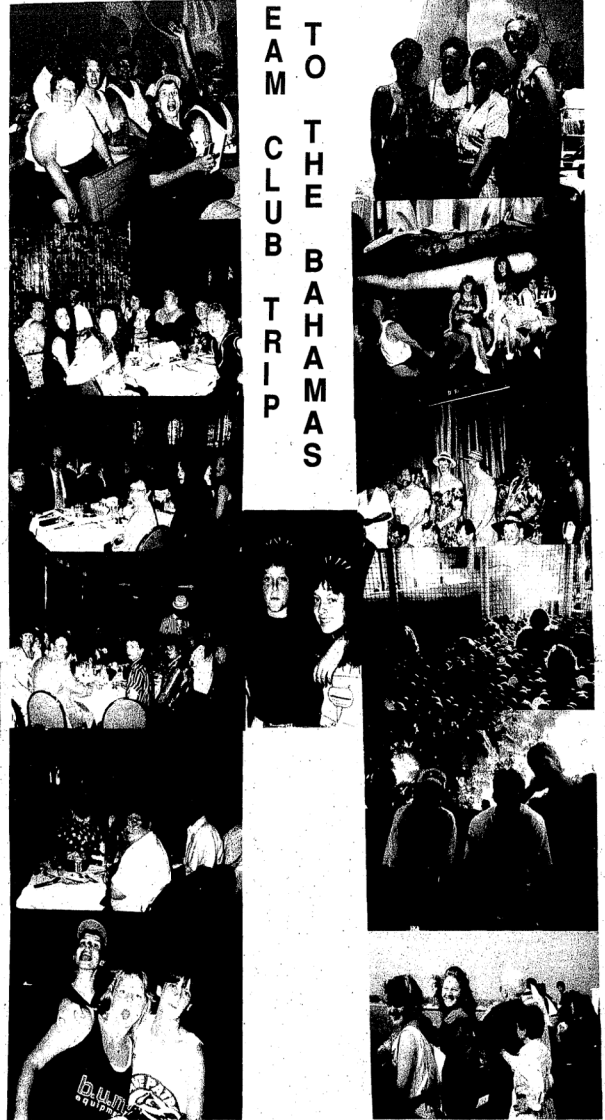

Last of the Black Robes

Father Gagnieur, "LAST OF THE BLACK ROBES"

Back in the winter of 1988, a small group of Gulliver locals met at the Doyle Township Hall to begin their task of preserving Gulliver's history. An ad had been placed in our local papers declaring the Gulliver Historical Society had been formed and everyone was welcome to attend the meetings. The weather was terrible that evening and severe snow and ice warnings were issued. Half-way through the meeting, in the door came two snow covered figures from Escanaba. They braved the storm to deliver a precious box of history left in their care from their dear departed relative, Olive Leveille McCloy. Their mission was to bring back to our community his and pieces of her life spent growing and working in the Gulliver area. They said, "The minute we saw the ad in the paper, we were obsessed with the idea to return these things to where they belong." Many readers will remember Olive McCloy as being their teacher for many years in the Doyle and Mueller school areas. Among the many priceless photos, cards, and personal memorabilia was a hand written manuscript on Father Gagnieur, written by Olive on June 24, 1939. I would like to share her words and thoughts with you on someone who most certainly touched her life. I think she would be thrilled to know her words are still teaching!

REV. FATHER WILLIAM F. GAGNIEUR, S.J., compiled by Olive McCloy - June 24, 1939

Father Gagnieur first came to Schoolcraft County and the Indian settlements throughout the Upper Peninsula about 40 years ago, and lived a saintly life similar to the kind old priest told about in Longfellow's Evangeline, as: "Forty years of my life have I labored among you, and taught you. Not in word alone, but in deed, to love one another."

He was born in Guelph, Ont. Canada on May 10, 1837. He was the son of a French father

chief among the thousands of so Chippewa and Ottawa Indians living on the Island. The two walked down to the Indian Village of Wiskewikong on the shores of the island. "Below lay the village" Father Gagnieur said, relating the experience a few years before his death. As we came down the hillside we could see the score or so of log cabins, whitewashed and shining in the sun. There were several hundred Indians from miles around the island, and from the near shores. "When we reached the scene of the celebration there were scores of canoes lined up along the beach, long white boats on one mast, old Mackinac boats, which the Indians of the vicinity used for a fishing, Indian ponies were tethered in the rear in large numbers, while up and down the beach swarmed a horde of children and as many dogs."

He was ordained a priest April 26, 1886, in the basement of what is now one of the most beautiful churches in Montreal. Two years later he was sent to Wikewikong, an Indian Village on the shores of the Manistiquin Island in Georgian Bay at the Upper end of Lake Huron. The Black Robes, "Last of the Black Robes," landed there in 1880-200 years after the time Father James Marquette, S.J., "the First of the Black Robes" set foot on what is now Hiawatha-Land. He began the study of Indian history when he first came to Manistiquin Island on the Great Manitoulin Island Ont. Canada, July 4, 1889, and spent six years with the Indians of Georgian Bay and Lakes Superior.

