Resolved. That it is the sense of this meeting that the present lawless condition that obtains throughout the community is due entirely to the acts and teachings of these non-resident, paid agitators; and be it further





RECORD MINERAL PRODUCTION.

Output in United States in 1912 Two and a Quarter Billions


Washington, Dec. 7.- The value of ill minerals produced in the United States in 1912, according to figures just ompiled by Edward W. Parker, statisbeinn, of the United States Geological grvey, reached the record-breaking otal of \$2,243,630,326. This is more than six times the value of the produc ion in 1882, 30 years ago. During that period the population has not quite douoled, but the per capita output of the has increased from \$7.27 to

During these three decades the value f the output of some minerals has made a striking increase. The value of the ig-iron product, for instance, has in reased from 106 to 420 million dollars; opper from 16 to 205 million dollars: old from 32 to 93 million dollars; lead rom 12 to 37 million dollars; zine from 146 to 695 million dollars; petroleum from 24 to 163 million dollars; natural gas from 215 thousand to 84 millio dollars; cement from \$3,600,000 to 869

Still more striking illustrations of t growth of the mineral industry in the United States are the figures showing that, while in 1880 the total mineral production in the United States was valued at \$364,000,000, in 1912 the value of the pig iron alone was \$420,000,000, while the value of the coal production for 1912 was nearly double the total min eral output of 30 years ago. In 1880 the value of the mineral products was approximately \$1,000,000 a day; in 1912 it was over \$6,000,000 a day.
