A big castern mail order house until a few year ago trained its office workers in the usual manner by a course of apprenticeship under another employe, or employes, in the regular business offices Objections were found to this plan mainly that instructing the new clerk took too much of the time of the older clerk from her regular duties; that the older clerk usually had little ability as a teacher, and no training; and that the new clerk often made mistake which affected the customer. To over come these obstacles an office school was organized. Its chief purposes are to give new clerks elementary training and to drill older clerks in more complicate office routine. The school is a miniatur office where standard office operations i handling orders from customers are per formed by new clerks under the super vision of trained clerks and teacher An analysis of the office routine showed the detail work in each department and an office manual of fifty-three chapters was prepared. This contains precise in struction in office methods and not serves as a text book. Each clerk i provided with an office manual contain ing the chapters pertaining to the wor to be learned, and this reference boo supplements the personal instruction

The clerks are taught in classes and ordinarily the points trought out i each lesson are illustrated by actual work on current records and mail. i addition to specific instruction cover ing the line of work they are intended to do, the beginners are trained in gen eral efficiency, and hear lectures b executives and department heads. This school has fund that clerks, who av erage one or two years of high schoo instruction are lacking in knowledge o the rudiments of arithmetic and English composition.

A Pennsylvania bridge company em plovs an office force, skilled mechanics and foreigners for rough work, and its course of instruction is arranged to meet various needs. Some of the foreign em ployes were found to have a fair train ing in their native language, bift with little knowledge of English, so a class in elementary English was started which now has a staff of six teachers and an enrollment of 125 students. For another class of employes there is provided science school, where theoretical train ing in relation to bridge designing given. This is attended mainly h young Americans who have not had sufficient scientific training to equip them selves for their work and by older met in better positions who yet find that they lack a knowledge of the theory of their work. The course of study in the scientific school ranges from arithmetic to calculus and from strength of materials to bridge and building design, all supplemented by actual work in th shop. The company has found it advisable to charme a small fee for tuition in its schools, the amount varying with the warms and condition of the employe The bulletie of the National Association of Corporation Schools states that several college graduates have spent a term at this school to acquaint themselves with practice in bridge design.



DUTCH FLORISTS HAVE HAD UNUSUAL TRADE.

The Hague, Netherlands, May 20. Special Correspondence of the Associat d Press.) - Although times are hard, the Datch florists' trade has enjoyed a phe omenal increase this spring, the general depression having given rise to an unprecedented demand for cut flowers to heer Dutch homes.

The shops are filled with carnations the stately iris, with oriflames of daz zling blue, up-standing gladioli, Darwin tulips with their long pliant stems equistic yellow tea roses, orchids galore and peonies with heads as big as cab bages. Among the potted plants there are marvelous hortensias, fragrant by aginths from the bulb fields near Haay lem, weird blooms of the calceolaria, and hydrangias. All are offered at modest prices, notwithstanding the demand.

The cultivation and sale of cut flowers is a recent growth in the Netherlands. 

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



But his loyal heart heard the call of need, and to his brother the Czar the Grand Duke Michael instantly offered his sword in Russia's defense Among the numerous imperial princes

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who are fighting, with the exception of the Generalissimo, the Grand Duke Nicholas, none but the Grand Duke Michael Alexandrovitch has wone fame and honor in this war. In command of a division of the army of the Caucasus, which was sent to the Carpathians a few weeks ago to renew the stubborn actacks upon the mountain passes leading into Nungary, the Grand Duke Michael led his men with rash courage, risking his life more than once, exposing himself to shrapnel and shell, and encouraging his soldiers by eloquent appeals to their bravery. The Germans, Austrians and Hungarians were unable to take the important positions in the direction o Lomna, the Grand Duke Michael holding them with great military skill untit further reinforcements could be brought up and the Russian offensive begun again.

The Grand Duke Michael's name is on every peasant's ups and his bravery is extolled. Old stories of his generosity are being retold. His long struggle with his family over his marriage to a woman of the nobility, a lady in every sense of the word, although not of royal blood, is proof of his democracy and sincerity. which gives him an appeal unique among the princes available for the throne, as far as the people are concerned. It is now taken for granted that he will never go into exile again, that he realizes the grave responsibilities his birth imposes and that if the throne is vacant after his brother's death, he will, reluctantly perhaps, but none the less faithfully, devote his life to Russia as its Czar. This contingency will henceforth be accepted also in international diplomacy as a factor of the deepest concern to the affairs of the country.

Amiable and gentle mannered so much so that in his youth he was considered dacking in strength of character, the Grand Duke Michael has, in recent years, amply proved that he has an inflexible will. He has many of the quali ties of Czar Alexander IL., who promulgated the ukase giving freedom from serfdom to the peasants.

Visitors at the Russian court twelve and fifteen years ago, found comparatively little trouble in meeting the Grand Duke Michael, then the heir ap parent. Unassuming, kind hearted, ap preciative of talent, he was himself eager to become acquainted with distinguished men from foreign lands. He was conversant with American history and frankly expressed his admiration of American institutions. He had an American physical trainer who kept the Grand Duke's muscles in good condition by a daily wrestle, and he had American brod horses in his stables. He often spoke of his intention of coming to tour the United States.

Grand Duke Michool was credited then with being entirely under the influence of his mother, the Dowager Czarina, who was looking far into the future and preparing for the probable accession of her younger son. Her elder son, the Czar, seldom failed to meet her wishes in affairs of state, and she was ambitious to remain paramount in the government of the empire. Grand Duke Michael, contrary to custom, was not allowed a separate establishment when he became of age. He remained in his mother's home, apparently waiting for



"Marquette sent a company of infantry early that year, they being among the first to enlist in the state Among the first groups to be organized in Marquette in 1861 was one led by then Captain Chas, H. Town, who had seen service in the Mexican war and who afterwards commanded the first Michigan Cavalry. Town organized a company of cavalry and took eighty men from the upper peninsula, over half of whom came from the town of Marquette. They afterwards became a part of the Michigan Brigade of Cavalry, which distinguished itself in many engagements and through the war, notably at Gettysburg. General Custer gained his place as one of the nation's greatest soldiers with this brigade.

"It would be impossible to recount all the deeds of patriotic courage performed by the Michigan men and to follow them all through the war. I have shown you the promptness of their response and will give one instance of the service they rendered. I quote from General Custer's report of Aug. 22, 1863, covering the operations of his cavalry during a portion of the Battle of Gettysburg.


