Deer season continues

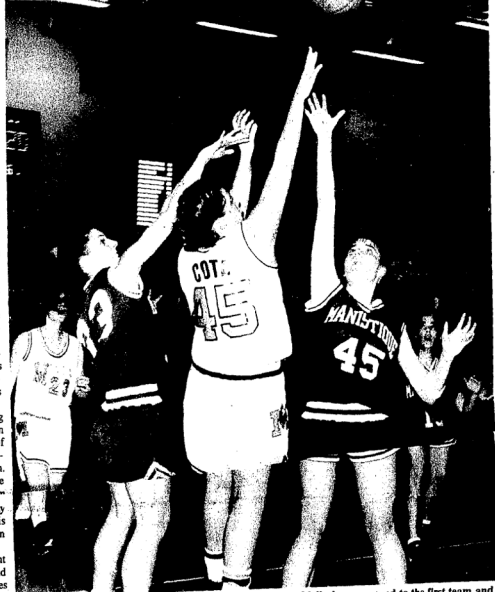
The 1993 firearm deer hunting season started off with a bang according to local businesses and hunters. The season has been good for the store. "We've sold a lot of licenses," he said. "We've also sold a lot of second licenses, about 40." Tomako said there has not been a lot of stories about big bucks, with most of them around four or six points. Drug use down at MHS

Drug use among teenagers is down in the Manistiquette area, but is still well above national averages for most categories studied. Alcohol is the most used drug in the area according to the survey conducted by the Manistiquette Area Schools and given to eighth, tenth and twelfth graders. In the eighth grade, 82 percent of the students have tried alcohol, 48 percent in the last month. The percentage of tenth graders ever using alcohol was 91 percent, 66 percent in the last month. The percentage of twelfth graders who ever used alcohol was 94 percent, 71 percent said they have tried alcohol in the last month. The numbers are high, but are down slightly from levels in a survey taken in 1990. The twelfth grade national average for those ever using alcohol is 88 percent, while the average percentage of use in the past month is 51 percent.

Marijuana use is down among area twelfth graders, but is up in the eighth grade. 42 percent of twelfth graders have tried marijuana, 14 percent in the last month. 20 percent of eighth graders have tried marijuana, up 6 percent from last year. Cigarette use is down slightly for all three grade levels, but is still about 20 percent higher than the national average. In the twelfth grade, 89 percent said they have tried smoking, and 53 percent have smoked cigarettes in the past month. The national average for twelfth graders is 62 percent for those ever trying cigarettes and 28 percent in the last month.

Use of other drugs such as crack cocaine, cocaine, heroin, LSD and other drugs is up slightly and remains several percentage points higher than the national average. The identity of the man was not released.

All-Conference team named

Malloch, a three year starter for the Emeralds, led the conference in rebounds, averaging 14.2 per game and free throw percentage, shooting 73 percent. She was also

second in scoring for the conference with 13.9 points per game. Fleck, another three year starter for Manistiquette, was eighth in scoring in the league and Kennedy was ninth and also led the league in 3-pointers with 18 on the second-team. Kennedy's 18 3-pointers puts her in fifth place on the all-time list for the category. Fleck was also recognized for

her defensive play, which was instrumental in her being named to the second team.

Dobbie Hermes of Big Bay De Noc was unanimously chosen as a first team player in the Central UP Conference during a meeting of the league's coaches on Friday, Nov. 12.

Rural hospitals get a boost

Schoolcraft Memorial Hospital received a future that will propel them into the future of rural health care. The grant recipient - the Upper Great Lakes Educational Technologies, Inc. (UGLET) - will receive a total of \$373,894 for the project. These funds will be dedicated toward improving rural medicine

and education in the Upper Peninsula by linking member hospitals through a telecommunications system to provide better access to advanced medicine. Schoolcraft County Memorial Hospital Administrator David John said the program will include a tele-radiology system and televideo conferencing. "We only have one radiologist on staff," he said. "If we need an X-ray read right away and our radiologist is not available, we will be able to send the X-ray over the phone lines to Marquette General Hospital."

