Towsley, vice president and general manager of the Ann Achor Railroad company, testified in the svit of the railroad against the state of Michigan.

"Wages alone have advanced to between 30 and 49 per cent, while the cost of a single ocomotive is 85 per cent, higher than was the case eight years ago. 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



EDISON LIONIZED ON COAST

tendance. Leading Masons from all Feted in San Francisco During Exposition Visit-Orchestra War Over.

Thomas A. Edison, visiting the exosition, tells the local newspapers today of his plans to perfect the mechanical reproduction of music so that on The seventeenth, eighteenth, and tweather the phonograph even orchestral performances will be satisfactory.

"We are going to have scientific muic next. I am going to produce all the symphonies of Beethoven by phonograph so that one can hear them as perfeetly as if listening to a big symhonic orchestra. I am constructing a uge concrete bowl, forty-two feet in diameter, arranged with wires which will catch all the sound waves. I will place all the musicians underneath this boy ! and not a single sound wave will escape reproduction.

This concrete bowl is being constructed at the laboratory in West Orange, N. J.
