#### ITALIANS REPEL SEA ATTACK.

Rome, via Paris, July 30, 5:45 p. m. An attempt was made by a squadron of Austrian cruisers and a flotilla of torpedo boat destroyers yesterday to recapture the Austrian island of Pelagosa in the Adriatic, which was occupied by Italian naval forces last Monday, according to an official communication issued today by the Italian ministry o marine. ### AUSTRIANS SUFFER BIG LOSSES.

Geneva, via Paris, July 30, 3:20 p. n -A telegraphic dispatch to the Tribuna from Laibach, in Carniola, says: "The Austrians attacked the Italian at Gorizia with 170,000 men, including 30,000 Bavarian on the night of July 28 with disastrous results. The Austrian losses numbered 12,000.

"On the following day a fierce Austrian attack on Carso also was repulsed. "The Italians hold all the positions they have captured in the last fifteen days, except the advanced trenches be fore Gorizia, which have been evacuated.
