Sheldon, of Houghton.

There was little opposition to this ticket at the caucus, and its election a week from Monday is said to be assured.

FIVE-YEAR-OLD BOY A LIFE-SAVING HERO

Dallas (Tex.) Youngster Rescues His Two Smaller Brothers from a Burning House.

Dallas, Tex., March 23.—Two little boys, locked in the nursery of their home here and trapped there by flames which soon destroyed the entire house, were saved by a big, brave man—their five-year-old brother, Jimmie.

Jimmie had to save them! His mother, Mrs. James Teeling, had made him promise to take care of them. She had gone downtown to do some afternoon shopping. And to keep the children absolutely "safe" she had locked all three in the nursery. She had hardly left when Jimmie smelled smoke. He ran to the door and pounded on it and screamed for help. But no one came. When he turned he saw flames already breaking into the room around the headboard.

His little brothers, crying with fear, ran into a corner. Jimmie pounded harder and called louder for help, but without answer. Then, trembling with his terrible responsibility for the little ones, he gathered the courage of a grown man from very desperation. He ran to the window and pounded out the panes. Unmindful of the cuts on his little doubled-up fists he rushed back to little Patrick, aged two and one-half years, who was paralyzed with terror, dragged him to the window and out onto the porch.

Jimmie Giggles Afterward.

Then he ran back to the window. The room was a choking furnace. Baby Robert, twenty months old, was lying on the floor in the far corner. Jimmie never once thought of his own danger. He jumped in, fought his way through the smoke seized the baby and pulled him also out to safety.

A moment later the negro dishwasher, working in the kitchen was startled by a pitiful little apparition. Jimmie, burnt and bleeding, burst in the back door to warn him that the entire front of the house was on fire. The man picked Jimmie up and took him to a neighbor's to be cared for. It was there that a newspaper man came to interview him. Jimmie insisted on treating the matter humorously. When asked to describe how he accomplished his rescue he said: "I dragged 'em bofe out by the hair any ye oughter heard 'em holler!"

Jimmie giggled as he remembered the humor of the situation. But those who were by his bed couldn't laugh. Jimmie's own hair—those pretty black locks that make so attractive a picture—are badly scorched; and his only badge for heroism as a great many grown men could show is the big white bandage about his head.

OSAGE WEALTH FABULOUS.

Riches Pour In On Favored Tribe Of North American Indians.

Pawhuska, Ok., March 23.—Pawhuska, with four-thousand inhabitants, is the largest city in the largest county of Oklahoma, the land of the Osage Indians, the richest tribe in America. Nearly \$3,000,000 was disbursed to these Indians in 1913, and more will be given to them this year. Nearly three-thousand oil and gas wells now in Osage county yield a fat royalty revenue to these Indians, and 1400 more wells will be drilled in the "Kingdom of Washashie" during the present year, thereby making the royalties still larger and fatter.

Each of the 2300 members of the Osage tribe owns 658 acres of land; has nearly \$5000 in the national treasury, and draws lots of grass, oil and gas and rent money. They are not nabobs of the North American Indians. The thirty

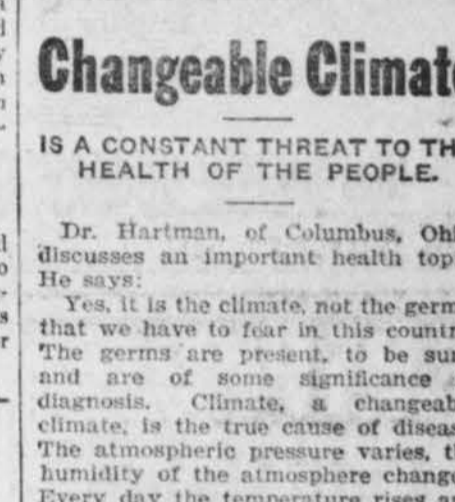

Marie spent most of her life on a houseboat anchored near her father's barge. Fritz De Rock, the father, has been a deep sea diver for twenty-two years. In a week she was as much at home at the bottom of the river as he. She had his strong square shoulders and took to the water like a fish.

FARMERS' PARTY WAS MODEST AFFAIR

Juniors Give Figures on J Hop Criticized by State Food Commissioner Helme.

Negaunee boys who are attending the Michigan Agricultural college at Lansing have written relatives and friends here that the statement made by James Helme, dairy and food commissioner, relative to the Junior hop held at the school recently was misleading.

One of the Negaunee boys, a member of the Junior class, has sent the following statement to The Mining Journal, with the request that it be printed:

"The papers generally published a statement from Jim Helme, dairy and food commissioner of Michigan, giving his views concerning the Junior hop at the Michigan Agricultural college. He has endeavored to lead people to believe that this function cost over \$6,000. That the orchestra and decorations cost in the neighborhood of \$1,000, that the girls wore one hundred dollar dresses in a ball room decorated with a thousand dollars worth of flowers and received sterling powder pencils as favors while the men received cigarette cases. All this, which Mr. Helme assumed to be true, leads him to believe that we are throwing away a pile of money on 'higher education.'

