DDA still intends to bond

The Downtown Development Authority (DDA) will continue to amend its 1988 plan, but the defeat of "proposal A" will mean that the amendment process will take place in a "normal business atmosphere instead of a crisis," according to the city manager Alan Housler.

"It was not passed, however, so the time constraints are removed. Miller and Canfield (bonding attorneys) advised us to proceed on the same avenues."

In April, the city's bonding attorneys recommended that the DDA plan specifically reflect the authority's intent to bond.

Strongly opposed in Seney's 33-9, Mueller Township voters defeated proposal A 44-31.

CCDPW voices opposition

Amending the Schoolcraft County Solid Waste Management Plan is the responsibility of the county board and the solid waste management planning committee, but the City-County Department of Public Works (CCDPW) has some opinions on the matter as well.

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Proposal A defeat will lead to another vote

The statewide defeat of proposed taxation and school funding reform amendment "Proposal A" last week will mean that local voters will be returning to the polls later this summer.

At Tuesday's regular meeting, the Manistique Area Schools Board of Education unanimously voted to hold a special election on Monday, Aug. 9 to ask voters whether or not the maximum authorized millage rate be approved for levy in 1993 without the reduction required by Article IX, Section 31 of the State Constitution of 1963, the "Headlee Amendment."

The 30 year old amendment prohibits the actual amount of tax dollars collected from increasing more than the rate of inflation.

The school board approved the pre-Headlee rate of 32.336 mills during a separate resolution Tuesday--an increase that parallels the 3 percent increase in inflation rates over the past year. A "truth in taxation" public hearing was scheduled for the next board meeting, a requirement following any increase in taxation.

According to Superintendent of Schools Herb Harroun, if the Headlee rollback is overridden by voters in August, the district would be able to levy an additional 1.414 mills, an increase of \$180,000 under the current state aid formula.

"That's a fairly significant chunk of change," Harroun said, adding that the early August election date would be common among several districts in the Delta-Schoolcraft Intermediate School District (ISD).

Legislators question river clean up

"Potentially Responsible Parties" (PRP's) targeted by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to help fund clean-up of the Manistique Harbor have called the help of state and federal legislators in their quest for information.

Under the Superfund Accelerated Clean Up Mode (SACuM), the EPA has labeled the clean-up as "time critical," and plans to dredge the harbor to remove PCB pollutants by the end of the summer.

Gagliardi has also questioned the EPA's procedure by letter, requesting that the EPA conduct a "thorough study of the PCB's in the Manistique Harbor before any clean up action begins."

"This cleanup does not appear to be consistent with the recent testimony on Superfund by EPA administrator Carol M. Browner before the Senate Committee on Environment and Public Works," Gagliardi said.

- 1 can vegetarian refried beans (watch that you don't get the can with lard.)
- 1 small onion, diced
- 1/2 - 1 green pepper, diced
- 1/2 - 1 pound ground turkey (depending on how much meat you prefer).
- 1 package buerito mix (seasoning pack) I couldn't find it so used Taco Mix.
- 1 pkg. (16 oz) low fat shredded Co-jack Cheese

Spread beans evenly on the bottom of glass casserole dish. Cover beans with diced onions and green pepper. Microwave, covered, for 3-5 minutes, until beans are hot. Brown ground turkey and add seasoning mix. Cover beans and vegetables with the ground turkey. Sprinkle the shredded cheese over the top and microwave for 5 minutes. Serve in a warmed flour tortilla with a little hot salsa and low-fat sour cream. Or, serve with nacho chips, chopped lettuce and tomatoes, and any condiment you prefer. Very good - and healthy, too!

Candidates Jan Brownhill, Marcus Burns, and Terry Savage are running for two four-year board seats, while write in Ian Jeffcott will challenge William Rogers for an unexpired two-year term.

Biographies precede each candidate's responses. A response was not received from two year term candidate William Rogers.

1. I understand the need to form committees to handle many of the detailed issues confronting the Board. Committees can be very effective in providing members the necessary time and involvement to fully research and comprehend complex issues. The committee structure can also lend itself to the involvement of other interested parties in the community in order to work toward an understanding of the problems and issues and the development of a consensus toward possible solutions. The drawback and danger of committees is that the Board becomes a rubber stamp to the committees' recommendations, putting full board authority in the hands of a minority. The charter of the committees should be to gain a complete understanding of the issues and to present the facts to the complete Board for discussion and action.

2. We always had a budget committee and at times other committees. I don't feel this year's program of standing committees has accomplished very much and it has been a problem scheduling meetings.

