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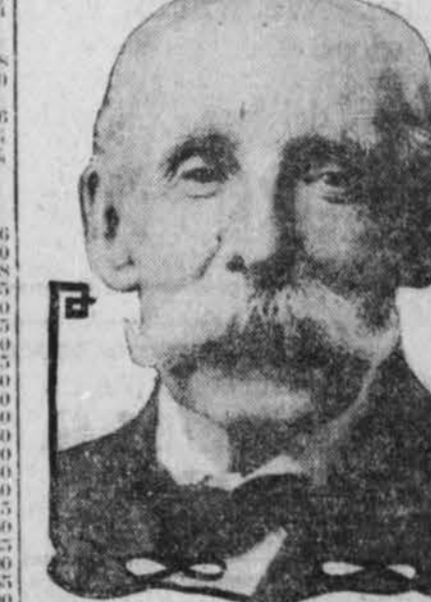

WAITING ON MICHIGAN TELEPHONE COMPANY

Board of Public Works Will Start Street Work as Soon as Poles Are Removed.

When he was asked yesterday when the work of macadamizing Cleveland avenue and North Main street will be started, Superintendent Devine, of the board of public works, replied that nothing could be done until the Michigan State Telephone company removes its poles. The council passed a resolution in March directing the companies concerned to remove their poles from the streets to be macadamized. Notice has been served on the managements of both the Michigan Bell Telephone company and the Marquette County Gas & Electric company, but up to this time no start has been made with the work.

The Marquette County Gas & Electric company has little work to do, as the poles were removed from Cleveland avenue during the winter, and there is now only one of the concern's poles standing on Cleveland avenue. It is not in use, and it can be taken down on two hours' notice.

All of the poles have been removed from the south side of Cleveland avenue, from Main to Third street, but none of the telephone company's poles have been removed from Main street, north of the railroad tracks. The Michigan Bell Telephone company has more than thirty wires, in addition to the cables strung through Cleveland avenue.

It is desired to have the proposed street work finished by the Fourth of July, when a celebration will be held. Mr. Devine says the work can be completed by that time if the telephone company moves without delay. The iron lamp posts have been ordered and are expected within a few weeks.

The city's workmen are making excellent headway with the street cleaning and they will start removing rubbish from the alleys in a few days. Property owners have been notified that they must have their alleys and yards clean not later than the 10th, when there will be a general inspection by the health officer and members of the street committee of the council.

WILL ORGANIZE TODAY.

RURAL MAIL DELIVERY.

First Trip Was Made Yesterday in Less Than Six Hours.

Joseph H. Thomas, who is filling the position of rural mail carrier in the district west of Ishpeming until the postal department appoints a regular man, made his first trip yesterday in five and a half hours. He left the postoffice at 9:30 o'clock and was back at 3.

The first mail taken over the route almost filled one pouch. The carrier does not have to leave his wagon in making deliveries, or picking up mail, as the mail boxes, about 150 in number, are stationed alongside the road.

The people in the district are greatly pleased with the mail service. People in the rural district can buy postal cards and stamps from the carrier, and they can also make application for money orders which will be made out at the local office and delivered to them the following day.

DEBATE TONIGHT IN HIGH SCHOOLS

Representatives of Ishpeming and Escanaba Will Compete in Both Cities.

This evening at 8 o'clock the Ishpeming high school will engage in two debates with the Escanaba high school. The Ishpeming affirmative team will leave this morning for Escanaba, and the Escanaba affirmative team will arrive on the Northwestern train.

The debate in this city will be held in the assembly room of the high school. The question to be debated is: "Resolved, That the Immigration Laws of the United States Should Be Further Restricted So That Only Those Who Can Read and Write, or Their Families Dependent Upon Them, Shall Hereafter Be Admitted."

The members of the Ishpeming team which will uphold the negative side are Rudy Johnson, Verina Mohr and Richard Dunton. Richard Carlson is the alternate.

The judges at the debate here will be Superintendent Orr Schurtz, of the Negaunee public schools; Superintendent S. O. Clinton of the Baraga public schools, and Dr. J. E. Lautner, of the Marquette normal.

An admission of ten cents will be charged to help pay the expenses of the judges and the transportation, etc., of the affirmative team to Escanaba.

ISHPEMING SCHOOLS NOT FIRE TRAPS

Writer in Insurance Engineering Is Censured by Man Familiar With Conditions.

"I read with interest the article in the Negaunee department of Monday's issue of 'The Mining Journal,' referring to the sensational story recently published in Insurance Engineering to the effect that the school structures in many Michigan cities and towns were built to burn," said an Ishpeming man, who is familiar with conditions in the schools in the upper peninsula. "I am in a position to state positively that the school buildings in Ishpeming, Negaunee and Marquette, which were included among those classed as being 'built to burn,' are as safe as the schools in the average city in the United States.

"I believe the motive of the writer of the article was to stir up sentiment in the hope that they would compel the school authorities to improve their buildings with a view to reducing the fire risk. The man who compiled the list of cities as having 'fire trap' school buildings, must have taken a list of the cities in the upper peninsula, and every third one, without any knowledge of actual conditions. The schools in Marquette county are as far from being 'fire traps' as any in the country.

Upper Peninsula

Police and Fireman Ask More Pay.