"Now, just a word as to the expenditures: The entire expense was borne by the Junior class; not a cent of college money was expended on this function. The rent of the Masonic temple was \$68. This included dining room and dance hall. The banquet was served by the ladies of the Universalist church at \$1.12 per plate. Street cars were chartered at an expense of twenty-five cents for each person. This included cars for returning to the college after the party was over. The decorations were rented and were placed by the members of the class with the exception of one man who designed and overlooked the arrangements. The music was Finzell's orchestra from Detroit and the entire expense for music, for the banquet and dance including all expenses, was \$174.

"The amount levied against the members of the class was \$5.50 per couple;

this included all expenses, the banquet, dance and two extra gallery tickets. While the class voted that the gentlemen should not furnish flowers for the young women, yet as a fact, many of them did purchase such flowers. Others rented dress suits. These, however, were individual matters which were not under control of the class.

"After a careful investigation, it was found that the cost of the ladies' gowns, spoken of by Mr. Helme as being so extravagant, was about \$14 each. The gowns are of course worn at social functions throughout the year and, indeed, many of them for two or three years. The cost is small because 65 per cent of the young women made their own gowns. This was possible because all the young women in this institution have had a thorough course in domestic art. Ninety-two per cent of these same girls expressed a willingness to lead the life of the average farm lady."

CONCERT TOMORROW.

Famous Finnish Tenor Will Give Program at the Star Theater.

Taneli Hurri, a famous Finnish opera tenor, will give a concert at the Star theater tomorrow evening, commencing at 8:15. Mr. Hurri has been appearing in the United States for some months past, and has received many flattering press notices. He is being brought to Negaunee by a number of the city's leading Finnish residents. The admission for adults will be fifty cents and twenty-five for children.

The Fitchburg Daily Sentinel of Fitchburg, Pa., recently said: "Mr. Hurri has ample reason to know that he will be a favorite for many years to come with those who were so fortunate as to have been present, on account of the applause with which he was greeted upon each of his four appearances upon the stage and at the close of several of the selections in the singing of which he had opportunities to show the great range of his voice and his musical training to the best advantage.

"The selections by Mr. Hurri were in the English, German and Italian languages, as well as in his native Finnish tongue, and in all of them he sang with the same excellence of interpretation and expression. His voice is one of unusual range and power. These were demonstrated to the best advantage in an Italian selection, 'O Primavera,' and 'Ajattelen Alkokei and Nala Elan,' both in the Finnish tongue, and the closing number of 'Die Bieden Gendriere,' in German. He had to repeat the first mentioned number before the audience would allow him to depart for the twenty-minute intermission for which the program called, and also in his two encores, and extra numbers in response to the applause for the selections in the Finnish language, one of which, 'A Sailor's Chorus,' was probably the biggest favorite with by far the greater part of those present."

Mining News

FRANKLIN.

President R. M. Edwards, of the Franklin Mining company, says: "I have no hesitation in stating that the showing in the Alonzo conglomerate lode on the thirty-second level of Franklin is the most important development which has ever occurred at the property. I believe that Franklin can be made profitable mine from this conglomerate lode, and within a comparatively short time. All that is necessary is to get the lode opened sufficiently so that operations can be conducted on a large scale; all the necessary equipment is in readiness, including a mill. We are now opening the lode both north and south on the thirty-third level and should be able to make about 200 feet per month. The first blast in the drift was made when I was at the property, and the showing was just as good as when the lode was first out, the assays of which showed better than thirty pounds of copper to the ton. We have arranged for mill tests of 1,000 tons each at the Centennial mill, the first of which I hope will be made within the next three weeks. Every pound of rock which is broken is being hoisted, and will be put through the mill. If these mill runs corroborate the assays, and I have no doubt they will, we shall drive two more crosscuts. One will be at the thirty-sixth level and one at the twenty-eighth, and I figure that this can be done within eight months, when underground conditions should be such that we can treat from 1,000 to 1,200 tons of rock per day from the conglomerate. This would, of course, be handled in Franklin's own mill, which is not to be used for the mill tests. Our mill is closed on account of the strike and the expense of opening it for a small rock tonnage would not be justified. Franklin owes considerable money, but has enough cash on hand to last four or five months. I am extremely hopeful, however, that it will be possible to avoid further assessment. The changed condition of the company's affairs makes me confident that if financing has to be done a little later on it can be accomplished through the sale of treasury stock at not far from \$15 per share. I have been assured by strong financial interests that they would underwrite such issue, provided our mill tests are as favorable as is now indicated."
