary, shall receive from the county the sum of \$2.00 per day for the time actually and necessarily employed in the performance of their duties."

It is my opinion that hereafter, claims for reimbursement under this statute be referred to the Soldiers' Relief Commission.

Your Committee also gave the County Nurse, Miss Emma Anderson, permission to take a refresher course in active public health nursing to be held at the University Hospital September 25 to 29, this year.

We recommend concurrence in the above action of your Committee.

At this juncture Supervisor Voelker gave a detailed account of his trip as a representative of Marquette County at the meeting of the State Board of Equalization. Mr. Voelker was appointed by the Chairman in the absence of Mr. Denny, who was seriously ill. Mr. Voelker gave a great deal of credit to Mr. William Gray of the Road Commission for his help in the preparation of the protest to the State Board of Equalization. At the bequest of the Chairman, Supervisor Voelker read the following report to the State Board of Equalization.

PROTEST TO STATE BOARD OF EQUALIZATION - 1944.

My name is John D. Voelker, from Ishpeming, Marquette County. I am a member of the Board of Supervisors of Marquette County, and have been appointed to represent that county at this meeting.

On behalf of Marquette County I desire to protest the estimated equalized valuation of Marquette County from \$49,358,015 to \$60,000,000, as recommended by the State Tax Commission.

This represents a 22% increase over the assessed valuation. Yet the total recommended equalization for the entire state this year represents roughly but a 7% increase over the final equalized valuation for the state last year. Marquette County's increase is 22%, or more than three times this percentage of statewide increase. Only four counties of the state having a higher assessed valuation have a recommended equalized valuation in excess of 22%. These four counties are Calhoun, Macomb, Oakland and Ottawa. While I am not advised as to the assessing practices which may exist in those counties, it was a revelation to me that Marquette County seems to have achieved the unenviable distinction of being in fifth place in the State in presumable underassessment, in proportion to the amount of money involved. This is assuming that underassessment by our local assessing authorities is the real reason for such a sharp increase in our equalized valuation. It this is the true reason or if there are any other reasons, we think we are entitled to know them, so that we can mend our ways. I had always been led to believe that Marquette County was among the more conservative counties in its honest application of the true cash value principle.

You may possibly say that percentages alone are not the whole story. Yet Marquette County stands 19th on the list of counties, both as to assessed and recommended equalized valuations. When you are dealing with assessed valuations of roughly \$50,000,000, an increase of 1% is serious, let alone an increase of 7% or 22%. Especially is this true when you consider the small population of Marquette County and the fact that there are only a handful of counties that have a larger assessed valuation per capita.

I am reliably informed that this recommended increase will represent a prospective loss in state aid of more than \$13,000.00, to the schools of Marquette County. That may not be so serious to some counties, where school systems are compact and close-knit, but when I remind you that Marquette County is the largest county in area in the state, sprawling over an area that is twice the size of the entire state of Rhode Island and nearly as large as the state of Delaware, and its city schools draw many students from the townships, you will realize that a loss of this magnitude to its schools is in-

deed serious. Especially is this true when we remember that its handful of 47,000 odd inhabitants are going to have to bear this increased load. This is fewer people than reside in the Village of Hamtramck.

Marquette County is in a peculiar situation. There has been no influx of defense plants or the like due to the war. Its principal industry has been for many years and is the mining of iron ore. The mine valuations are set by the State Tax Commission. Of late years these valuations have been steadily tobogganing, and while this is neither the time or place to discuss the merits of that situation, it strikes us that where the Tax Commission feels obliged to lower our mine valuations with one hand, perhaps it should feel rather slow about raising our equalized valuations with the other.

Much of our desirable land is owned by the mining companies, who will not sell. Therefore land is hard to get, and accordingly there is this artificial factor present when you take Marquette County's sales as a criterion.

Moreover, 53% of our county's valuation has already been set by the State Tax Commission, the same body that has recommended this increase. So this means that 47% of the county's valuation is being made to bear this \$11,000,000 increase. On our valuation of \$50,000,000 some \$22,500,000 is being made to bear a \$11,000,000 increase. Stated another way this would mean that you are putting all of the burden of this increase on non-mining property, or even more simply stated, that the value of John Q. Citizen's property is being raised nearly 50% - if this recommended increase should stand.

Last year your body raised us over four millions of dollars, and we said nothing. The year before we were raised, and the year before that. Perhaps we entertained the hope that our forbearance would be rewarded.

This year our silence has been rewarded by a recommended increase of nearly eleven million dollars, the largest yet. We have hit the jackpot!

We sincerely feel that this is sort of piling it on. We have lots of tough problems in our snow-bound county. Half of the year we spend our time and money simply trying to keep our roads open - and the old-timers predict a hard winter. In the summer we like to mine ore and fish. Seriously, we ask you to heed our plea and we ask you to heed our plea and we respectfully urge you to shaply lower the recommended equalized valuation for Marquette County.

The Chairman instructed the Clerk to attend to the matter that was started some time ago and stated that incidentally, some of the work performed by Mr. Denny, who was hospitalized, had devolved upon the County Clerk at the Chairman's instruction.

Supervisor Wiseman moved that the work usually done by the Salary Committee be turned over to the Budget and Executive Committee, supported by Supervisor Corneliuson and carried.

Supervisor Nylander of the Fourth Ward of the City of Negaunee was introduced to the Board by the Chairman who placed him on the same committees as his predecessor, the late Supervisor Nightingale.

Some discussion, pro and con, was had relative to clean-up of alleys in the small communities and townships, and a suggestion was made that due to wartime conditions, all residents of the communities aforementioned, do all in their power to keep the alleys clean and sanitary.

No further business, on motion of Supervisor Muck, supported by Supervisor Price, and carried, the Board adjourned until Monday, October 9th, A. D. 1944, at 10:00 o'clock A. M.

Gentlemen: - At a meeting of the Board of County Road Commissioners of Marquette County, Michigan, held September 22, 1944, the following resolution was adopted:

"WHEREAS, the Board of County Road Commissioners of Marquette County, Michigan, has adopted all Township Roads, including all streets and alleys in unincorporated villages, into the County Road System, pursuant to the requirements of Act 130, Public Acts of Michigan, 1931, as amended:

AND WHEREAS, under the provisions of said Act 130, as amended, Marquette County will receive money to assist in the maintenance of these roads, adopted because of said Act, which sum of money is estimated at Sixty Eight Thousand One Hundred Seventy Seven Dollars and Sixty Six Cents (\$68,177.66);

AND WHEREAS, Section 10 of said Act 130 provides for raising by taxation of such sum of money as shall be necessary in addition to the money received by the County pursuant to such act, so that sufficient money shall be provided for the maintenance of these roads:

AND WHEREAS, it is estimated there will be needed for the maintenance of the roads, streets and alleys, adopted into the County Road System pursuant to the requirements of said Act 130, for the next year, the sum of One Hundred Thirty Thousand Four Hundred Eighty Seven Dollars and Twenty Four Cents (\$130,487.24) and we estimate the return of the money from the State to apply thereon will amount to Sixty Eight Thousand
