ITS MERITS.

Governor Ferris has inquired as to the merits of the Odell bill and has said that he would like to have a clear cut statement of what they are.

The principal merit of the Odell bill lies in the fact that it would give the power of appointment to the public domain commission, and there is warrant for believing from our experience with other commissions and boards in the state that once it got hold of a good man it would retain him indefinitely, and politics would have as little place in the department as it has, say, in the administration of the prisons of the state.

This, as The Mining Journal sees the situation, is the larger part of the case for the merits of the Odell bill, and, as it remarked Saturday, it is unfortunate that these unquestionable merits have come to be so much obscured by political maneuvering.

A TANGIBLE GAIN.

State Game Warden Odell regards it as certain that the legislature will lend its influence to the game conservation movement at least to the extent of passing the Penny bill providing that each deer hunter shall be permitted to kill but one deer, of either sex. The department is still committed to the buck law, and regards it as the ideal measure for prolonging the life of the deer herds. It will be urged as the measure that ought to be passed, without reference to the Penny bill, but there is a certain satisfaction in the thought that if the buck law cannot be obtained at this session the Penny bill will represent a considerable gain.

JAPAN HAS HEP TROUBLES.

Japan is finding her road to the domination of China quite so easy as it looked. The United States has notified the statesmen at Tokio that some of their proposals are wholly inconsistent with its treaties with China.

The question that Italy has to decide is whether she will insure, at the conclusion of the war, the fullest co-operation of the allies in working out her national aims by taking steps to shorten its duration—and thus its cost in men and treasure to the allies—or shall be content to take such crumbs as the allies are willing to give because of her neutrality.

Will the Lahuala case be re-opened? One of the Marquette county witnesses for the defense, who testified that Lahuala was in Little Lake the day he was charged with committing the crime that resulted in his being sent to the Marquette prison for life for murder, asserts that there is additional evidence showing that Lahuala was in this county even later on the day of the crime than he saw him, and reiterates his belief in the man's innocence.

The Michigan legislators claim to be leaning over backward to save money for the taxpayers, still there are bills in the house and senate to raise the salaries of the supreme court judges to \$12,000, an additional expense of \$40,000 a year.

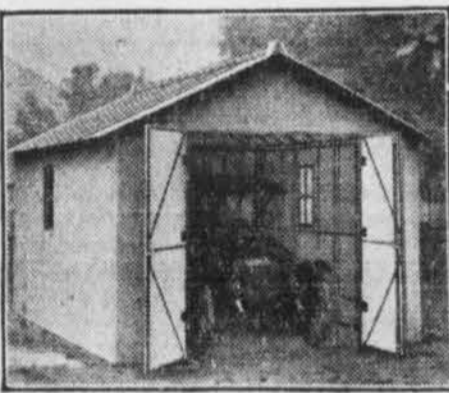

IRON AND STEEL TRADE EXPANDING

Heavy Orders Are Lifting Quotations, and Operations Are Well Distributed.

Encouraging reports as to conditions in the iron and steel trade are received daily from the manufacturing centers. Operations are reported as better distributed in the various departments at the mills, and quotations are made that productions will be still further increased within two weeks.

New orders to the steel companies are running at between 25,000 and 30,000 tons a day, and quotations are being maintained at the higher basis in many lines set recently. Export business in barbed and other wire and round steel is in good volume. Shrapnel steel is said to be in special demand. In the latter connection, it is reported that the Russian government is negotiating with the New York Air Brake company and the Westinghouse Air Brake company for an order of 2,000,000 shrapnel on a basis of \$18 each, making the gross amount of this prospective contract \$36,000,000. Russia is also in the market in this country for an additional 2,000,000 shrapnel, but up to the present it has been unable to find a manufacturer with a plant adequate to make deliveries within the time specified.

Order from Europe.
A great proportion of the improvement evidenced in the iron and steel industry is considered to be attributable to the placing of enormous orders for machine tools and the manufacture of materials required by the European belligerents.

It is averred in trade circles that the agricultural implement business is good and that there has been some improvement in the building outlook. A number of additional plants have gone into operation. At Youngstown, Ohio, the blast furnace of the Struthers Furnace company has resumed, and the Girard Iron company will relight its furnace there this week.

