Following the spectacular success of his country in its war with Turkey Ferdinand made no secret of his ambition to dominate all the Balkans. The war good stead. which this precipitated with Greece and Servia resulted in the complete humiliation of Bulgaria, and the loss of much of the territory it would have retained from the former Turkish dominions. The cruelest blow to national pride was struck when Adrianople was retaken by the Turks.

Bulgaria, through the overweening ambition of its second monarch, has fallen from the high place it might have occupied. Only a few decades ago an oppressed province in the Turkish domains. it came into existence as an autonomous principality following the war with Russia in 1877. His overlord, the czar of Russia, forced him to abdicate.