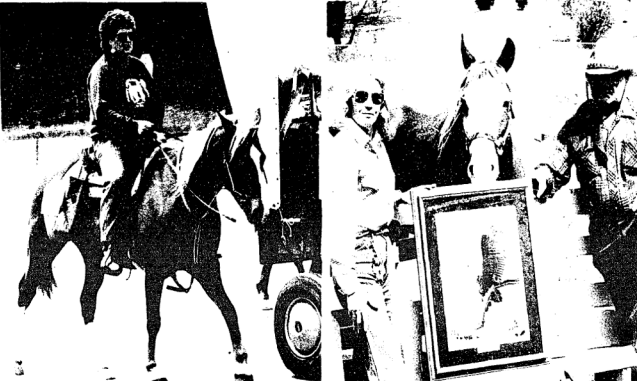
3. If Proposal A passes some of the additional funds will be needed to cover normal increases in operating expenses. Any additional funds should be used to help maintain the 10 percent funding mandated by Board policy.

1. I feel that the present curriculum combined with the school improvement program is adequate. I would like to see more foreign language introduced into the curriculum so our kids would be able to understand their instructors when they go to college.

2. The current Manistique Area Schools curriculum is adequate and comparable to Michigan school systems of similar size and funding. Since the curriculum should prepare students for further education and eventually the world of work and for their role as citizens and members of families, no curriculum should remain fixed. I would recommend continued emphasis on a core curriculum with frequent analysis of student performance tests and developing methods to improve performance. School computer system is discussed, continued

Though board member Ingnar Levin moved that the recommendation be accepted, with Marcus Burns seconding the motion, Sam Burns, supported by the remainder of the board, moved that the recommendation be tabled until the board held a work session on the 1993-1994 budget.

"I understand the need for computers, but I also understand that we will be facing negotiations, we don't know what our funding will be, and we don't know what the Headlee rollback will result in," said Burns.

"We need to see what we can afford to do," said secretary Dixie Klagstad.

School board candidates respond to questions

1.) Yes, I believe the Manistique Area Schools provides an adequate curriculum for a majority of our students. However, I believe the challenge is not whether we provide an adequate curriculum, but do we provide a curriculum which assures maximum learning opportunities with educational excellence for all of our students. This mission of educational excellence needs to be taken within the context and framework of the resources of the district, and therefore is not an easy question to answer. The Model Core Curriculum Outcomes adopted by the State provides an excellent framework in preparing our students to become useful and productive citizens. The difficult task of implementing these outcomes in our curriculum has been initiated and needs to be strongly supported and encouraged. I would like to see more opportunities offered to all students. As an example, many students desire higher education, but the necessary academic classes for higher educational entrance requirements. A diverse and well rounded curriculum of academics, arts, vocational classes, and extracurricular activities are necessary for our students to achieve their fullest potential.

2.) I understand the need to form committees to handle many of the detailed issues confronting the Board. Committees can be very effective in providing members the necessary time and involvement to fully research and comprehend complex issues. The committee structure can also lend itself to the involvement of other interested parties in the community in order to work toward an understanding of the problems and issues and the development of a consensus toward possible solutions. The drawback and danger of committees is that the Board becomes a rubber stamp to the committees' recommendations, putting full board authority in the hands of a minority. The charter of the committees should be to gain a complete understanding of the issues and to present the facts to the complete Board for discussion and action.

3.) The passage of Proposal A would be a great benefit in the Manistique Area School System. Not only would it increase funding for the school, but it would ensure a firmer basis for funding and eliminate the need for costly millage elections. According to figures presented by the school district, the additional money generated by Proposal A for the year 1994 would amount to \$384,000. This represents an increased funding of approximately 6 percent. A majority of this increase will be enjoyed by annual

inflation, which was approximately 3.5 percent in 1993. This year the School District is operating with a projected deficit of \$126,000. I feel strongly that the School District must operate within its resources. Adjusting for inflation and covering the current deficit leaves a net increase of \$56,000. I know there are many worthy uses for this money which will require the Board to make some tough decisions on where best to use the increase in funding. Enhancements to the curriculum, libraries in the elementary schools, improved facilities, a running track, and maintaining and expanding the use and teaching of technology, are only a few of the possibilities.

should be worked into the core curriculum for our students who may not be college bound. These technical job training courses are started in middle school and extend through the senior curriculum. This gives the student the chance to enter entry-level employment, apprenticeships or pursue an associates degree.

For college bound students we should offer advanced placement courses. These courses give the students credit toward their college and also a good look at the accelerated learning style they will soon be experiencing in college. Many schools already offer these courses for their students and I think our students should have the opportunity to enter college at the same level as students from other schools.

