

1/4 cup minced onion (can be dried onion)
2 cups shredded cheddau (8 oz) regano

Brown chicken in oil. Drain off any fat. Mix Taco Sauce, water, spices and onions. Pour over chicken. Cover and sim-mer for 30 minutes. Pluce chicken in an ungreased baking alsh (9x8)2 or ovenproof serving dist. Cocl. Spirihle with cheese; cover and refrigerate overnight or at least 8 hours. One hour before serving, heat oven to 400 degrees. Bake, covered, for 20 minutes. Remove cover and bake 20 minutes more. Makes 4 to 6 servings. Especially good served with rice-a-roni.





Schoolcraft County may lose its right to enforce the

mechanical codes in the county. Mechanical codes ensure proper installation of mechanical equipment in a structure, such as furnaces and ductwork. Enforcement of the codes has been lacking in Schoolcraft

Sounty, How did this situation get to the point it is at right now? According to an evaluation report issue tight towi-constrained by the state of Michigan at the request of Schoolcraft County Board of Commissioners members, only one mechanical permit has been issued by the county since Sept. 5, 1984.

needed is a quick solution. The county has less than 30 days to file an appeal with the state to get the right to enforce the mechanical codes back

If they do not, building and construction will suffer in Sch choolcraft County. Solutions to Schoolcraft County's building code

enforcement problems will not be solved over might. The mechanical enforcement was not the only problem cited by'the state.

There are problems with the forms used by the county when Ince are problems with the forms used by the county when issuing permits. There is a problem with the plumbing permit. There are problems with the filing system, or lack of a filing system for permits and blueprints. Building permits were issued to builders who were not licensed with the state. The list of violations noted by the state goes on and on. The building inspector and county commissioners need to know the building codes and enforce them fairly yet with a firm hand

firm hand. The county is moving in the right direction. Problems are being identified and corrected. But will the problems be taken care of before we lose the right to issue mechanical permis? Our safety as citizens of this county is at stake. A problem may never develop because of the lack of enforcement. But if one does, who is to blame? Everyone wants to feel safe in their home. Strict enforcement of the building codes is key to this feeling of security. firm hand.

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


Jason Blowers, number 21, leads the way for Nick Snyder, number 43, drive toward the Iron Mountain goal line.
