Berlin, July 15.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—Palestine is undergoing a great transformation in the matter of railway communication, improved highways, and better sanitary conditions. This is evident from a letter to the Frankfurter Zeitung from its correspondent in Jaffa, the seaport of Jerusalem, who has been interviewing Djemal Pasha, the military governor of Syria. This work has all been undertaken since Turkey went to war and is largely in preparation for extensive military operations against Egypt. Already, according to Djemal Pasha, the Suez canal has been mined and one ship sunk.

CITY PLAYGROUNDS GET \$450 FROM FUND

Commercial Club Partially Disposes of Balance of Homecoming Money.

The directors of the Commercial club yesterday made a partial disposition of the unexpended balance from the fund raised for the homecoming celebration by voting \$450 of it for playground purposes. When the homecoming committee, of which A. E. Archambault was chairman, settled up its affairs, it turned over to the Commercial club a statement showing a balance of \$220. Since the statement was prepared, more bills have been received and more are expected, so that the first balance will be decreased.

Community Meetings.

MAYOR IMPROVES GARBAGE SYSTEM

Methods of Garbage Collection and Disposal Enforced During Last Two Years Have Effectuated Saving of \$1,400 Annually—Cost Now Averages \$280 Monthly.

F. H. Begole Says Incinerating Plant Is Not Necessary for Marquette and Is Supported by Commissioner of Public Works McCall of Chicago—Flies Scarce

"Would the building of an incinerating plant in Marquette mean an improvement in the handling of the city's garbage?" was a question which Mayor F. H. Begole answered yesterday by taking two newspapermen for a ride to the dump grounds.

The automobile rolled out of the city to the south over an excellent road which leads past the county infirmary into the woods beyond. Finally a stop was made alongside a sand bank and the party got out of the car. The newspapermen waited for the mayor to lead them to the garbage piles, but instead he looked around complacently at the trees and inhaled deeply.

"Where is the dump?" he was asked. "Right here, under your feet," was the answer. It was the truth. Everything was buried. The scurrying of rats and the buzzing of flies, sounds which are associated with dump grounds in general, were absent. Everything was as sweet and clean as a newly plowed field.

Here was the secret of Marquette's freedom from the fly pest. Not a cabbage leaf, not even a tomato can, is allowed to remain uncovered over night. The residents of the city are the healthier for the care taken at the dump grounds. "It is commendable to reduce the tax rate," says Mayor Begole, "but it is vastly more important to reduce the death rate." And for this reason he gives much personal attention to the city's garbage question.

Incinerator Not Needed. Mayor Begole maintains that Marquette has a system of handling its garbage which could not be improved upon by the erection of an incinerating plant and supports his contention by the statements of men in charge of garbage disposal in New York, Chicago, and other big cities of the United States.

In July of 1914 Mayor Begole made an inspection of the incinerating plant maintained by the city of Paris in company with Commissioner of Public Works McCall of Chicago. When Marquette's system was described to him, Mr. McCall said no more sanitary or economical method of garbage disposal could be devised. Chicago would like nothing better than to be able to bury its garbage, but the city is too large.

Not only was Mayor Begole responsible for the idea of burying the garbage, but he reorganized the garbage collection system in the city so that it is now 60 per cent better than before and costs the city \$1,400 less annually.

Collection Systematized. The entire garbage collection force consists of three men and two wagons. Every garbage can in the city is emptied once a week and a collection is made twice a week in the business section. So systematically is the work done that the average householder will find the wagon at his door on the same day and hour as in the previous week. No complaints have been received this summer by Mayor Begole. Dr. R. C. Main, the health officer, has received a few complaints about garbage collection, but investigation has each time proved them to be unfounded.

During the hot weather canvas covers are used on the wagons. Slack time at seventy-five cents a barrel is used at the dump grounds as additional disinfectant and to drive away flies and rats as much as possible. The average garbage can is the center of more flies than the city dump and when the new rat bounty act goes into effect on Aug. 27, the small boys will wage effective warfare against the rats. Trenches are ready at all times to receive dead horses, fish entrails, and similar animal matter.

For two years the cost of handling the city's garbage has averaged \$280 a month. Even if the haul were made shorter, an incinerating plant would increase the cost of garbage collection because it would be necessary to grade the garbage. Tin cans could not go through the incinerating plant and a dump ground would have to be found for these.

Same Routine in Winter. The routine of garbage collection is maintained in the winter as well as during the summer months. There is less garbage, however, and the men and teams find time to spend from five to six weeks on the snow plows and scrapers.

A waste of tin cans on a hillside to the east of the present garbage burial site gives an illustration of former methods of garbage disposal. The wagons were driven to the edge of the hillside and the contents dumped, providing a breeding place for flies which could not be improved upon were the city trying to propagate them for game purposes. When the flies tired of their birthplace, as many adventurous creatures do, they drifted toward the city and made strenuous efforts to break into society. They were very bold. The average fly in Marquette today is as shy as a deer and keeps out of sight most of the time.

DR. O. G. YOUNGQUIST BLAMELESS. Coroner's Jury Absolves Driver of Automobile at Inquest Yesterday.

The coroner's jury yesterday absolved Dr. O. G. Youngquist from all blame in connection with the death of Wilbur Anderson, who died Wednesday night after an automobile accident which occurred that morning.

The verdict passed by the jurors stated that he came to his death by accidentally running into an automobile driven by Dr. O. G. Youngquist on North Third street, between Ohio and Michigan, and we do not find any blame on the part of Dr. Youngquist.

The jurors were W. H. Schweitzer, John Robertson, S. A. Williams, John W. Bennett, Frank Bengstrom and William Sudell, and the inquest was conducted by Coroner William Prin of Ishpeming. The testimony of all the witnesses

was to the effect that Dr. Youngquist was not traveling faster than ten miles an hour. George Tucker testified that he looked at the speedometer just before the accident occurred and the speed was less than ten miles an hour. John Dunham, who was passing by just as the accident occurred, said that Dr. Youngquist did everything in his power to avoid striking the boy and the automobile would have cleared him had