John said the televideo conferencing will be used to bring specialists to Schoolcraft County instead of sending the patients to them. "The televideo can also be used for educational and business conferencing," he said. "The equipment will be rented to schools and businesses."

"This is something that we really needed, and I'm delighted this money will be coming to the UP," said Sen. Carl Levin, D-Mich. "People living in rural communities who become sick or injured often need the same high-quality medicine as people living in the city, and they are not always getting it."

Frenette named director

Connie Frenette, the new Schoolcraft County Senior Director is no stranger to the Senior Center in Manistiquette. Frenette has spent the past 15 years working at the center and said she would not change it for anything. "They (the senior citizens) make me feel like family," she said. "They are great people to work for. It is a very enjoyable job." Frenette said she hopes to continue giving the senior citizens of the area the social opportunities the senior center has to offer.

"At this time of the year," she said, "I'm busy working on the annual Christmas Party. The seniors need the center for the social aspects," she said. "It gives them the chance to get out of their homes. I hope it makes them feel they are not so isolated. A lot of our seniors are the only ones left in their home and many don't have family here." One way the center provides for the needs of area seniors is through their daily noon meals. "We serve a hot meal Monday through Friday," Frenette said. "We have a lot of regulars. On Wednesdays, the Senior Swingers Band plays." The center has many programs to help make life a little easier for area seniors. One program is the telephone reassurance program where a member of the Senior Center staff calls elderly members of the community on a daily basis to make sure they are doing all right. The senior program also helps the elderly with prescription drugs, which can be very expensive. The Homestead Property, Credit generated \$61,076.21 for seniors in Schoolcraft County. The Michigan Emergency Pharmaceutical Program for Seniors (MEPPS) Prescription Vouchers program has helped seniors in Schoolcraft County with \$20,769.99 worth of prescription bills since its inception in 1990. Frenette said there is a waiting list for the clearing program. Luella Lambert has donated her time making mittens to support the

Dam bids opened

Bids for the refurbishment of the Brewery Dam were opened Friday, but cuts in the state grant for the project may change the extent to which the dam is repaired. The low base bid received for the project was from Hardman Construction of Ludington, Mich. at \$253,000, but the grant from the Rebuild Michigan Program is for \$216,000. Schoolcraft County Economic Development Corporation Director Jim Anderson said all grants under the program were cut by 20 percent because of "unprecedented demand" for funds from the program. Anderson said the original grant received was for \$270,000.

"We may have to cut the project back," he said. "We will also be seeking money from other sources." Anderson said a tax assessment district may be set up to cover the additional funds needed for the project. No areas have been outlined by the EDC as possible districts at this point. "The dam has gotten worse and worse over the years," he said. "The community has been seeking grants for the project since the mid '70s." The Brewery Dam Committee is meeting Thursday, Nov. 18 at 7 p.m. at the EDC office to discuss the project. The meeting is open to the public.

State police activate travel network

Motorists traveling throughout Michigan this winter will again be as close as their car radios to receive the latest driving conditions. The Michigan State Police activated the "Michigan State Police Travel Advisory Network" on Nov. 1. The network is a 24-hour road condition reporting service made available to Michigan broadcast stations. The department will utilize road condition reports from state police post throughout the state and then make that information available through a centralized network of signed-up broadcast stations through a centralized network of signed-up broadcast stations by local radio and television stations.

"We want the public receiving road condition information in the same manner as the do school closings - through the media," said Manistiquette State Police Post Commander Lt. Gregory Aho. "In the past when winter weather hit, Michigan State Police posts were inundated with calls concerning driving conditions. In many cases, this would tie up existing lines, not allowing emergency calls to come in. By having the public listen to the local radio and television stations, they can receive the same information as though they had called the post.

At home with Sarah

When the same recipe is sent to me by two different people, I am aware that this is a good recipe that is being passed around. Not only that, this recipe was in the column years ago and was very popular "way back when!" This recipe takes the place of pumpkin pie, is easier to serve and goes further. One grandma in town told me that since it was in the paper she makes it every Thanksgiving and it has become a family tradition. "After a big Thanksgiving dinner we are usually too full for a rich dessert and this is perfect for my big family when all the grandchildren are together. We save the pies for later in the day."

