





temberg. His imperial dignity as German emperor is all that classes him above them. It should be remembered, also, that William H. of Prussia is only German emperor, not emperor of Germany, nor emperor of the Germans. To us in America that difference

might scom small. But not so in Germany. The German emperor, theoretically at least, is an elective office. He wears no crown as emperor. Imperial dignity is all he acquires to make him outrank his brother kings. But the titles, emperor of Germany or emperor of the Germans, would make him as absolute in fact and theory as the erar of all the Russias.

But even as king William II, is entitled to considerable more rank than the rulers of Saxony, Wurttemburg or Bavaria. He reigns over a land twice is large as Missouri and has 10,000,000 ubjects, as many persons as the combined populations of Maine, New Hamphire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New York New lersey, Pennsylvania, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan and Wisconsin.

Compared with that populous kingom, Ludwig III, of Bavaria might be a covernor and William II. the president lavaria has less than half the area of dissouri, about the same as South Caroina, and its population is less than that of Pennsylvania.

Ludwig III. is now seventy years old. He became regent in succession to his father, Prince Luitpold, who died on Dec. 12, 1912. He was proclaimed king on Nov. 5, 1913, in succession to his cousin, King Otto, who was declared incapable of ruling because of insanity. His son and crown prince, Rupprecht, is now commanding an army in France,

Wurttemberg is but one-fourth the size of Bavaria. In size and population it is about equal to New Jersey, Wilham IL, the reigning king, is sixty-sevon years old. He ascended the thrane on Oct. 6, 1891, on the death of King Karl I. The king of Wurttemberg acimpanied his troops to fire front.

Frederick Augustus III, reigns over the smallest kingdom in the German federation, Savony, although in population it exceeds Wurttemberg, Saxony in area is slightly larger than Connectient. Missouri is eleven times larger than the kingdom. Saxony has nearly 5000.000 people, about as many as Phio, 1,225,000 more than Missouri. Frederick Augustus III, is fifty cears old. He came to the throno on Oct. 15, 1994, on the death of his father, King George, His divorce in 1904 from Princess Luise of Tuscany brought him considerable notoriety. He has visited his troops on the eastern front.