The Sainly old priest was adopted into the Chippewa tribe on Manistiquin Island many years ago when he first was assigned to the land of Hiawatha as a missionary. It all started from the society of the white mission chapel at Wikewikong on Swiss Bay, Manitoulin Island one bright September morning while he was serving on the island. Two men started out from the tiny little chapel, one was an Indian, six feet tall, the other was a small man clothed in the black robes of the Jesuit order. He was Father Gagnieur. The Indian was bedecked in the best of store clothes because he was a high

meal, a slice of salt pork, a relish and a potato a luxury. Travel was by snowshoe and dog in the winter and by canoe or small sailing boat in summer. Father Gagnieur had no paved roads on which to travel, only a few trails. Spring brought slush, knee deep, which was not much better and many times worse because the creeks would be swollen. Father Gagnieur left as a memoir an outstanding accomplishment in the Indian languages, some 10 years ago he made a trip to the University of Michigan to put a complete record of the Indian languages he had learned and mastered into a living record. He was also known as an accomplished musician and composed several pieces for the organ. He has contributed considerably to the Michigan Historical Magazine and given lectures on Michigan history. He was also a life member of the Pioneer and Historical Society of Michigan. He died at Sault Ste. Marie February 7, 1937 at the age of 79. On Memorial Day a little more than a year after his death at Sault Ste. Marie, a monument was unveiled on his grave on which is the following inscription: "This beloved priest, dear to the men and women alike who knew him, was the last of the long line of Jesuit Priests in the St. Mary's River region, of which Father James Marquette, who came here in 1668, was the first." Master of Indian languages, accomplished musician, saintly character and faithful friend, may Father Gagnieur's memory long be green among us, sorrowful do we commit his body to mother earth, and joyfully do we join in the hope of eternal heaven." Requiescat in Pace.

When I first came to this country there was such a pole in front of every chief's hut, now there are only a few in front of the homes of some of the older chiefs who still cling to the insignia of their office. "The Chief of the tribe advanced and took his stand with me of a Chippewa; the staple of his and my Indian companion. Then he turned to the throng and addressed them in the Algonquin tongue. Then the Indian who had brought me down from the mission stepped up and addressed the crowd in much the same manner of the chief, only talked to the crowd on the east first then the west, then the south, and finally ended with the North. At the conclusion of his talk in which the word "Perkinawag" was mentioned several times, he stepped back from his place and a great shout went up from the throng, all of them shouting "Perkinawag". The ceremony ended with a tribal dance around the pole, in which I had to dance the pole, in which I had to dance the pole, in which I had to dance the pole.



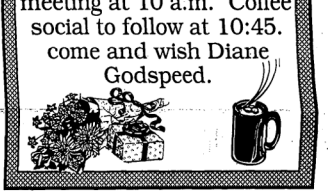

The term "hospice" stems from medieval times when it was used to describe a place of shelter and rest for weary or sick travelers on long journeys. The term was first applied to specialized care for dying patients in 1967, when Dr. Cicely Saunders established St. Christopher's Hospice in a residential suburb of London.

Hospice is a special kind of care designed to provide sensitivity and support for people in the final phase of a terminal illness. Hospice services are available to persons who can no longer benefit from curative treatment. The typical hospice patient has a life expectancy of six months or less. Services are provided by a team of trained professionals - the patient's own attending physician, nurses, counselors, therapists, aides, and volunteers - who provide medical care and support services not only to the patient but to the entire family.

North Woods Home Nursing has always embraced the "hospice" philosophy of care to the best of our ability. Using an interdisciplinary approach, we have tried to enable patients to carry on an alert, pain free life and to manage other symptoms so that their last days may be spent in comfort and with dignity at home.

In continuing with this total patient care concept, North Woods Home Nursing has sought and received permission to be a provider of the hospice benefit of the Medicare program. Studies have shown that hospice care is less expensive than conventional care during the last six months of life. The federal government, because of this cost savings and the popularity of this concept, enacted the Medicare hospice benefit in 1983. As this benefit improved

through the years, North Woods Home Nursing felt a need to offer this option to our patients and our community.

Hospice offers palliative, rather than curative treatment - Under the direction of the attending physician, hospice uses sophisticated methods of pain and symptom control that enable the patient to live as fully and comfortably as possible.

Hospice treats the person and focuses less on the disease. Hospice considers the entire family not just the patient. The interdisciplinary hospice team is made up of professionals from various disciplines. We are very proud of our team who have been meeting every week since approximately April to provide input into the medical, emotional, psychological, and spiritual needs of the patient and family. We have always had an agency interdisciplinary approach but the hospice focus has helped us expand our services.

The federal government mandates that each hospice have a volunteer component. This gives us an excellent opportunity to help in total patient care. Volunteers can do clerical work, run errands, prepare a meal or visit with a patient. The list of possible services is as varied as the patients and volunteers involved. We do have volunteers on board and are looking for more. We have shared volunteers with Bay de Noc Hospice and are working toward a shared arrangement with LMAS Home Care and Hospice.
