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





Part Owner of the Tug Martin and Master of Ill-Fated Barge Plymouth Was Not Here Yesterday for Trial Before U. S. Inspectors York and Gooding.

Notified Court That He Was Unable to Be Present-Captain Martin Hansen, of Green Bay, Charges McKinnon With Responsibilty for Marine Disaster.

Capt. Donald McKinnen, of Menomince, part owner and engineer of the tug Martin, and also acting master of the barge Plymouth, which was lost in the storm of Nov. 8, 9, and 10, near St Martin's Island, Green Bay, failed to appear before United States Inspectors York and Gooding yesterday morning for trial on the charge of having violated the navigation laws. He telegraphed the inspectors that he would be unable to be present, and again asked an ex-tension of time, which had been previously refused by the inspectors. The trial has been postponed indefinitely, but will probably be held during

the latter part of next week. The members of the crew of the tug Martin will be here to testify, it is said. Captain Louis Setunsky, who was master of the tug during the trip when the barge Plymouth was lost, was here yesterday to be present at the trial, but has returned to his home. He and Cap tain McKinnon are not on speaking terms, owing to charges of incompetency

and poor seamanship made against him by McKinnon, all of which he denies. Believes McKinnon Responsible.

Captain Martin Hansen, of Green Bay, a relative of Chris Keenan, custodian of the harge Plymouth, who was lost on the barge, believes that McKinnon was directly responsible for the loss of the barge. He attended the trial of Captain at 2 o'clock from St. John's church, with Setunsky Thursday, at which the captain acknowledged his violation of the navigation laws in acting as the master of the tug Martin, and yesterday morning expressed the following opinion in regard to the case:

"Since the trial of Captain Setunsky I am more fully of the belief that Captain McKinnon was responsible for the loss of the life of the seven men aboard the barge Plymouth, which went down in the storm of Nov. 8, 9 and 10. will follow the case up to the last What I desired to know was whether or not McKinnon could act as master o the barge and at the same time remain abourd the tug Martin as engineer. Meon Nov. 6th as her master and he was not aboard her at sea.

"I will return to my home in Green Bay tonight and will be notified when McKinnon will appear for trial. I will return here then." From the testimony at the trial Thurs
