The pantodon, a deminutive flying fish ound in Lake Teliad in Africa, merits especial attention because of its peculiar structure and singular habits. It owes its name to the formidable array of teeth which cover its tongue and the principal bones of its mouth, in addifeature was discovered in Japan in the inches in length, which is a native of the sixteenth century, since which epoch the River Niger and requires a temperature long and pointed tail.
