ISHPEMING MEN ARE SUSPICIOUS

Subscribers to Art Work Wonder Whether Promised Premiums Will Be Forthcoming.

Menominee range subscribers to the Art Publishing company's books, believe they are victims of a swindling scheme. The representative of the concern solicited orders in Marquette county last August, and secured a number of subscribers. He had already canvassed the Menominee range, and showed the signatures of several prominent men in that district who had subscribed for the work, with the understanding that they were to receive a piece of furniture as a premium in October.

An Ishpeming man who hesitated about paying his last subscription received the following letter from the company:

Letter from the Management.

"Our representative, who was recently in your city making deliveries to subscribers of 'Art,' as per subscription contract, the specific printed terms and conditions of which fully cover our entire proposition, advises us that he called on you to deliver you parts and that you informed him you had some doubt as to whether we would fulfill our part of our said contract.

"We beg to say that our business is a bonafide and legitimate one, conducted openly and above board, and we will faithfully carry out our contracts and deliver premium as per premium policy and illustrated premium list, left with you at the time your subscription was secured.

"As to our business standing, we wish to say that this company has been in business for fifteen years and are now occupying the same offices they occupied fifteen years ago, and we are pleased to refer you to any of the following well-known manufacturers with whom we have had extensive dealings, covering a period of many years:

"Freedman Bros. & Co., Furniture Manufacturers, 717-731 Mather street, Chicago, Ill.; Traverse City Chair company, Furniture Manufacturers, Traverse City, Mich.; J. D. Freese & Sons company, Furniture manufacturers, 2531-2523 Komer street, Chicago, Ill."

Another Ishpeming man, who wrote a relative in Chicago, asking him to look into the standing of the concern, received a copy of a report of the company by R. G. Dunn & Co. It showed that the Art Publishing company was organized under the laws of Illinois in 1889, with an authorized capital stock of \$2,500. In 1902 the amount of the capital was increased to \$30,000 and in 1904 the name was changed to The Union Book & Publishing company. The report made by R. G. Dunn & company covered the concern's business up to March 22, 1912, at which time the corporation was credited with assets of \$101,449.82. According to the statement the company has a surplus of \$42,921.85.

RINK MAY SOON BE READY TO USE

If Cold Weather Continues Superintendent Devine Will Prepare to Flood Surface.

"When are you going to have the skating rink ready?" This is a question that P. H. Devine, superintendent of the board of public works, has been asked several hundred times since Saturday. Nearly every youngster he met on the streets yesterday made him the target of this query.

If the freezing weather continues Mr. Devine said last evening that the rink would be ready for use within a week. This would be fully six weeks earlier than the rink was opened last year. It will be easy to make a skating surface this year owing to the banks that have been constructed around the area that is to be used for skating, none of the water can get away. Last winter it required fully fifteen times as much water to make a skating surface as will be needed this season.

Mr. Devine expects that he will be able to make good ice rapidly, as three

lengths of pipe were extended to the surface of the rink.

The skating surface will be ten feet wider than last year. The length of the rink will be 300 feet and the width 130 feet. Mr. Devine said that the maintenance cost will not be more than half what it was last winter. A special sled has been made for the hose and after using it the hose will be taken to the city tool house on Second street, where it will be kept from freezing.

The building used by the skaters last winter has been doubled in size. One part of it will be used exclusively for men and boys, and the other for women and girls.

DIES UNEXPECTEDLY.

MEETS DEATH AT BREITUNG SHAFT

Thomas Garrett, Struck by Falling Cross-Head, Is Thrown to Bottom of Workings.

Thomas Garrett, of Ishpeming, met almost instant death, and Fred Borlace was injured at the Breitung No. 3 shaft shortly after 7:30 o'clock yesterday morning as a result of the jamming of the cross-head which guides the bucket into the shaft.

The cross-head fell after the bucket had been lowered about half the depth of the shaft. It is said that it struck Mr. Garrett, who fell from the bucket to the bottom of the shaft, a distance of about one hundred feet.

The injured men were taken to Dr. Robbin's hospital, but were able to go to their homes a short time later.

Shortly before the accident occurred, because of the presence of snow and ice, the men had been warned by Superintendent W. B. Pattison to watch the cross-head carefully.

William Andrews, who went down in the bucket directly following the accident, suffered slight injuries in getting out at the bottom of the shaft.

The Breitung No. 3 shaft is a new one and the men were engaged in sinking the shaft, which is now down a distance of about two hundred feet.

John T. Quinn, of Ishpeming, mine inspector, was on the ground. Mr. Garrett was thirty-nine years of age and had been a resident of Ishpeming for many years.

Coroner William Prin, of Ishpeming, will conduct an inquest in Judge Irving Argall's court room tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock.
