Attorney General Says the Liquor Law Does Not Contemplate Building Up Monopoly.

While in Marquette, where some of the saloonmen have found that it is beyond their power to obtain even one license, and where it is not likely that the most popular of their number will look for two, the question may be somewhat academic, it is still a matter of interest that the attorney general, Grant Fellows, has handed down a formal opinion in a case arising at Grand Rapids that it is not within the power of a municipal board to grant more than one license to one person, or firm.

Wherefore if there is any Marquette saloon man who has been considering the project of going out after a brace of licenses, he might as well give it up. In the light of the attorney general's opinion it is likely, even if it was proposed to do so, that the commission would grant more than one license to one applicant.

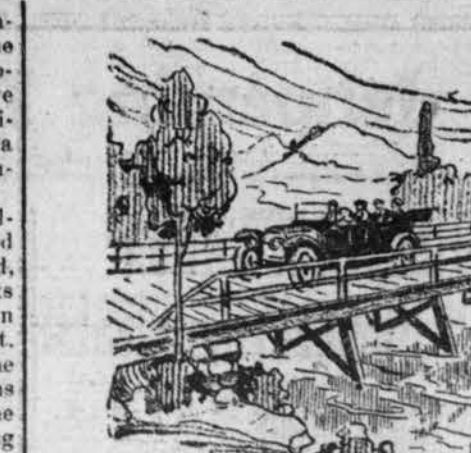

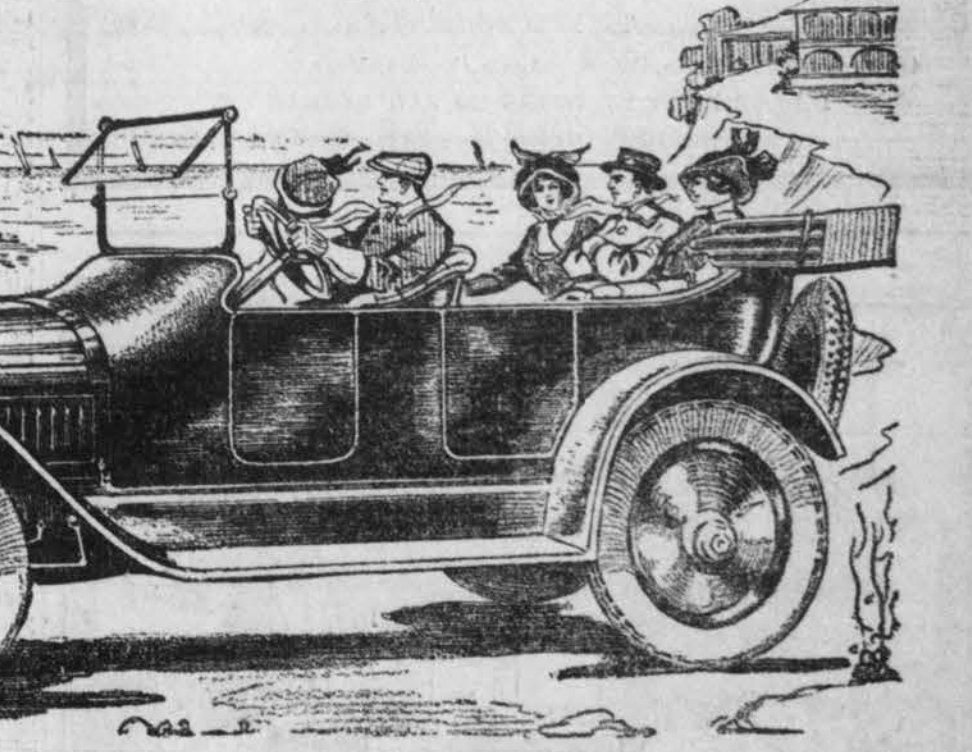

HOTEL PROPOSITION INFORMALLY DISCUSSED

Committee Appointed at Advancement Association Meeting to Ascertain Sentiment.

The plan to have a stock company of business and professional men purchase the Nelson house which has been under consideration by the Ishpeming Advancement Association, was informally discussed at a meeting yesterday afternoon. A. J. Yungbluth, D. J. Sliney and C. H. Moss were appointed by the president to act with the industrial committee in ascertaining the sentiment among the townspeople with regard to the project. The committee will confer with influential citizens, and if the proposal meets with their approval it will be brought up at a general meeting of the association.

The success of the plan will depend almost entirely on the attitude of the men who are now to be interviewed. Liberal subscriptions for stock would be necessary to get the project started.