Members of both the police and fire departments of Escanaba have filed petitions with the council, asking for increases in wages. The finance committee will consider the matter. The petition filed by the police went to show that, while the cost of living has increased from 20 to 40 per cent, compared with ten years ago, there has been no change in the salaries for eleven years. The officers also called attention to the fact that wages for practically every other class of work have increased materially in the last decade. The petition presented figures showing the salaries paid the members of the police force in other cities, as follows:

At the Soo the chief receives \$1,200; captain, \$1,000, and police officers from \$60 to \$75 a month, according to their terms of service.

At Ishpeming the chief marshal receives \$92.50 a month, with a house lights and water free; the deputy marshal receives \$77.50, and patrolmen \$71.50.

At Ironwood all of the members of the force receive \$75 a month.

The members of the fire department did not go so exhaustively into the question as the policemen, but based their claims for recognition on the fact that at their present salaries and the present high cost of living they are scarcely able to support their families.

W. H. Hurley Found Dead in Office.

William H. Hurley, one of the oldest and best known residents of Iron Mountain, was found dead in his office in the First National Bank building Saturday night about 8 o'clock by the police. Mr. Hurley had been in poor health for a number of years, but had been able to attend to his duties as justice of the peace. In all probability he died late Friday night, as he was last seen when he took supper at the Empire Hotel that evening. He did not take any meals Saturday and the proprietor of the Empire, thinking that something must be wrong, notified the police. When the police went up to the office the door was opened and Mr. Hurley was found dead on a cot in the rear of his office. The supposition is that he died some time Friday night while sleeping. The coroner was notified and after examination it was pronounced that his death was due to heart disease. Mr. Hurley had been a resident of Iron Mountain for about thirty years and was a prominent Democrat. He had

run for various offices on that party's tickets. At one time he was considered to be one of the best criminal lawyers in the peninsula. He had no relatives in Iron Mountain, but had a brother and a niece at West Bend, Wis., and a brother at Kansas City.

Menominee Salaries Unchanged.

At the special session of the Menominee council, it was decided that the city officers' salaries be fixed at the present amounts as follows: Chief of police, \$1,200; city clerk, \$1,000; clerk of municipal court, \$200; city attorney, \$1,000; city engineer, \$6 per day when employed; health officer, \$300; milk and meat inspector, \$40 per month; street commissioner, \$25 per month; sewer inspector, \$50; sanitary inspector to be approved by health officer, \$37.50 per month; police, first year, \$50 per month; next four years, \$60 per month; police, after five years, \$65; deputy or captain, extra \$5; special police, per day, \$2.00; chief of fire department, \$1,300 per year; captain, per month, \$65; firemen, first year, \$35; next, four years, \$60; and after five years, \$65; substitutes, per month, \$40.

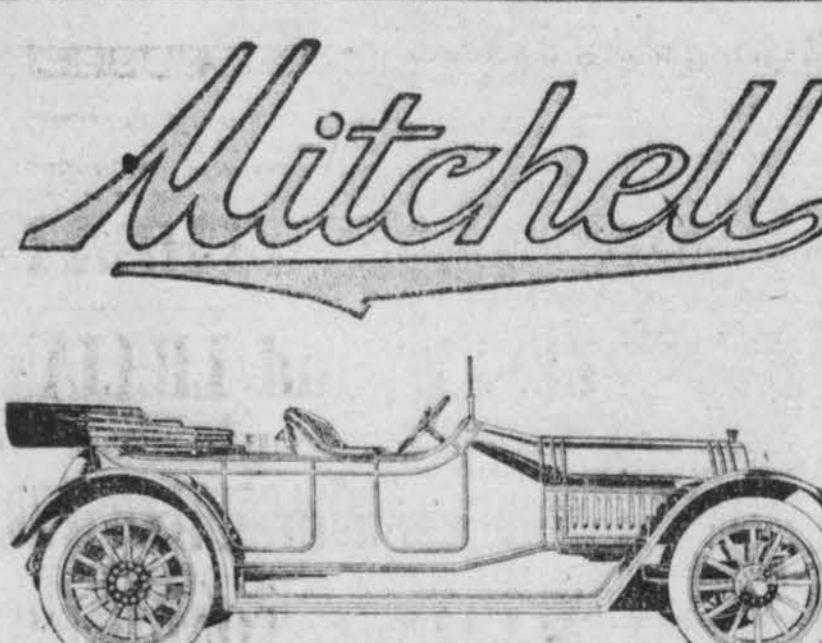

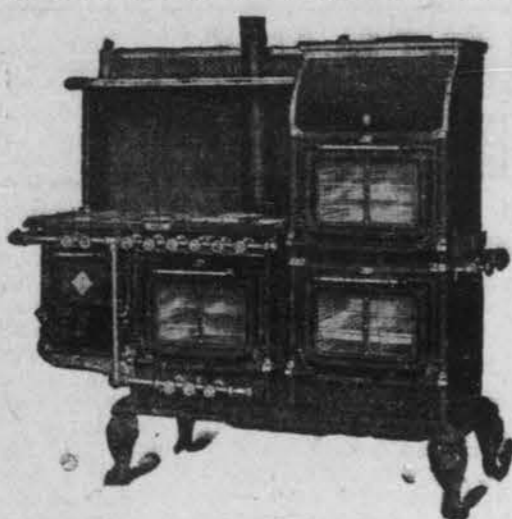