PUMPKIN PIE DESSERT

First layer: 1 yellow cake mix
1/2 cup melted oleo
1 beaten egg

Mix together. Reserve 1 cup for the 3rd layer. Press the rest in an ungreased 9x13 pan.

Second layer: 1 large (32 oz) can pumpkin pie mix
2/3 cup canned or regular milk
2 beaten eggs

Third layer: 1 cup cake mix (saved from 1st layer)
1/4 cup flour
1/4 cup melted oleo
1/4 cup sugar
1 teas. cinnamon

Mix together and sprinkle on top.

Bake at 350 degrees for 45-50 minutes, or until inserted knife comes out clean. Serve with Cool Whip. Serves 12 to 15.

Sarah says . . . If you get wax on your table cloth because your candle dripped, here is how to remove it. Scrape wax off both sides with a sharp knife. Then take a heavy brown paper bag, rip open and place on both sides of cloth. Iron over bag with a warm iron. The iron melts the wax and the bag absorbs it. Keep moving bag until no more wax is absorbed. Wash as usual.

I remember Carrol Tatrow of Garden telling me that years back a hunter never baited for a deer, they just sat on a deer run hoping for a buck to come through. Deer blinds were unheard of 50 years ago. Now we have so many different types of deer blinds that you could spend a small fortune

just keeping up on the latest style. Grunt calls, high powered rifles, night scopes, deer scents, camo colored blinds, apples and corn, we have it all. When you think about it we have almost taken the challenge out of hunting. Bow hunting is a little more challenging but I think hunting like our forefathers, stalking quietly through the woods, open

attached to it. One of the main reasons the people in this area Times were hard and hunting, whether in season or not, was to put food on the table. It was carry over from before the law was around and all a farmer or fisherman had to feed his family was what was on the land and in the water.

This year alone I've killed 19 mice and destroyed 27 nests. If you can get the kestrel to use your boxes you'll find they will take care of a lot of mice for you. The bear there isn't much you can do except move out of the area or make everything out of metal. Now we'll take the areas one at a time.
HIGH ROLL WAY: 89 boxes. Bluebirds occupied 30. Tree swallows 20. A kestrel nested in one box with five eggs, but the eggs disappeared and a northern flicker took over laid five eggs and fledged one hatcher. Now if anyone knows enough about birds there's no way a flicker is going to chase a kestrel out of the box and the boxes I have for the kestrels now, there's no way a "coon" could get at the eggs. If a starting tree the egg out, the shells would have been on the ground. This flicker had outside help. Of 124 bluebird eggs, 30 birds were fledged and from 96 eggs, 55 tree swallows fledged. The predation was BEAR: three tree swallow hatchers and nine

tree swallows got 33 from 48 eggs. This has always been an area for bear. This season they got six eggs and 10 bluebird hatchers, also 10 tree swallow hatchers. They then destroyed four boxes and two poss. I destroyed two mice nests.
KINGSTON PLAINS: 54 boxes, 10 boxes were occupied by bluebirds and 18 by tree swallows. Four were used by kestrels. Twenty-six eggs were laid by the bluebirds, 95 by tree swallows and 19 by the kestrels. Bluebirds fledged 22, tree swallows 62 and the kestrels 10. This was the only area that I got any kestrel fledgers. In the middle of June a bear went on a rampage and raided some boxes. He got 22 tree swallow eggs, five bluebird hatchers and he did all this without too much damage to any of the boxes. I found one mouse in a box where he had killed seven tree swallow hatchers.
 I believe the high point of the season was going with a fellow from down below and watching

him band the young kestrel hatchlings on the Kingston Plains. It was interesting. He removed with him and we all hiked out them from the boxes and put them into a paper shopping bag. He then took one at a time and banded them while his wife jotted down the information. We had to wait until they were feathered out to tell the hens from the roosters and by the way they followed the trend of the animal world the little hens did most of the hatching and they were also the most curly, which was from their scratching and hen pecking. The fellow doing the
