DPW funds depleted

Fees paid by the City/County Department of Public Works (DPW) for the closure of the M-94 dump have drained the department's cash balance down to \$83.61.

The DPW has spent almost \$200,000 on environmental studies and lawyers' fees to this point.

DNR gives tips to deer hunters

checking deer, and many will weigh and age the animals.

The closest stations to Schoolcraft County are in Escanaba and Newberry.

Hunters who have their deer checked at a DNR facility will be given a 1993 Licenced Hunter embroidered patch, in appreciation for their contribution toward scientific research of deer in Michigan.

Hunters are reminded that there is a two-buck bag limit. If one buck is taken on an archery license, only one more buck is allowed whether it be with an archery or firearm license.

\*Hunters must obtain written permission before hunting on private land. This also applies to retrieving a deer that ran onto private property before it died.

\*ORVs and ATVs cannot be operated on public lands between the hours of 7 a.m. to 11 a.m. and from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. during firearm deer season, except to remove a deer that was taken under a valid license. The operator must remain on a forest road or designated trail, except an operator may leave the road or trail to retrieve a deer at a speed not to exceed 5 miles per hour.

\*Snowmobiles may not be operated on public lands between the hours of 7 a.m. to 11 a.m. and from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. during the firearm deer season.

\*Shining or the use of artificial lights for locating wildlife is not permitted during the month of November. A licensed deer hunter with an unloaded firearm may use a light to travel on foot and from his hunting location.

\*Blinds of manufactured or man-made materials may be placed on public lands no earlier than 7 days prior to the open season for which it will be used, and Continued on page 4A

### At home with Sarah

Here is a recipe for a special meatloaf. It was given to me by an old minister in Marquette County who is no longer living. His wife was sick and he did all of the cooking at a time when it was quite unusual for married men to take over the kitchen duties. He loved to experiment and make the ordinary special. This recipe for Stuffed Meatloaf is a variation of a dish called Mock Duck. It is unusual when you slice it with its layers.

**STUFFED MEATLOAF**

1 1/2 pounds lean ground chuck 2 eggs  
1/2 pound pork sausage or ground pork 1 small onion, chopped  
12 crackers, crushed pepper and celery salt

Mix as for meatloaf. Divide in 3 and set aside. In a frying pan, sauté 2 onions in 1/4 cup oil until transparent. Stir in 3 slices dry bread, cubed. Add salt and pepper to taste and 1 teas. sage. In a loaf pan, take 1/3 of the meat and put on the bottom. Cover with 1/2 bread dressing. Pat out on waxed paper 1/3 of the meat mixture the size of the pan and place over bread dressing. Next the rest of the dressing and then the final 1/3 of the meat patted out as before. Bake one hour at 350 degrees, draining the fat as it bakes. Slice and serve with a cranberry sauce.

Sarah says . . . To remove a white ring from a varnished table use spit and cigarette ashes. Rub and rub with your finger, adding ashes as you go along. Then polish with furniture polish. (Nothing else we tried worked, but this did!)

## Brownhill resigns from school board

The Manistique Board of Education voted to accept the resignation of member Jim Brownhill, who is leaving the area to pursue his career.

Anyone interested in being appointed to fill the vacant position until the next school election in June, 1994 should submit a letter to the Board of Education in care of the superintendent, including a brief biographical sketch, reasons for interest in serving, and a brief statement of educational philosophy.

Deadline for letters of application to be received at the superintendent's office is Tuesday, Nov. 30, 1993 at 4 p.m.

In other board action: Community School Director Jim McDonough raised concerns about the drastic reductions proposed for Adult High School completion funding.

Besides the benefits received from the almost 300 people who have graduated from Adult High school in Manistique since the program started 14 years ago, the revenue generated by the program helps to keep the building open in the evenings for the enrichment programs and college classes, and makes it possible for community organizations to use the school.

Elimination of the Adult High School Completion Program would drastically reduce the amount of time that the district's buildings would be available for community use.

McDonough reported on the 22 enrichment programs, community enrichment leagues, and special programs that are being enjoyed by hundreds of people in the community of all ages, and the 31 community organizations that use the district's facilities for meetings and programs over the past few months as well.

In other council action: ...The city council listened to citizens' complaints regarding the poor state of the city's historical water tower.

Betty Kospe of the Manistique Woman's Club said many people are concerned about the deterioration of the water tower.

"We are very concerned about the problem of dead birds in the tower," she said. "We know you worked on the tower before and we want to find a good solution and repair the building."

Housler said that since concerns were raised about the tower several months ago, crews secured the inner and outer doors of the structure. The Department of Public Works and the Community Corrections people repaired the front doors and windows, improving the aesthetics of the building.

Housler added that the problem is the holes in the top of the tower where windows have been broken out. He said he is not sure how crews can safely get to the top of the tower and replace the windows.