I've seen more student participation in extra curricular programs, these students strive to do their best, which builds self-esteem and personal accomplishment. I think these programs and additional ones should continue, this will insure that our students will continue to have these opportunities open to them. For example, I would like to see the track field restored, which would not only benefit the students, but also the community.

2.) Utilizing the "committee structure" has greatly benefited the operations of the school board. For example, the school board is more informed of the day to day operations of the district. CCDPW secretary John Stewart introduced the motion to oppose the amendment, as he feels that it "promotes a near monopoly."

"It's not our decision, it's up to the board and the committee and the local municipalities," said Stewart. "But we want to go on the record opposing it."

Though they oppose the proposed change of the county plan, CCDPW members did vote unanimously to change the way their income is distributed Tuesday.

According to CCDPW secretary Stewart, members present at Tues-

day's meeting unanimously approved altering the distribution of the \$0.1667 per pound rebate from MRI, allowing 65 percent of the funds to go to a 64-96 landfill closure, 25 percent of the funds to go towards recycling, and 10 percent to be set aside for administration.

Formerly, the distribution was 45-45-10 for fill closure, recycling and administration, respectively.

Stewart said that the change was approved as the fund balance in the recycling account is high, while the landfill closure account is low, and it is estimated that over \$30,000 per year will be necessary to close the landfill.

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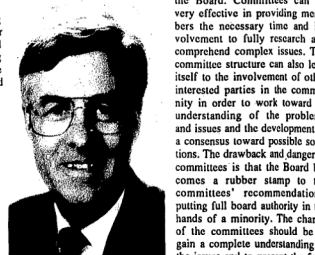
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James E. Brownhill

Society works on preservation

Soul Choix Point
A Symbol of Peacefulness
and Refuge
by Jennifer Lane

This is a continuing story of the Soul Choix Point Lighthouse from the May issue of the Memories Column. Jennifer Lane is an honor student of Suomi College and lives in Gulliver, MI. She takes an active part in preserving her area history.

On October 8, 1987, a group of local citizens held the first meeting of the Gulliver Historical Society. The group discussed the Schoolcraft County Historical Society's Charter to form their own set of rules. Upon establishment, the society retraced and recorded Gulliver's past. It then set its main priority of historically preserving the Soul Choix Point Lighthouse. As the success of the group became publicized, membership and community interest increased.

Even though the exquisite natural beauty of Soul Choix Point remained, the structures from that era were still standing completed. Research then had to be done to prove the site was historical. A historical background steam and fog signal building had to be written, and copies of were slowly losing their charm. documents to prove its history

Memories

The Escanaba Daily Press said, "Of the 900 lighthouses scattered along the nation's shorelines, 75 are in use in Michigan and 400 elsewhere, operated and maintained by Coast Guard Preservationists...many of these picturesque old structures are being neglected and falling into disrepair..." The Gulliver Historical Society pledged to restore and preserve the lighthouse.

The State Register was established by Act 10 of the Public Acts of 1955. It was designed to recognize historic sites in Michigan and allows for an official identification marker inscribed with the name of the site and the year. Led by Marilyn Fischer, President of the Historical Society, the group petitioned for Soul Choix Point's lighthouse to be included in the Register. To apply for a position on the State Register, a five-page form had to be completed. Research then had to be done to prove the site was historical. A historical background steam and fog signal building had to be written, and copies of were slowly losing their charm. documents to prove its history

were traced from the Michigan and National Archives and included with the research. On August 28, 1988, the state sent announcements that the nomination of the site to the State Register was official. Eventually, the site was also listed in the National Register. The Historical Society then addressed the Michigan Equity Grant Program for funds to begin renovation of the fog signal building into a museum. The necessary paperwork and petitioning was completed, and on January 6, 1989, the Department of Commerce sent a letter announcing a \$19,000 award to the Historical Society. After three months of paperwork, drawing up plans, and collecting almost \$4,000 from local businesses, work began as soon as the snow melted.

Inside the fog signal building were remnants of the old steam system that sounded the foghorn which was torn out. Layers of tin that covered the ceiling were pulled down, and with it an unsuspected ninety-three years' worth of bat guano. Outside a sidewalk was poured, leading from the newly enlarged parking lot to the museum, and the grounds were landscaped. Historical Society members and locals volunteered their time to complete most of the work. Crews were set up for painting, construction, and clean-up, with many materials and labor donated by local businesses. Local businesses were hired to complete jobs such as building display cabinets and electrical work. The job proved to be messy and laborious, but the workers were dedicated to finishing the project.

t-shirt sales, and food booths at local events, the group raised necessary finances to begin restoration of the Keeper's quarters. During an eighteen week period from July to December, work crews from the Shock incarceration Unit from Camp Manistique were hired for the renovation project. The Unit was a minimum security experimental correctional facility in which the prisoners were hired for community or county projects during their ninety day sentence at Camp Manistique. The work crews sent to the lighthouse consisted of five to ten men ranging in age from eighteen to twenty-four years of age, along with one or more guards.

