



SEEK HURRICANE SIGNALS FOR LAKES The Old Charter Not Condemned.

Mariners Believe Weather Bureau Should Display More Emphatic Warnings.

Whether the masters of the steam ers lost in the terrific hurricane that swept the upper lakes Nov. 9 were to blame for being out in the storm of whether the weather bureau was to blame, is a matter of much discussion among vesselmen of this port and opin ions are about evenly divided. Of course vessel masters and owners are very much in favor of the masters, while others stand by the weather bureau. That hurricanes blow over the great lakes as well as the coast is a fact wellknown to everybody, and therefore the stations of the weather bureau or the great lakes should be provided with hurricane signals, argued one man.

"Now it is generally conceded that the big steel steamers are able to weather any ordinary gale, and as the same storm signal is displayed for all classes of storms, just so long as they are storms, why you can't expect a storm that is coming or just an ordinary squall," he said. "If, however, the sig nals were displayed the same as on the coast, and when a hurricane was the forecast, the hurricane signal was displayed, vesselmen, no matter how rash or dare-devil they might be, would surely take warning, while with but a storm signal displayed, they think that they have weathered other storms without any trouble and will be able to do it

This argument is one that is offered by other masters and seems to represent the opinions of their majority. "Why has a captain or officer of a ship a barometer, if it is not to be able to forecast the weather," asked a party who stands by the weather bureau, but who concedes that hurricane signals should be displayed along the lakes. "I understand that the barometer dropped slowly, and stayed at a low point, which indicates that a storm out of the ordinary is to be looked for. Now if a master beeded the indications of his barometer at all he would have taken warning in that case and either hurried for shelter or remained in shelter when there, as many of these masters had the opportunity of doing. I don't be-lieve there is a ship built that can weather the worst of storms, and no master should be so confident of either himself or craft to ignore entirely th warnings of his barometer."

Thus do the arguments stand ' marine circles and wherever marine men gather in this port, yet as a general rule both sides concede that there is a little fault to be attached to either che captains or the weather bureau. Insurance Paid Promptly.