"It seems things at the water tower cannot be fixed a few dollars at a time," said Stewart.

Helen Davenport of the Schoolcraft County Historical Society said the structure is a state historical building and if something was not done to fix the problem, state officials would be contacted.

"Thank you for your quick action before," she said, "but all you did is put a bandaid on a bird cage."

"I'm not saying you need to spend city money. There are grants available for this sort of thing."

Stewart said the city has had several grants to apply for grants, but did not pursue them and the project needs more attention.

Dougovito said the historical society and woman's club should meet with Housler and City Clerk Linda Armock to find the solution to the problem.

Armock is the former Economic Development Corporation director and is experienced in writing grants.

Manistique Rentals, Inc., MRI started into the recycling venture slowly. At first their hours for the general public were Thursday's only, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., but later switched to Saturday mornings, from 8:30 a.m. to noon.

Why? I'm not really sure but would guess to make it more convenient for the public.

Enter Manistique Recycling Process, MRP, run by Mr. Bob Akeley. MRP's hours were much more convenient, every day except Sunday, from 9 to 5.

Sears is the first recipient of the award that honors those who promote a drug-free message.

In other partnership action: ...The partnership board was updated on the Community Needs Assessment Survey, which was distributed to Manistique residents to determine the area's drug and alcohol use.

Partnership Director Linda Steinfeldt said 168 surveys were returned to the partnership office.

"The returns show a good cross-section of the community," she said. "The survey results will be released to the media on Nov. 19 in conjunction with the Student Use Survey that was completed in the schools."

Steinfeldt said the results of the surveys can be compared to show where drug and alcohol use is taking place and why.

The survey respondents are categorized by age, income and education level.

...The possibility of a mural depicting an anti-drug message was

discussed for the building walls adjacent to the "pocket park" located on the corner of Cedar and Walnut Streets.

Concern was raised that the mural would be painted on the side of two bars.

Steinfeldt said the needs of the office had changed and two part time employees would be hired to do the job.

One person will handle the office work and another will visit schools and do work in the community.

Steinfeldt said the accounting duties may be subcontracted to an accounting firm.

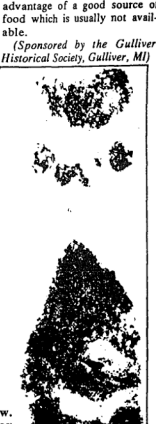

**A Most Unusual Bear Den**

I stooped low and looked into the bear den. Ed said, "You're crazy; I ain't going in there." I crawled right in. It stunk, it stunk terrible. But this was no ordinary bear den.

been friends for over 50 years. Mick, a small, agile man, is a respected woodsman and timber cruiser. Ed, nicknamed Coyote, has been trapping for over 60 years. The two friends spend many hours together in the woods.  
It was about April 15, during an extended trapping season, when Ed and Mick went looking for beaver in Section 17 of Mueller Township in Schoolcraft County. A little snow still covered the ground. Ed drove his pickup truck as far as he could down an old logging road and then the two men got out and walked until they reached the river. They followed the river upstream until they found fresh beaver cuttings.  
Ed prepared his traps while Mick went to cut some saplings into stakes to set the traps. As he was chopping he routed a bear. It came out of a clump of small cedar trees not three feet away, ran past him, and headed for the creek. Ed heard the commotion and turned to see the bear running toward him. The bear did not slow down. He crossed the creek and disappeared into the woods toward high ground.  
The two men looked at each other for a few seconds; then Mick said, "I'm going to see where that bear lives." He ran over to the clump of cedar. making a bank on one side. The bear had made his den under the bank.  
Mick crawled into the den, but Ed was more cautious. He walked out around it to approach it from behind. The sun had begun to melt the snow and dirt on the bank. He pulled the dirt away from the roots to peek in.  
The two men looked at the den for a short time and then resumed their work. They did not see the bear again.  
"We got four blankets there; they were big blankets, but we never went back to the den to trap," Ed said.  
There seems to be no evidence that a black bear normally feeds after it embarks on its winter sleep. I believe this is the first reported sighting of a free-ranging black bear eating throughout the winter.  
Most bears retreat to a den in the fall and emerge in the spring. To prepare for this winter-dormant state, the bear's main activity is foraging for food. His body goes through a complicated series of biochemical adaptations that allow him to go without food and water and to go without urinating or defecating for up to six months.  
One of the many interesting biological phenomena revealed by the dening bear is the intestinal plug. The plug is made up of various foods and objects the bear ingests, including but not limited to pine needles, dried grass and weeds, and hair. The plug is formed in the fall and is not expelled until spring, unless the bear is disturbed during the winter.

Resources, reported that captive bears who were fed throughout the winter remained active and leathery. Perhaps, the Schoolcraft County bear was simply taking advantage of a good source of food which is usually not available. (Sponsored by the Gulliver Historical Society, Gulliver, MI)