Under restrictions of the Occupational Safety Health Act (OSHA), the work crews could use only power tools approved by the State's Act. The men set to work with simple, old fashioned methods such as blocks of wood covered with sand paper, chisels, and scrapers. Scythes were used to clear the thick brush covering the scenic lakeshore and create walking paths through the trees. The men made remarkable progress over the short period of time. Throughout the entire Keeper's quarters, the doors and moldings were stripped and sanded. Layers of time, thick black adhesive, and coats of paint were removed from the floor. Sanding of the original oak flooring was begun, but no further restoration was done.

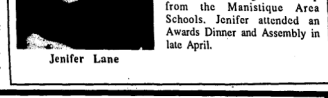
The Society has written an in-depth report listing each task of the renovation. One of the main goals is to continue work on the Keeper's quarters. The rooms will be redone with historically correct furnishings. Old photos of previous light keepers and their families will aid in showing how the rooms should look. One room will be set aside and refurbished into a video-conference room. Antique church pews were donated, and the group plans to create a "Living Library" by interviewing senior citizens of how they lived years ago. A separate display room for Coast Guard artifacts along with information signs for all the displays is another goal. The exterior of the tower must be completely sanded, blasted, and both the interior and exterior need to be repainted. Lastly, the society hopes to re-

construct an early fishing village on the Point. For the past three years the museum has been open to tourists from July to mid-September for four hours each day. All tours are given by volunteer guides who count each person on the tours, and have averaged over 4,000 people in a two month period. This is not counting the many who visit the grounds during non-touring hours. Private reunions for previous light keeper's families and two weddings have been held on the grounds. Special group tours during other months of the year have been arranged. The Manistique Area School System and the Escanaba Intermediate School District have arranged tours. The overwhelming positive response proves that the Historical Society's dedication to preserve the history of the area is significant. The Soul Choix Point Lighthouse has represented peacefulness and a place of refuge during the changing times. The fur traders sought safety in the harbor while fishermen and loggers depended on its resources for their livelihood. Sailors relied on the peace of mind brought by the light and fog signals the light keepers loyally cared for. Today, the lighthouse symbolizes area families' roots. Through the renovation and preservation of the Point, the value of history will be shared with all those who visit the memorable Soul Choix Point.

SLFP accepts Freeman

License deadline nears

The Department of Natural Resources reminds hunters that June 15 is the deadline to apply for a 1993 Michigan bear harvest license.

Approximately 5,100 harvest licenses will be available for eight bear management units - seven in the Upper Peninsula and one in the northern Lower Peninsula. A map of the management units is provided with the license application forms.

The 1993 bear season is from Sept. 10 through Oct. 21, but dates vary for some management units. Specific hunting season dates will be listed on the harvest license.

At its June meeting, the Natural Resources Commission will consider extending the bear season by five days for the Upper Peninsula units, with the exception of Drummond Island. To compensate for the extension, the permit quota would be reduced by approximately 50 licenses statewide to achieve the desired harvest.

This year the DNR drawing system will give preference to about 300 applicants who have applied correctly but have been unsuccessful applicants during the last three seasons, providing their applications are correct this year. All other applicants will be entered in a non-preferential random drawing. Non-residents will receive no more than two percent of the harvest licenses.

Each applicant may apply as an individual or with a partner. The application fee is \$14.35 for residents. There is no application fee for Senior Hunt license holders, who must obtain their application from a DNR district or regional office.

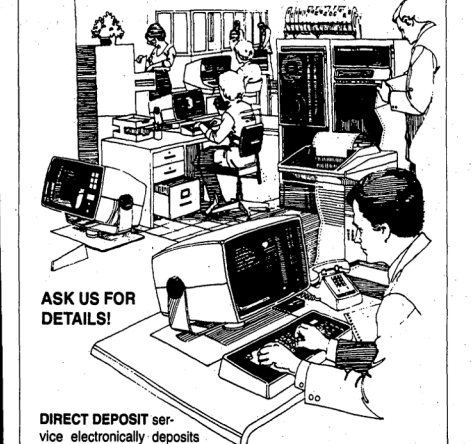
