MISS D. M. PALMER'S FATHER DIED IN WEST

Father of Ishpeming Woman, Pioneer of Duluth, Passes at an Advanced Age.

L. W. Palmer, father of Miss Della M. Palmer, of this city, died Tuesday morning in San Diego, Cal., where he had resided for a few years past. He went there from Duluth. Mr. Palmer was one of the pioneers of Duluth, having located there in 1875, and resided there continuously until he moved to San Diego in 1912.

The Duluth Herald of Tuesday said of his life: "L. W. Palmer, who came to the head of the lakes in 1856, and had lived here almost ever since, died this morning at the age of eighty-three years at San Diego, Cal., where he had been residing most of the time since 1912. Mr. Palmer had been ill for some time with the grip recently so weakened him that he could not rally. The body will be brought to Duluth within a week for interment here, and funeral arrangements will be announced later."

"Mr. Palmer is survived by his widow and by five children, who are E. L. Palmer, of the American Exchange National bank, Duluth; Lester W., with whom he was living in San Diego; Mrs. Clara S. Cooper, of Detroit, Mich.; Mrs. W. T. Cesse of Wilsall, Mont., and Miss Della M. Palmer, of Ishpeming, Mich.

"E. L. Palmer, wife and daughter returned about two weeks ago from San Diego, and he says that at that time his father was quite feeble."

"Mr. Palmer was born on May 1, 1832, in Henderson, N. Y. His ancestors came over in the Mayflower, and for years his family was among the leading ones of New England. His grandfather was a veteran of the Revolutionary war and Mr. Palmer, himself, was a veteran of the Civil war, and during his residence in Duluth filled every chair in Willis A. Gorman post, G. A. R. He came to the head of the lakes in 1856, and lived for a year at Sucker River, Minn. The rest of the family came to Superior in 1857, and for a number of years Mr. Palmer's father was keeper of the old lighthouse at the Superior entry. During the first year of the late Mr. Palmer's residence here, he worked on the survey of the St. Croix road between Duluth and Deer River. In 1885 he settled in Superior, where he resided until 1875, when he moved to Duluth, residing here until his death in California, in 1913. During the early days here, Mr. Palmer and his brother, Jotham C. Palmer, were in the contracting business, but the latter died some years ago and in later years L. W. Palmer retired from business. He was the last of his parents' family, a half brother, Ross H. Palmer, also a former Duluthian, dying about a year ago."

"Mr. Palmer was a Republican in politics and cast his first presidential vote for Fremont in 1856. He was a leading member of the First M. E. church of Duluth all the time he was in Duluth and was a steward of that church for many years."

Announcement of the marriage was received here yesterday.

Mr. Turner is expected to arrive in the city Saturday or Sunday. His friends here are of the impression that Mrs. Turner will remain at Flint to finish the school term.

Mrs. Turner is a graduate from the Marquette Normal and she is well known in both Marquette and Ishpeming. She has a number of relatives in Ishpeming and she visited here for some time last summer, also the preceding summer. The family has lived at Ironwood for years.

"Mr. Prisk is survived by a wife and three sons, Martin Prisk, Jr., of Laurium, Mich.; John and Charles Prisk of Park City and Salt Lake City, Utah."

"Mike Prisk, a brother, resides here. Another brother, William Prisk, lives at Ishpeming, Mich."

"Mr. Prisk had always been active in church work and for a number of years was leader of the Methodist choir."

FOR CHANGE IN TIME.

Advancement Association's Resolutions Presented to Council Last Evening.

