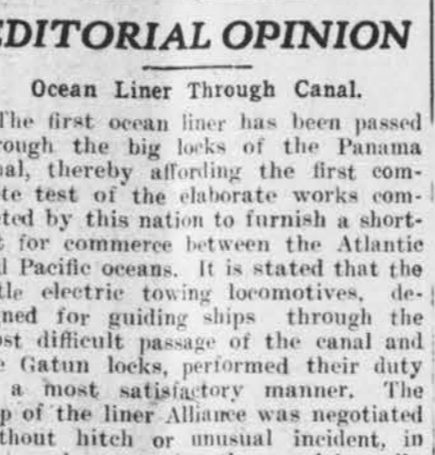

ALTERATIONS MADE IN BUILDING PLANS

ISHPEMING YOUNG MAN GETS DEGREE

New Gately-Wiggins Block Will Be a Strictly Modern Structure in Every Way.

Fred E. Harwood, of Chicago, representing Mrs. Catherine J. Gately, and James Wiggins, of the firm of Gately-Wiggins, were in Ishpeming Tuesday and conferred with J. S. Wahlman, who has the contract for the erection of the new Gately-Wiggins building at the corner of Main and Pearl streets. Several important changes have been made in the plans of the building since they were submitted to the officers of the Gately-Wiggins company at Chicago last week. The new business block will be one of the most up-to-date business structures in this section of the country.

It will be the best lighted store in Ishpeming, and will have an immense space devoted to window display. The entire front of the building on both the first and second floors will have large display windows. The main entrance will extend back a distance of twelve feet to the doorway and two display windows will be built on either side of it. The large plate glass window of the second floor will extend over on the Pearl street side of the building, making the corner window display one of unusual attractiveness.

A unique feature will be the Pearl street display windows, which will extend back a distance of forty-eight feet. This large window space will be divided up into four rooms of a home, living room, dining room, bed room and kitchen. Each room will be ten by twelve feet. The new block is to be thirty-five feet wide on Main street, and will extend back one hundred and five feet east on Pearl street. Excepting the basement, which will be used for storage purposes, there will be 7,250 square feet of floor space.

At the rear of the building there will be a freight elevator running from the basement to the second floor. There will be toilet rooms on each floor, and all of the equipment will be the most modern. Drinking fountains will be provided on each floor.

Tapestry brick, in four shades, none of which has ever been used for construction work in Ishpeming, will be used in the new block. It is of hard, excellent wearing quality.

The building is to be completed Oct. 1. As soon as the old Loth building on the site has been removed the work of excavating for the basement of the new block will be started.
