Upper Peninsula

Bold Bandit in Delta County.

Holding men at the point of his gun, a lone, masked highwayman robbed both the David LaCrosse saloon at Gros and the Soo Line station at North Escanaba, both robberies occurring within an hour. In true Wild West style the bandit entered the groos saloon at 9 o'clock and extracted \$33 from the cash register. After killing a dog that followed him, the robber escaped. At 10 o'clock the same man shot out the ticket window at the Soo Line station and, ordering ticket agent, V. E. Ashcraft to be seated in the corner, he took \$45 from the till and, backing out, escaped.

Ferry Company to Add to Fleet.

At the annual meeting of the Little Bay de Noc Ferry & Transportation company, at Gladstone, plans were made for operations during the coming season. It was decided to construct a scow to be used in conjunction with the ferry. The scow will be 24x48 feet, with a depth of four feet, and constructed of Washington fir. The Launch Muriel will be thoroughly overhauled and repainted and put in first class condition. With the scow in operation the company expects to do a profitable business. The farmers will be benefited, as they will be enabled to go to the city with produce whereas last year they were compelled to drive half way round the Bay de Noc peninsula in order to get to town with loads.

Riley to Coach Amherst Eleven.

Attorney T. J. Riley has returned to Escanaba, after closing a contract to coach the football team of Amherst college, at Amherst, Mass., for two years. Amherst is one of the leading small colleges of the East and the former Michigan gridiron star was selected from a field of fifty applicants, at a considerable increase in salary over that received by him as coach at Maine University. Riley's work at Maine attracted the attention of football critics throughout the East and since the close of the season the Escanaba attorney had been in communication with the athletic authorities of the prominent Eastern school. Mr. Riley will go to Amherst about Sept. 1 to take charge of the football squad.

Senator James Campaigning.

Senator Frank James arrived in the city from Hancock and spent yesterday with friends, leaving this morning for Crystal Falls, says the Iron Mountain Press. While the senator declined to state as a fact that he is a candidate for the Republican congressional nomination, it is very evident that his "swing around the circle" has that purpose in mind. That he will be a candidate in the coming primary is believed to be certain. Senator James has many friends throughout the peninsula and these friends are not slow in expressing the belief that he is the strongest man the Republicans could nominate. He has an excellent legislative record, having obtained the enactment of various laws tending to better working conditions.

Iron Mountain's Ice Harvest.

The Iron Mountain ice supply was procured exclusively this season from Lake Anoume. The water was approved by the state sanitary engineer. During the season 3,417 cords of ice were cut by dealers, Bretschneider & Smith, who had succeeded to the business of the H. S. & E. Ice company, cut 1,750 cords. Twelve hundred cords were stored in the houses of the firm for the retail trade. In addition the firm cut and stored 550 cords for the Menze-Tollen Brewing company, eighty-five cords for Best Bros., and seventy-two cords for Morris & Co. Henry LaFontaine cut 1,000 cords to supply his trade. He also filled the Iron Mountain house of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul road, which holds 200 cords, and loaded on the cars 300 cords for the same company. The ice was shipped to the houses at Green Bay, Channing and Champion. Heretofore the St. Paul road has procured its ice for the Superior division from Randon Lake, Wis.

See High School Class Biggest on Record

The class of 1914 of the Soo High school is the largest in the history of the institution. There are fifty-two members and it is reasonably certain that not more than two or three will fail to pass the final examinations. The class has not yet decided whether it will finish the year's work with a banquet or a dancing party. It is probable that a banquet will be held. The boys of the class have elected Linton Melvin, president, to represent it at the conference in Escanaba. The juniors also will send a delegate. The senior class is making preparations to issue the Senior Annual. The publication will contain more real literary material this year. Prizes are being offered for the best productions. The funds obtained from the advertisement, after the cost of publication is deducted, will be donated to the College Mutual Benefit association, organized in 1899 by E. E. Ferguson, superintendent of schools at the time. Since its organization the association has loaned \$1,500 to worthy students to assist them in getting through college. The association has helped sixty-five students in this way. Last year \$48.47 was turned over to the fund and it is believed the amount will be exceeded this year. The commencement and class events will take place during the week of June 15. Annual staff, Jay Sharpe, editor in chief; Clifford Zylstra, literary editor; Harold Rye, athletic editor; Geraldine Bower, society editor; Bessie Boyer, joke editor; Dorothy Sued, art editor; Clifford Everett, business manager; William McLaughlin, James Bateman, Archie Weston and Angus Barton, business staff.

BAD CHECK PASSED AT MAPLE RIDGE FINNS BANK MONEY IN NATIVE COUNTRY

Negaunee Police Are Looking for a Man Who Is Believed to Have Bad Record. Negaunee Man Tells Why Money Earned Here Is Sent Abroad for Keeping.

Willio Laitinen, who has spent the greater part of the winter working as a woodsman at John Snell's camps at Maple Ridge, stole a check book from a businessman at the place Friday. It is alleged, and forged a check for \$75 in Mr. Snell's name, which he cashed at Copiness Bros. store at Maple Ridge.

Shortly after Laitinen left the store, Henry Cominess, who waited on him, became suspicious and took the check to Mr. Snell who told him it was a forgery. Cominess notified Sheriff Curran at Escanaba, who began a search for Laitinen.

Laitinen and three men left Maple Ridge shortly after he got the money on the bad check, and were traced to Escanaba. Before the officers could locate them there they had left for Negaunee. Marshal Newcombe, who was notified Saturday morning, at once took up the search. He had been furnished with a description of Laitinen and his associates and before noon Saturday he had two of the men in jail.

Laitinen, who is considered a bad character, could not, however, be found in the city, and one of the men arrested told the officers that he had gone to a farm near Ishpeming. He has not yet been located.

Laitinen is said to have intended to go to the Mesaba range, but the officers have kept a close watch for him at all out going trains, both here and at Ishpeming, and it is not believed he has got away. It is expected that the man now in jail will later divulge his whereabouts.

Sheriff Curran left instructions with Marshal Newcombe to get the man, no matter what it cost. It is said a Delta county officer's opinion that Laitinen is wanted in other parts of the country.

\$35,000 BONDS TO BE RETIRED

\$10,000 of Water Bonds, Series of 1901, Will Be Bid in Before Maturity, Saving Considerable Interest Money—Mayor Talks of the City Finances.