Following are the resolutions adopted by the Ishpeming Advancement association at its meeting Tuesday afternoon and presented to the council last evening:

"Whereas, the Ishpeming Advancement association has carefully considered the proposal to adopt for city purposes eastern standard time, thereby turning the clocks ahead one hour, and believes that this course would result in material benefit to the entire working community, giving more daylight at the end of the working day for recreation or useful work; and

"Whereas, the business and industrial affairs of the cities of Ishpeming, Negaunee and Marquette are so closely related as to make it desirable that the same standard of time should be used by all three cities;

"Now, therefore, be it resolved, that we respectfully recommend to the common council of the city of Ishpeming the adoption of the following resolution:

"Resolved, That it is the judgment of the common council of the city of Ishpeming that it would be desirable to turn the clocks ahead one hour and adopt Eastern standard time for city affairs, thus giving to the working community more daylight for recreation or useful work at the end of the working day, provided, however, that the same standard of time is likewise approved and adopted by the cities of Negaunee and Marquette; and

"Resolved, further, That in case such proposed change in time is approved by the municipal governments of said cities, then we strongly recommend that eastern standard time be generally adopted and followed by employers of labor, merchants and business concerns and by all public and private schools, churches and other religious and social organizations, as well as for the conduct of city affairs."

NAVIGATION OPENING IS NOT FAR DISTANT

Vessel Owners Are Not Interested, as Little Business Has Been Lined Up.

Reports of ice conditions indicate an early opening of navigation, but little business has as yet been lined up.

In St. Mary's River there is more open water reported extending from Round Island, to Nine Mile Point in Hay Lake. The ice is slowly wearing away.

There has been no material change in the condition of the ice in Whitefish Bay.

In Lake Erie the ice fields are breaking up and some water is appearing near Mackinaw. Over the northern portion of Huron the fields have nearly disappeared while over the southern portion the fields are extensive and apparently extend from the mouth of the lake into St. Clair River on the 3rd, in small quantities and continues Tuesday.

In comparison with same period last season there is more ice reported in Superior. In St. Mary's River the ice is not as heavy and more open water is appearing.

The usual details for Lake Superior follow: Duluth: Harbor ice averages about 25 inches in thickness and the lake ice 15 inches; the harbor ice is honeycombed; the lake ice remains solid and extends east about 15 to 20 miles.

Two Harbors: Some floating ice in the harbor; the lake ice free from ice except a narrow fringe along shore; open water extends west to within 18 miles of Duluth.

Bayfield: The ice in the harbor averages 6 to 12 inches and is softening; fishermen report the ice fields have moved beyond vision on the east side of Madeline Island; light keeper reports no ice at Bear Island.

Washburn: Harbor ice averages 22 inches and is solid.

Port Arthur, Ont.: Harbor ice 20 inches in thickness and extends out 12 miles; ice breaks in the harbor and has opened channel about half way to open water in the lake.

Ontonagon: The field ice extends out about 6 miles.

Portage Canal: Drift ice is packed inside the breakwater; small floating fields outside.

Grand Marais, Mich.: Harbor ice 20 inches in thickness and solid; the fields in the lake extend out about 2 miles with open water beyond; at Deer Park the ice fields extend beyond vision.

Whitefish Point: During the past week there has been no open water visible; the cold weather continues which has made new ice over the open places reported last week.

Sault Ste. Marie: The ice 18 inches in thickness, extends from the ferry dock to the locks on the American side with open water on the Canadian; the open water extends from above Round Island to Nine Mile Point in Hay Lake; the ice in Mud Lake continues solid, but is wearing away.

ALASKA BOUGHT FORTY-EIGHT YEARS AGO. The purchase price paid by the United States to the Russian government was \$7,200,000.

Several reasons have been assigned as to why Russia disposed of this vast territory. It was supposed that the United States commenced the negotiations to re-negotiate Bering, under the guise of purchase, for her friendly attitude toward us during the civil war.

Three years later, in 1865, the Western Union Telegraph company proposed to construct a line from San Francisco northward through to connect the Russian line at its then terminus, Amoor, Siberia.

The purchase price paid by the United States to the Russian government was \$7,200,000. At the time of the purchase this was generally looked upon as an extravagant expenditure, but in the action of Secretary Seward in this transaction has been charged to a sentiment that credits him with shrewd diplomacy in thus securing this great territory.