Those who were in attendance at yesterday's session were enthusiastic about the project. Various ways of starting the subscriptions for stock were talked over.

Upon the presentation of the following communication from the Boys' club of the Ishpeming High school, V. S. Hillier made a motion that the Advancement Association endorse the recent petition of the boys for the enforcement of the law regarding the furnishing of liquor, cigarettes, and cigars to minors:

"There has been presented to the mayor of this city by the Boys' club of the Ishpeming High school a petition asking that he do all in his power to enforce the state laws controlling the sale of liquor and tobacco to minors. Believing that if this petition is given publicity and receives strong support, it will be much more effective, we, the members of the Boys' club, realizing your influence and power, ask that you give your support to this petition."

The sum of \$25 was voted to the Ishpeming Y. M. C. A. for the use of one of the rooms of the "Y" during the past year by the association.

It was voted to join the Upper Peninsula Association of Commercial Club Secretaries, which was recently organized at Escanaba.

VALUABLE SETS RECEIVED.

Expensive Volumes Recently Purchased by Public Library.

The Carnegie public library has recently received five sets of works that make a valuable addition to its shelves. Among them "Modern Art," a history of painting, by Haldane MacFall, published by the Dana Estes Co., of Boston, in eight volumes, is probably the most valuable. The work contains 200 plates in color, and gives a detailed history of painting from the year 1400 up to the present. Another work is "Women," in ten volumes, each devoted to a different country. It gives the history of women in all ages, and is issued by George Barrie & Sons.

"Ireland," in six volumes, tells of the scenery and nature of the country. The work is profusely illustrated. Four additional volumes are, "Traits and Stories of Irish Peasantry," "Crowne's Masterpieces of Eloquence," in ten volumes, is one of the additions. Four volumes of "The Life of Christ," told in story form for young people, are also among the new books.

The library has received a large shipment of fiction, non-fiction, and juvenile books, which will be placed upon the shelves as soon as they are catalogued.

Reports on Meeting.

V. S. Hillier, who attended the recent meeting of the Upper Peninsula commercial clubs at Escanaba as a delegate from the Ishpeming Advancement Association, presented a report of the session, as follows:

"In accordance with your request, I attended the meeting of the Upper Peninsula Commercial clubs held at Escanaba, Feb. 3.

"There were present the secretaries from the Manistique, Menominee, Marquette, Iron Mountain, Ewen, Houghton, Escanaba, and Ishpeming associations.

The meeting was called primarily for such clubs as have complete secretaries, and are making a special effort to get new industries located in their towns. However, in the constitution adopted the officials of any Upper Peninsula commercial club or association may be members. A constitution was adopted and M. H. Barton, secretary of the Commercial club of Manistique was elected president, and G. P. Chambers of Menominee was elected secretary.

"Membership dues were fixed at \$3 per annum for each club or association joining. The object of the association appears to be to promote cooperation among the various commercial clubs for the development of the upper peninsula and advertising the same, to exchange information about methods of meeting local conditions and problems for the benefit of the local businessmen. For instance, it appears that the Menominee and Houghton secretaries have installed a system of credit rating for the benefit of the local merchants, which seems to be working successfully and to the benefit of the merchants.

"While this organization of association officials is primarily for the benefit of the paid officials, nevertheless, I believe it will pay the Ishpeming club to join the association and pay its \$5 membership dues when called on.

"While in Escanaba, I was told that the system of central delivery was working very satisfactorily and saving the merchants 50 per cent. on the cost of delivery.

"I also attended the meeting of the Upper Peninsula Development Bureau and heard President Snyder of the Michigan Agricultural college, also Governor Eberhardt of Minnesota. Governor Eberhardt made a strong impression on his audience, convincing them of his sincerity, simplicity and good common sense. He told what the Minnesota communities were doing along the lines of commercial development, and also touched upon what the state was doing in educational lines. He said he was a strong advocate of playgrounds for the children and their proper supervision. He emphasized the value of playgrounds by saying 'Give the boys a chance to run a 100 yard race and they would be 100 yards further away from crime.' He most heartily approved of teaching and singing patriotic songs on all occasions by public school children.

"One of the first things to be undertaken by the association of the commercial clubs will be the publishing of a road map of the upper peninsula, and distributing these maps among the automobile clubs and owners of Wisconsin and Illinois, with the view of promoting automobile touring in this part of the country. I have prepared and sent a map of Marquette county roads to Mr. Chambers of Menominee who will see to the publishing of the same."