The Empire and Thomas sheet iron mill at Bruce Hill Steel company at Niles and DeForest and Trumbull mills at Warren have resumed operations under reduced wages rejected by referendum vote of Amalgamated Association of Iron and Steel Workers. Mills of the Youngtown Iron and Steel company will resume this week under the same conditions.

The first ore reservation for this season on the Mesaba range has been made by the Todd-Stambaugh interests, who have contracted for 500,000 tons from the Deane mine at Duluth. This ore will be shipped to Cleveland, the price to be agreed upon later.

1916 TOURNAMENT TO LAKE LINDEN

Upper Peninsula Bowlers, Assembled in Annual Meeting at Hotel Clifton Saturday, Named A. A. Barbeau, of Torch Lake Village, President of Association.

Awarding of the Prizes Concluded the 1915 Meet—In a Special Match at the Elks Alleys, Copper Country Team Defeated the Iron Country by Sixty-Six Pins

The bowling tournament for 1916 was given to Lake Linden by vote of 150 or more members of the Upper Peninsula Bowling association at the annual meeting at the Clifton hotel Saturday night, at the close of what was declared to have been the most successful tournament in the seven years' existence of the association. The following officers were chosen:

President—A. A. Barbeau, Lake Linden. Vice-President—Frank G. Jenks, Marquette. Secretary and treasurer—A. A. Brockway, Lake Linden.

Mr. Barbeau is captain of the Big Lakes, the Lake Linden five-men team, which took the first award in that event, with 3,035 pins. Inquiry by officers of the bowling association has disclosed that the Lake Linden score tied the world's record for a five-men event in tournament, which fact occasions both surprise and pleasure. Higher scores have been rolled by five-men teams, but not in tournaments.

The 1915 Awards. At the meeting at the Clifton following the last game Saturday night the bowlers enjoyed a Dutch lunch, following which Dr. W. H. Vanderstee, chairman of the tournament committee, awarded the prizes.

Keuhl, of Marquette, who led in the singles until the last few days of the tournament, landed the grand average award, with an average of 199.88 for his nine games in the singles, doubles and five-men event.

The Big Lakes, of Lake Linden, received first prize for the five-men event, with 3,035 pins; the Crystal Falls five was second, with 2,831, and the Euipiros, of Ishpeming, Jack Gray, captain, was third, with over 2,700 pins.

McCulloch, Talo and Salme of Doriot, won the three-men event, with 1,727 pins, and an Escanaba team was second with 1,677 pins.

In addition to winning the grand average award, Marquette also was first in the doubles, Ora Mannes and F. G. Jenks, having rolled 1,258. Manistique was second, Kuller and Flood, of Crystal Falls, third, and Dover and Fisher, of Hancock, fourth.

Dan Fisher, of Hancock, won the singles with 657 pins. Raley, of Calumet, was second, with 618. Hennes, a former president of the association, extended the bowlers an invitation to visit Lake Linden for the 1916 tournament.

It was accepted, with the understanding that Backus pin spotters will be installed at the Lake Linden alleys prior to the dates of the tournament. In case the installation is not made, the association voted to hold the event at the Elks alleys at Calumet.

The features of the tournament Saturday were special matches between picked teams from the iron country and copper country in the evening, and between the Cubs, of Calumet, and the Crystal Falls five in the afternoon.

Iron-Copper Country Match. The iron-copper country match was won by the copper country men by 66 pins. Flood, of Crystal Falls, was high with 623 pins, and Barbeau, of Lake Linden, was second with 629.

The match was watched with interest by a crowd that more than comfortably took up all available space at the alleys, and

the cheering was deafening at times. The copper country has won this event for four consecutive years.

The Crystal Falls bowlers won from the Calumet Cubs by more than 200 pins.

The only thing that detracted noticeably from the pleasure of the tournament was the absence of Captains Hansen, East and Minnear, of the Millou Dollar team, of Laurium. These players arrived Friday, but didn't like the outlook and left a short time later, leaving Captain Hoatson alone to fight the battle. Mr. Hoatson was rolling in good form, having scored 533 in the singles and 602 in the doubles.
